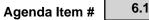

Highlights:

June 2023 operating results presents activity for the first 6 months of the fiscal year.

General Fund Expense— For the FY 2023 operating period ending May 31, 2023, expenditures recorded year to date are \$3,892,466 and includes debt service of \$1,270,083. Total expensed and encumbered to date represents the use of 45% of adopted expense budget for the FY 2023. April 2022 expenditures were \$2,299,000. The increase in expenses is directly related to debt service that was paid in 2023 but not paid in 2022.

Confiscated Assets Funds Expenses – Federal and State confiscated reflect all current activity related to revenues received from court dispositions. No funds were expended as of April 30, 2023.

LMIG Funds Expense - The sum of the two grants awards were budgeted to be expended in 2023. Funds accumulated in the fund balance will be used in conjunction with SPLOST 15 funds on hand to pay for the road repairs in 2023. The total grant funds available for road repairs is approximately \$118K. When the invoice is received from Clayton County, SPLOST 15 reserves will be used to supplement the payment.

Other Grant Funds Expenses – records the CDBG grant awards for sidewalks and housing redevelopment. These projects are required to be substantially complete by December 31, 2023

ARPA Funds Expenses year to date total expense is \$956,097. A total of \$896,894 remains to be expended. The expenditures align with the directives of the governing body. Resources are being managed to ensure all funds are obligated by December 2024 and expended by December 2026 per council directives and SLPRF guidelines.

Hotel Motel Fund Expenses are trending as budgeted. These expenses reflect payment to Clayton County Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Technology Fund Expenses records inflow of receipts from Court activity and disbursements related to the ongoing IT support services contract.

SPLOST Funds Expenses proceeds from SPLOST 21 are designated to cover a portion of the City Center debt service requirements. Other SPLOST 15 funds combined with LMIG state funds will cover road repairs.

Solid Waste Fund Expenses Expenditures in this fund are directly related to the operations needed to provide solid waste services to the citizens of Jonesboro. These expenses include salaries, professional disposal services and other

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operating costs. In 2023, \$80,500 of fund balance was used to acquire capital assets.

Glossary of Terms for Fund Accounting and Reporting

Fund Accounting is an accounting system emphasizing accountability rather than profitability. It is commonly used by non-profit organizations, public service entities, and governmental entities and authorities. Below are some common terms used.

Fund is a self-balancing set of accounts, segregated for specific purposes in accordance with laws and regulations or special restrictions and limitations.

Fund Balance is the total accumulation of operating surpluses and deficits since the beginning of a local government's existence. The Fund Balance Formula: Fund Balance = Assets – Liabilities.

Budget - an estimation of revenue and expenses over a specified fiscal period and is usually compiled and re-evaluated on a periodic basis. See Budget Amendments and Budget Transfers.

Balanced Budget is a constitutional rule requiring that a municipality cannot spend more than its income. It requires a balance between the projected receipts and expenditures of the government.

Budget Amendments – are changes to the operating or capital budget that results in an increase to expenses funded by revenues or an increase in the revenues for the operating budget. It may include an increase or decrease to expenses funded by reserves or debt financing for the capital budget.

Budget Transfers – are submitted in anticipation of incurred or upcoming commitments or expenditures so that the budget reflects the actual plans and spending of the department. These transactions move funds from one account to another and maintain a balanced budget.

Contingency reserve refers to a general ledger allocation in the budget at a high level that is specifically reserved for expenditure unknowns. This contingency reserve will be appropriated by Council approval following the identification of expense needs and uncertain events that occur during the budget year.

Encumber or Encumbrance - Setting aside an amount as a planned expense or obligation. The normal mechanism for encumbering an amount is through a purchase order.

Purchase Order - a commercial document and first official offer issued by a buyer (Jonesboro) to a seller (vendor), that indicates types, quantities, and agreed prices for products or services. It is used to provide proof of approval to expend city funds, to minimize overspending budget lines, and to control the purchasing of products and services from external suppliers.

ALL Funds Description and Purpose

General Fund (100) -Accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund

Confiscated Assets Funds –Accounts for Federal (211) and State (210) activity related to revenues received from court dispositions. Resources are restricted for Public Safety needs.

LMIG Funds (212) - Accounts for DOT Grant awards and expenses to repair Jonesboro City streets. Matching funds to complete road improvements will be provided by SPLOST 2015 (325) Fund Balance

ARPA Fund (230) Accounts for the Treasury funds provided to remediate business operations that may have been impacted by the Covid 19 pandemic that began in March 2020. \$1.8 M was received and will be expended by December 2026.

Hotel Motel Fund (275) accounts for activity related to taxes remitted by hotel operators in the City limits. Each local government imposing a Hotel-Motel Tax is required to adopt a budget plan specifying how the expenditure requirements of the Georgia Code will be met.

Other Grant fund (250) will track CDBG grant awards and expenditures for Housing Redevelopment and Sidewalk. This is a reimbursable grant with a completion date of December 31, 2023.

Technology Funds (290) accounts for Court activity that provides the operating resources of this fund. Disbursements are in support of IT services and technology support for court operations.

SPLOST (320-330) Funds account for taxes collected to fund projects approved in the most recent IGA. A portion of the proceeds will cover the City Center debt service requirements.

Solid Waste Fund (540) records activity related to Sanitation and Refuse and solid waste services provided to the City Residents and businesses. The fees is billed annually on the tax bill.

Financial Report Summary June 2023

- June 2023 operating results presents activity for the first 6 (six) months of the current fiscal year. The current general fund revenue received year to date as of June 2023 is \$4,090,584 or 50% of the budget. Comparatively, June 30, 2022, revenue recognized was \$2,431,681 or 40%. In 2023 we are seeing improved revenue results in Court Services, Business Licenses, and investment revenues.
- June 2023 expenditures of \$4,520,610 presents activity for the first 6 months of the current fiscal year. This amount includes items encumbered in the current fiscal year using the purchase order system. A lookback at 2022 operations shows that expenditures in June 2022 were \$3,206,897 or 47% The year over year increase is related to the additional debt service obligation. Except for general insurance premiums, these increases were anticipated and remain in alignment with the adopted budget. Staff is encouraged to use the purchase requisitioning process to generate purchase orders as a tool to help manage budgets and avoid spending overages. Purchase Orders represent approval to expend city funds and creates a tool for vendors to respond to the buyer with confidence that they will be paid when the order is fulfilled.
- Any revenues received that exceed budgeted revenues will be used to 1st increase the contingency reserve. This increase in the contingency reserve will then be evaluated to appropriate the required amounts necessary to cover any unbudgeted or underbudgeted expense lines. This analysis will include consideration of the insurance premiums expenses for Commercial General Liability and Umbrella Policy premiums that increased in 2023 as the result of a new facility and the city's current industry experience rating.
- § The forthcoming mid-year budget amendment will be properly prepared and presented to the council for approval.

Financial Report Summary- continued June 2023

- § ARPA funds were awarded to the City in 2021. The \$1,852,000 award has been received in full. Council designated a spending plan for ARPA funds in 2022. To date \$956,097 has been expended on essential staff and technology enhancements. The remaining \$896,894 must be fully expended by December 2026.
- § City Center Rentals and Concessions are trending lower than anticipated as a result of the moratorium on facility rentals. With holiday events and other rentals, this line item may improve.
- § Property Tax revenue for tax bills mailed in 2022 supports the 2022 budget. The 2023 tax bills are expected to be calculated using the current 8 mils. 2022 taxes collected in the current fiscal year 481,015
- § Occupation/Business License Tax is \$448,179 or 112%
- § LOST Revenue is \$818,094 or 51%
- **S** Debt service payments made year to date is \$1,267,195. Remaining to be paid \$271,899.

The Revenue and Expense statements that accompany this narrative provides a summarization and detail of the City's operating results to date for the General fund, Special Revenue and Proprietary funds.

All approved budget amendments are reflected in the reports as you will note that the budget is now referred to as "amended" versus "adopted".

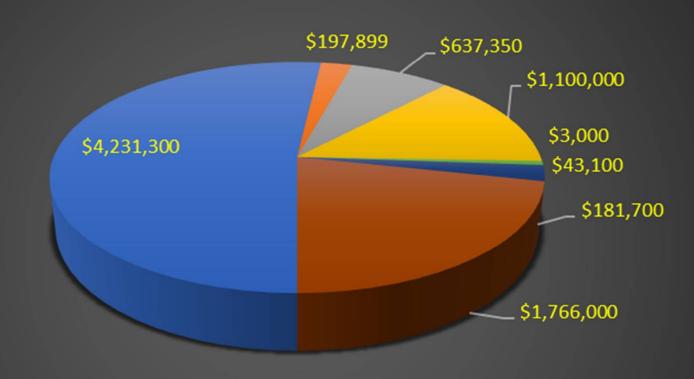

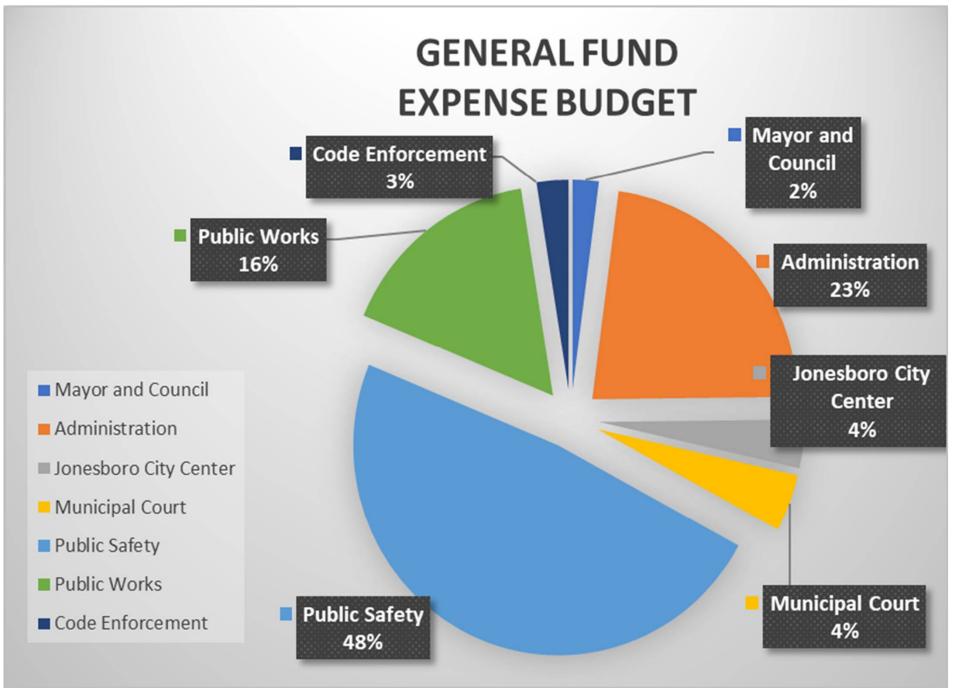

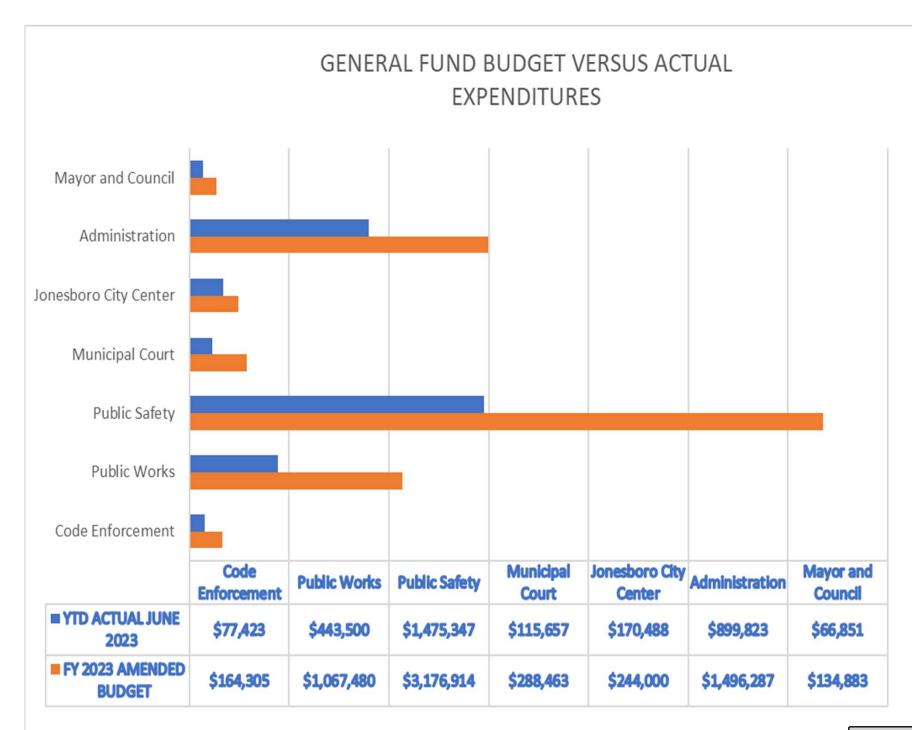

Financial Revenue Review ALL FUNDS SUMMARY Period Ended June 30, 2023

General Fund Revenue— As of the current operating period, revenue recognized in the general fund is \$4,090,584 or 50% of the adopted \$8,160,349 budget revenue for the FY 2023

Confiscated Assets Funds Revenue—Federal and State confiscated Assets reflect all current activity related to revenues received from court dispositions of state and federal cases. Year to date \$19,376 in Federal funds are recognized in 2023. The funds are restricted for Public Safety initiatives as outlined by the Equitable Assets Sharing guidelines - https://www.justice.gov/criminal-afmls/file/794696/download. As of this report, no funds have been appropriated or expended. Police department leadership has been advised to review their **unbudgeted** needs to determine the best use of these restricted funds in FY 2024 budget process.

LMIG Funds Revenue - DOT Grant was awarded and revenue of \$59,294 was received in July 2022. In Fiscal year 2023, an additional \$60,000 was awarded and received to be used to repair city roadways. The county provides the labor, and the city reimburses for the materials. The sum of the two grants were budgeted to be expended. SPLOST 15 resources will provide the matching funds to complete the work in 4th quarter 2023.

Other Grant Funds Revenue—records the CDBG grant awards for sidewalks and housing redevelopment. These projects are required to be substantially complete by December 31, 2023. A collaboration of efforts by the Mainstreet Director, Public Works Director and Community Development Director will assure these grant funds are used as intended and grant compliance is adhered to.

ARPA Funds Revenue year to date reflects that \$1,852,991 awarded has been received in the city's accounts. The use of these resources were outlined in the directives of council. Resources are being managed to assure all funds are committed and expended per council directives and SLPRF guidelines.

Hotel Motel Fund Revenue Georgia law authorizes a Hotel-Motel Tax under various conditions. The city is required to expend the taxes collected in strict accordance with the provisions of the specific authorizations in the Georgia Code. Clayton County Visitors Bureau receives a monthly payment of all restricted funds.

Technology Fund Revenue records inflow of receipts from Court activity and disbursements related to the ongoing IT support services contract with 3rd party IT support, currently VC3.

SPLOST Funds Revenue proceeds from SPLOST 21 are designated to cover a portion of the City Center debt service requirements. Other SPLOST 15 funds combined with LMIG state funds will cover road repairs.

Solid Waste Fund Revenue records proceeds from annual Sanitation and Refuse invoices. The annual sanitation fee revenue is included on the city tax bill and is due at the same time as the property tax bill.

Financial Expense Review ALL FUNDS SUMMARY Period Ended June 30, 2023

General Fund Expense— For the FY 2023 operating period ending May 31, 2023, expenditures recorded year to date are \$3,892,466 and includes debt service of \$1,270,083. Total expensed and encumbered to date represents the use of 45% of adopted expense budget for the FY 2023. April 2022 expenditures were \$2,299,000. The increase in expenses is directly related to debt service that was paid in 2023 but not paid in 2022.

Confiscated Assets Funds Expenses – Federal and State confiscated reflect all current activity related to revenues received from court dispositions. No funds were expended as of April 30, 2023.

LMIG Funds Expense - The sum of the two grants awards were budgeted to be expended in 2023. Funds accumulated in the fund balance will be used in conjunction with SPLOST 15 funds on hand to pay for the road repairs in 2023. The total grant funds available for road repairs is approximately \$118K. When the invoice is received from Clayton County, SPLOST 15 reserves will be used to supplement the payment.

Other Grant Funds Expenses – records the CDBG grant awards for sidewalks and housing redevelopment. These projects are required to be substantially complete by December 31, 2023

ARPA Funds Expenses year to date total expense is \$956,097. A total of \$896,894 remains to be expended. The expenditures align with the directives of the governing body. Resources are being managed to assure all funds are obligated by December 2024 and expended by December 2026 per council directives and SLPRF guidelines.

Hotel Motel Fund Expenses are trending as budgeted. These expense reflect payment to Clayton County Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Technology Fund Expenses records inflow of receipts from Court activity and disbursements related to the ongoing IT support services contract.

SPLOST Funds Expenses proceeds from SPLOST 21 are designated to cover a portion of the City Center debt service requirements. Other SPLOST 15 funds combined with LMIG state funds will cover road repairs.

Solid Waste Fund Expenses Expenditures in this fund are directly related to the operations needed to provide solid waste services to the citizens of Jonesboro. These expenses include salaries, professional disposal services and other operating costs. In 2023, \$80,500 of fund balance was used to acquire capital assets.

At the end of 2022. The unassigned fund balance for the general funds was \$5,958,693 which is 91% of total general fund expenditures indication a healthy financial status.

City Clerk Melissa Brooks came forward and gave an overview of the request. She stated that the City of Jonesboro held a Special Election on March 21, 2023, for a cost of \$23,000. The estimated cost for the November 7, 2023, election is \$24,000. She stated that it would be a benefit for the City of Jonesboro to enter into an agreement with Clayton County Elections Board to conduct the November Municipal Election. She stated that the county has the staff and the infrastructure to conduct an efficient and effective election. This would mean for the City of Jonesboro cost savings of about \$12,000.

Attorney Matricardi stated that if the city enters into an agreement with the county for election provisions - the attached ordinance will need to be adopted.

DISCUSSION:

- -For the record Mayor Sartor stated the following:
- -It's been voted that the city will run the November 7, 2023, election.
- -It was \$20,000 in the 2023 budget for the election the last Special Election was \$23,000, which was \$3000 over budget.
- -The March 2023 Special Election was ran with a city manager we no longer have a city manager.
- -By denying this the council is saying that you will not take the most cost effective route.
- -After speaking with staff, it's a stress on the day-to-day operations when city staff has to cover the election.
- -Mayor Sartor stated that if the city ran the election, it would cost about \$23,000 if the county ran the election, it would cost \$11,000.
- -Mayor Pro Tem stated that I think it is worth the \$13,000 to ensure that the citizens votes are counted properly. We had problems with the county We had special meetings to discuss entering an agreement with the county it took eight emails and finally had to hold a Special Called meeting to get someone from the county to come and speak with the council to tell us that they would

like to handle the city's election. At the same time, she stated that no other municipality allows the county to conduct their election. The county has such a vast amount handle. I want to be sure that the city's election is handled properly. We owe that to the people that voted for us. I trust our staff. She stated that there's only one other polling place for our voters to vote - Lee Street Elementary. Lee Street Elementary very near to the City Center. I had one complaint about voting at the City Center. Most people stated that they enjoyed coming here to vote. When the City Center was built, we focused on how to make the City Center voter friendly. How can we make the entrances - easy in and easy out. I don't think that should be put to the side.

Mayor Sartor stated for clarification, the county will come here (City Center) to run the election.

Clayton County Elections Director Shuan Dozier came forward. She stated that the county has conducted elections for other municipalities in the county. Currently, they have entered IGA's with Lake City and Morrow, and are working on an IGA with the City of Forest Park.

Mayor asked the Elections Director the following questions:

- -Have you ever received citation/violations from the State for not conducting an election correctly? No.
- -Do you foresee running the city's election as a problem. No. I think it would be more convenient for the voters. It would give the voters more options to vote in different locations. They will also be able to vote during the county's extended hours.
- Will there be a countywide election on November 7, 2023. Not officially, the Board of Election has placed on the calendar for a countywide election.

COMMENTS FROM ELECTION DIRECTOR

- -If the city does not enter an IGA with the county, voters will be faced with going to two different voting places on November 7th.
- -Elections Director stated that for \$11,700 the county will do everything for the city's election except qualifying. We guarantee not to exceed \$11,700.
- -If the county conducts the countywide election the county will not be able to provide the city with election equipment. The county will be utilizing all equipment for their polling sites.

During early voting, Jonesboro voters can go to any of the Clayton County ran voting sites.

Mayor Sartor pointed out that if the city contracts with the county - voters will have two (2) early voting locations in the city to vote.

Mayor Sartor called for the vote. The vote was unanimous to deny entering an IGA to allow the county to conduct the November 7, 2023, Municipal Election.

DISCUSSION

City Clerk Melissa Brooks came forward and stated that she is certified to run the election and will do a good job.

Councilman D. Dixon inquired about the number of poll workers that will be hired.

Mayor clarified that City staff will not be utilized to conduct the election.

Councilman D. Dixon stated that he does not understand how the County can conduct the election for \$11,000. Councilman D. Dixon stated that the city will pay the \$11,000 and other charges as overtime and the city is back at the \$20,000 paid to the county.

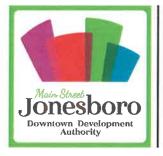

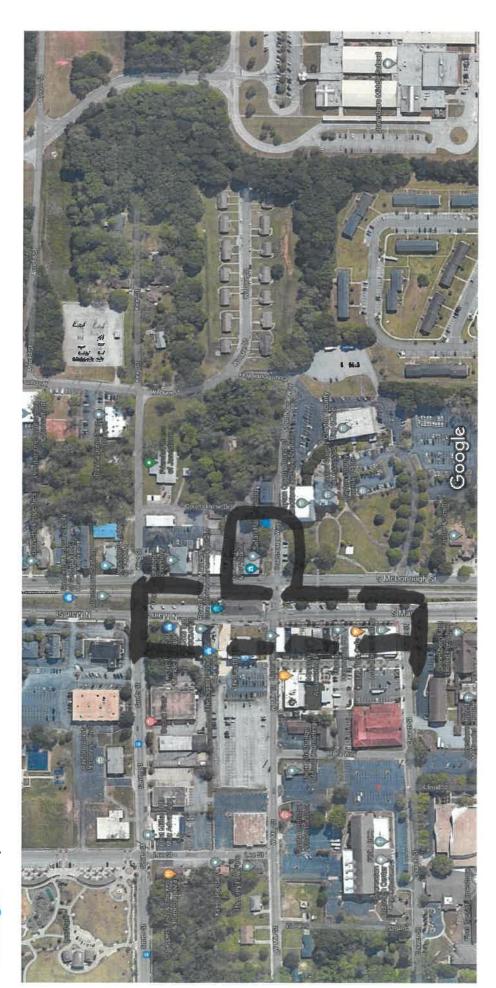

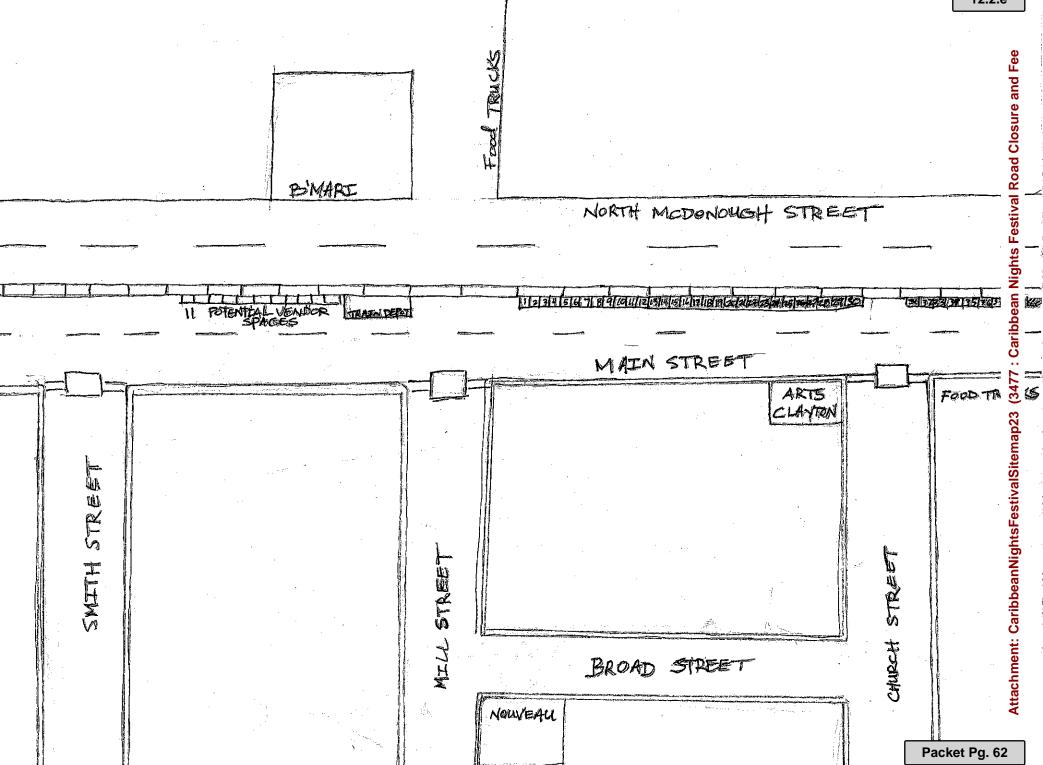

Agency recommendation – Approval of street officer raises for remainder of FY23; Recently, the Police Chief brought up concerns about officer pay and retention within the City of Jonesboro. There is intense competition for new and experienced police officers within Clayton County and metro Atlanta. Smaller municipalities such as Jonesboro with smaller tax bases are not only challenged to recruit and retain quality officers, but are faced with fully staffing shifts to adequately protect and serve on the streets.

Per the Police Chief,

I am writing to formally submit my appeal to the Mayor and City Council regarding the need for a pay increase for the dedicated members of our esteemed Police Department. I have attached the detailed document outlining the reasons and rationale for this request.

As you are aware, our police officers play an integral role in maintaining the safety and security of our community. Their commitment to upholding the law and protecting our citizens is commendable and essential for the well-being of our city. However, it is no secret that they face numerous challenges and risks while carrying out their duties.

The purpose of this appeal is to draw attention to the pressing need to improve the compensation of our police force. Adequate pay is crucial in attracting and retaining qualified and experienced officers, as well as motivating them to continue providing exceptional service. A competitive salary is not only a matter of fairness but also an investment in the overall effectiveness of our law enforcement efforts.

In the attached document, I have outlined the key points supporting the pay increase proposal, including:

- 1. Retention and Recruitment: Attracting and retaining talented individuals in law enforcement is becoming increasingly difficult. A competitive salary will help us recruit the best candidates and retain experienced officers who have already demonstrated their dedication to our city.

It is my intention to work with the Finance Department to ensure that this proposal be realized. In our last conversation, we determined that the current vacant Assistant Chief's position would fund such an increase for the remainder of this year and the general fund to support it ongoing. If there is any additional information or support you require from me for this appeal, please do not hesitate to ask. I am more than willing to collaborate and provide any necessary data or research to bolster our case. Thank you for your time and consideration of this important matter. I look forward to a positive response from the Mayor and City Council, and I am hopeful that together, we can make a meaningful difference for our police force and the entire community.

The Police Chief is advocating for a 16% pay increase across the board. This would, of course, affect the 2023 budget, the 2024 budget, and beyond.

The Interim City Manager's and Mayor's immediate goal is to improve the current retention and recruitment of quality street officers, in order to keep the streets safe. Pay increases to personnel within the Police Department and the Courts which are not directly participating in street patrol shifts is not the immediate priority. With the onset of budget talks for FY24 in August and September, discussions will need to occur to accommodate future pay increases in the upcoming and future budget.

For the remainder of the FY23 budget, the City would like to explore vacating the already budgeted Assistant Police Chief position and dividing up that salary into respective permanent pay increases for street officers only.

Update for August 14, 2023 Meeting:

The Police Chief confirmed that the raise applied to sworn officers only.

Greetings, Mayor Sartor and Esteemed City Council Members,

As the Chief of Police for the Jonesboro Police Department, I write to you today to express my deep concern regarding the current pay scales of our dedicated police officers. I respectfully request your attention to this matter and propose a significant pay increase of 16% across the board for the Jonesboro Police Department.

Law enforcement officers are the backbone of our community. They serve as the frontline defenders of justice, ensuring the safety and well-being of our citizens in the face of ever-evolving challenges and risks. However, the current pay structure has created a severe disparity between the compensation offered to our officers and those in neighboring jurisdictions. This has negatively impacted morale, recruitment, and retention within our police force.

Allow me to highlight the striking disparities between the Jonesboro Police Department's starting pay of \$43,243 and other neighboring agencies. For instance, Clayton County Police and Clayton County Sheriff's Office offer a starting pay of \$48,122, despite serving a population of 300,000 over 144 square miles. Similarly, Lake City Police starts at \$43,347 with a jurisdiction of 1.8 square miles and a population of 3,000. Even smaller municipalities such as Love Joy Police, with a population of 6,000 over 2 square miles, offer a starting pay of \$45,874.

Furthermore, the Riverdale Police Department, covering 16,000 citizens over 4.2 square miles, provides their officers a starting pay of \$48,759. Lastly, the City of Morrow Police Department starts its officers at \$49,884. As you can see, these disparities are neither equitable nor justifiable. Our brave men and women in uniform deserve competitive compensation for their unwavering commitment to keeping Jonesboro safe.

The consequences of this pay discrepancy are grave. First and foremost, it hampers the recruitment of high-quality candidates. Aspiring law enforcement officers are drawn to agencies that offer fair and attractive compensation packages. Unfortunately, the current situation in Jonesboro leaves our department struggling to attract qualified individuals who possess the necessary skills and dedication to serve our community effectively.

Additionally, the retention of experienced officers is equally challenging. Skilled and experienced officers are crucial for maintaining effective law enforcement practices. However, due to the financial strains imposed by inadequate pay, officers may seek employment in neighboring departments where they can better support themselves and their families. This continuous turnover disrupts the continuity, experience, and institutional knowledge necessary for the department to function optimally.

By implementing a 16% pay increase across the board, we can address several critical issues simultaneously.

- First, this increase would bridge the pay gap between Jonesboro Police Department and other law enforcement agencies in the area, making our department a more attractive choice for qualified candidates.
- Second, it would also improve officer retention rates by providing our dedicated and tenured officers with a fair and livable wage that recognizes their invaluable contributions and loyalty to our community.
- Third, increasing pay across all grades will alleviate the issue of pay compression. Pay
 compression occurs when there is a minimal difference in pay between entry-level
 officers and those who have served for several years or have earned supervisory and
 managerial ranks. This situation can demoralize officers and diminish their motivation to
 advance professionally.

A 16% pay increase will create a healthier pay progression that rewards experience, dedication, and expertise, ensuring a more robust and competent police force.

In addition to addressing recruitment and retention challenges, a pay increase will enhance the overall quality of our police force. A competitive salary will attract talented individuals who might have otherwise pursued different agencies or careers. This infusion of fresh talent and diverse perspectives will contribute to the innovation and effectiveness of our law enforcement practices, allowing us to better adapt to emerging threats and serve our community with utmost professionalism.

I kindly request that you give thoughtful consideration to this proposal for a 16% pay increase for the Jonesboro Police Department. Our officers work diligently to safeguard our citizens, often putting their lives on the line in the process. By adequately compensating them, we show our deep appreciation for their service and dedication, and in turn, inspire a greater sense of commitment and pride in their work.

I would be honored to discuss this matter with you further and supply any additional information or data you may require. I firmly believe that by taking decisive action to address this pressing issue, we can ensure a safer, stronger, and more vibrant Jonesboro.

Thank you for your attention to this matter, and I eagerly await your positive response.

Agency recommendation – Approval (with conditions) of Conditional Use application (also contingent upon approval of Variance application); Last year, a zoning verification form for 217 South Main Street for a new townhome community was received, which requires a conditional use permit. The approximately 11.6-acre property currently contains an old house (the Turner estate), some open areas and significant portions of woods. The property is zoned H-2 (Historic District) and only has access to South Main Street. The property is approximately a third of a mile south of the downtown core. There are single-family, duplex residences, and offices across the street. The Norfolk Southern rail line is adjacent to the entire eastern side of the subject property. The proposal is for 90 townhome units with a price range in the low 300s. Several new public streets are proposed with 45-foot-wide rights of way. The same property is also under consideration for variances to certain development standards at the same meeting, which are explained in depth in a separate staff report. Denial of one application would necessitate the denial of the other.

Sec. 86-103. - H-2 historic district.

Purpose of district. The purpose of the H-2 historic district is to provide for office and commercial uses having a minimal impact on existing residential uses. Development and redevelopment in this district is intended to enhance and preserve the historic character of the area, to encourage thoughtful reuse of historic structures for non-residential purposes, to protect existing low-density residential uses in the district, and to promote the goals of the Livable Centers Initiative Study.

- (h) Permitted uses. The following general use classifications are permitted; refer to section 86-204, Table of uses allowed by zoning district, for actual permitted uses:
- (1) Office uses
- (2) Residential uses

Uses similar to the above listed permitted uses, as determined by the city manager and provided in section 86-96, may be permitted unless listed elsewhere as a prohibited use.

(i) Conditional uses. Uses that may be allowed upon finding by Jonesboro City Council that the proposed location and use will not disrupt the desired smaller-scale office and residential environment of the district, and provided the proposed floor area does not exceed 3,500 square feet, are found in section 86-204, Table of uses allowed by zoning district.

More recently, however, the City's Comprehensive Plan was updated, with a stated goal of diversifying and updating the City's housing stock, especially downtown and even in the Historic District. Per the attached documents from the

This is the core commercial and office development center of Jonesboro. The area also includes residential to office conversions and vice versa. This is the area that the city would most like to see reinvestment and development, and there is potential for Transit Oriented Development within the Downtown with the expansion of MARTA bus lines. The Jonesboro LCI Study's City Center Mixed Use District, Arts and Entertainment District, and its Historic District should be used as guidance within this area.

Uses:

- Office
- Residential
- Institutional
- Arts and Entertainment District
- Retail, Including Restaurants
- Historic District

Implementation Measures:

- The Downtown should include a viable mixture of retail, office, services, and residential.
- Design should be pedestrian-oriented, with strong, walkable connections between different uses.
- Enhance the pedestrian-friendly environment by adding sidewalks and creating other pedestrian friendly trail/bike routes linking to neighboring communities and major destinations, such as libraries, neighborhood centers, health facilities, parks, and schools.
- · High standards of architecture and landscaping.

Thus, the City's most current stance is looking at home models other than single-family detached, in an effort to make the most of the City's limited available space by going denser and more vertical. The subject property is one of the few remaining "larger" tracts of undeveloped land in the City. That being said, what would be the best use for this property in the future? A development with several single-family detached dwellings would not be efficient. The overabundance and unsightliness of vehicle repair businesses all along South Main Street has been a problem for the City in the past. A new townhome community with quality architecture in the south part of the City could serve as a catalyst for change in the immediate area, providing more of an "aesthetic" entrance into the City and creating a need for more service oriented businesses, such as restaurants.

Site concerns to consider:

- 1. The Norfolk Southern rail line is an active line, which has the potential to provide significant amounts of noise and vibrations to the townhomes several times a day.
- 2. The 90 units will add more traffic burden to congested Main Street, especially in the morning and evening commute times.
- 3. There is an old grave at the southwestern portion of the property, which will need to be protected, if not legally moved to another property.

Should the Mayor and Council choose to approve the conditional use permit for the townhomes, the following minimum approval conditions shall apply:

- 1. Development shall not exceed the 90 dwelling units shown.
- 2. Final architectural exteriors shall be subject to review and approval by the Design Review Commission and the Historic Preservation Commission.
- 3. A developer's agreement shall be provided to and approved by the Mayor and Council pertaining to architectural and site design elements, including streetlights. Development shall form an HOA.
- 4. Final landscape plan shall be subject to review and approval by the Community Development Director.
- 5. The development shall be subject to the requirements of the Specimen Tree Protection Ordinance, including any necessary tree replacement and / or recompense for removed specimen trees.
- 6. For the greenspace area adjacent to the railroad, existing trees directly adjacent to the railroad line shall be preserved to the maximum extent possible.
- 7. The existing grave on the subject property shall be protected by a 10-foot wide, undisturbed buffer on all sides. Any future relocation of the grave to another property shall follow all State and local guidelines.
- 8. Minimum 4-foot-wide concrete sidewalks shall occur down the entire frontage of the property.
- 9. The standards of Chapter 66, Article VIII Street Light Districts shall apply.
- 10. Townhomes directly adjacent to South Main Street shall face South Main Street.

- 12. Proposed street names are subject to approval by the Mayor and Council and Clayton County GIS.
- 13. Minimum 8-foot tall, solid, acoustic fencing shall be installed along the property line adjacent to the railroad track.

Update for 8.14.23 Meeting:

- The Council had two main areas of concern noise and danger from the adjacent railroad track and how much traffic would the 90 new homes generate along Main Street. Staff has included a thirteenth approval condition concerning the railroad fencing, and the applicant has provided pictures of acoustic fencing intended to be used along the property line adjacent to the railroad track. Also, the applicant has provided a traffic study for the portion of South Main Street to be affected by this development, if approved.
- Additional train noise information: From staff experience, the train goes through Jonesboro, a maximum of three to four times a day, and not always every day. It takes approximately 10 minutes to go through the City and can be heard as far away as Tara Blvd., thereby affecting the whole City. At four times a day at 10 minutes a time, a maximum of 40 minutes (2.8%) of a resident's day is affected by the train noise.
- Additional traffic information: From the traffic study provided, the 90-unit development would generate 41 morning vehicle trips and 50 evening vehicle trips any given day, for a total of 636 vehicle trips any given day. Also from the study, South Main Street generates an average of 10,000 vehicle trips a day. Thus, the new townhome development would mean a 6.4% increase in traffic along South Main Street and would contribute 6% of the average daily total of traffic along South Main Street.

Benefits of approving development

- 1. 90 developed taxable lots versus one developed taxable lot.
- 2. Greater population will aid future SPLOST / LOST revenue allocations.
- 3. Greater population will aid future Census allocations and help prevent a drop in population like in 2020.
- 4. Will help solve the problem of aging housing stock in the City and will diversify types of housing in the City, which were stated goals in the approved Comprehensive Plan.
- 5. Will improve property values in the immediate area.
- 6. Could serve as a catalyst for future quality development in the immediate area.

Fiscal Impact

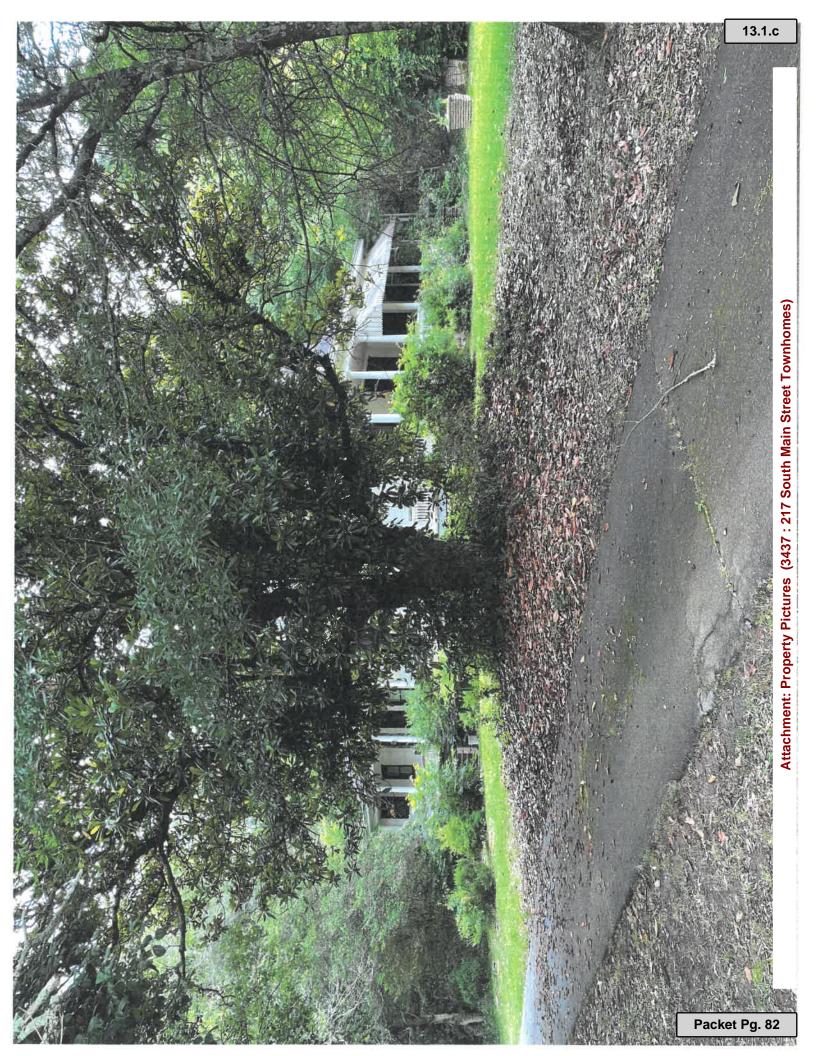

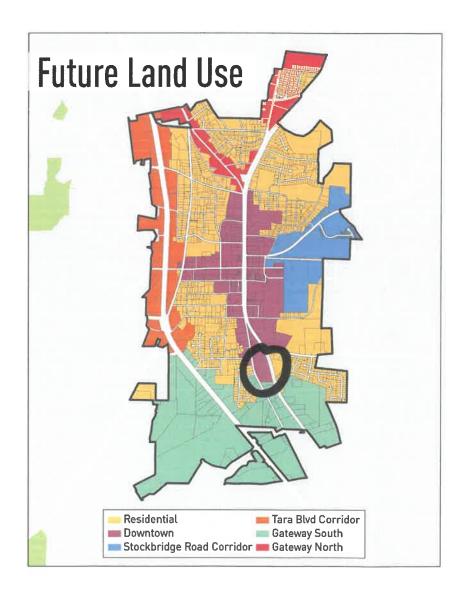




Future Land Use

Summary

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road and the development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

- 1. Existing traffic operations and delays are generally acceptable at both study intersections. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the existing condition.
- 2. Traffic volume growth near the project has been generally positive and modest and this is expected to continue into the future.
- 3. US 19/41 is in the process of being widened in the vicinity from two through lanes to three through lanes per direction.
- 4. With the growth in background traffic volumes, delays will increase moderately in the no-build condition. No mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.
- 5. The proposed townhomes will generate 41 trips in the morning peak hour, 50 trips in the evening peak hour, and 636 daily trips.
- 6. The future analysis with the addition of the proposed townhomes' trips reveals modest increases in delays at the study intersections, but generally continued acceptable operations. The side street approach of South Avenue at South Main Street will drop to LOS E in the future build condition.
- 7. There has been discussion of restricting turn movements at one or both project accesses to right-in/right-out (RIRO). At the north access, prohibiting eastbound through trips from South Avenue into the project will eliminate the LOS E in the p.m. peak hour. However, it would result in undesirable alternative movements, including U-Turns, circuitous movements, and additional vehicle miles of travel on neighborhood roadways. See text on page 13 for a detailed discussion.
- 8. The City Code requires a northbound right turn lane to be added on South Main Street at each project access.
- 9. Should left turns be allowed from South Main Street at each project access, no southbound left turn lanes would be necessary.
- 10. One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided at each project access. Each exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.
- 11. The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards at the project accesses and internal roadways, including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway spacing, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

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Introduction

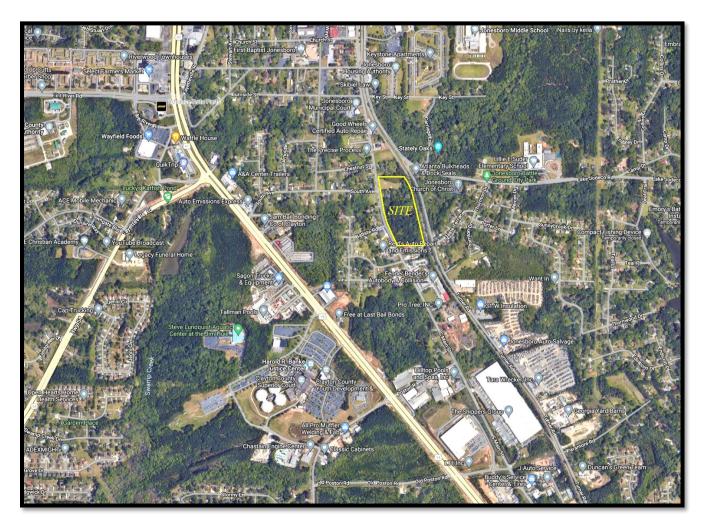


Figure 1 – Site Location Map

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro, Georgia. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road, as shown in Figure 1. The development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road.

The purpose of this traffic impact study is to determine existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed development, project future traffic volumes, assess the impact of the subject development, then develop conclusions and recommendations to mitigate the project traffic impact and ensure safe and efficient existing and future traffic conditions in the vicinity of the project.

Existing Traffic Conditions

Existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed townhomes were assessed. The following is a description of existing transportation facilities, traffic volumes, and intersection operations.

Description of Existing Roadways

South Main Street is a north-south urban minor arterial that parallels railroad tracks and extends through downtown Jonesboro, passes the subject site, then continues to the south, terminating at US 19/41 at Iron Gate Boulevard. The road has one through lane in each direction and a rural cross-section in the vicinity of the site, with no shoulders and no curb-and gutter. The terrain is level to very gently rolling and the posted speed limit is 35 mph. In the vicinity of the site the road serves a mix of residential and commercial land uses. In 2022 the Georgia DOT recorded an Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) volume of 10,000 vehicles per day (vpd) on South Main Street just south of South Avenue.

South Avenue is a two lane local road that connects South Main Street to Tara Boulevard (US 19/41). The road is side street stop sign controlled at a T-intersection at each end. The road has two lanes, the terrain is level, and the posted speed limit is 25 mph. The road serves primarily residential land uses.

Batiste Park Road is a two lane local road with side street stop sign control at its T-intersection at South Main Street. The terrain is level, and the posted speed limit is 25 mph. The road serves primarily residential land uses.

Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Transit Accessibility

There is a sidewalk along the west side of South Main Street from Batiste Park Road to the north. There are no dedicated bicycle lanes along nearby roadways. MARTA bus service is available in downtown Jonesboro and along Tara Boulevard, both a modest walking distance from the proposed development.

Existing Traffic Volumes

Existing full turning movement peak hour traffic volume counts were collected at the following intersections in the vicinity of the site:

- 1. South Main Street at South Avenue
- 2. South Main Street at Batiste Park Road

The locations of the traffic counts are presented in Figure 2.



Figure 2 – Traffic Volume Count Locations

The counts were collected on Wednesday, July 26, 2023, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Area schools were in recess for the summer on the day on which the counts were recorded. Therefore, monthly adjustment factors were applied to the counts. The adjustment factors were obtained from *Georgia's Traffic Monitoring Guide*, 2018, published by the Georgia DOT Office of Transportation Data. South Main Street is an urban minor arterial, which according to Table 7: Factor Groups (in the Georgia DOT report), is a functional classification of 4. South Avenue and Batiste Park Road are urban locals, which is a functional classification of 7. Table 4: 2016 Monthly Factors for July are 1.02 for classification 4 and 1.01 for classification 7. The monthly adjustment factors were applied, as appropriate, to the counted (July 2023) volumes to obtain the existing volumes at each location.

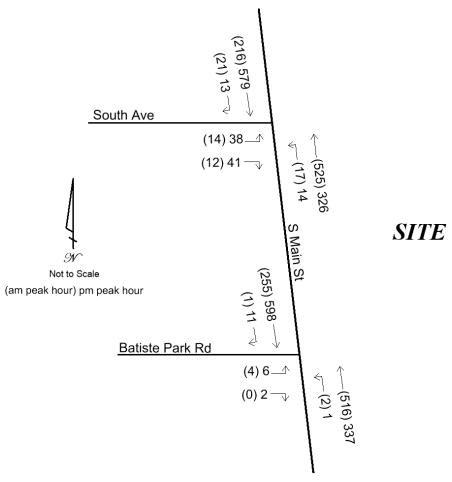


Figure 3 – Existing Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Traffic Volumes

From the intersection turning movement count data, the highest four consecutive 15-minute interval volumes at each intersection, during each time period, were determined. These volumes, adjusted for July, make up the existing weekday a.m. and p.m. peak hour traffic volumes at each intersection and are shown in Figure 3. The raw count data is found in Appendix A.

Existing Intersection Operations

Existing traffic operations were analyzed at the counted intersections using Synchro software, version 12, in accordance with the methodology presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual* 7th Edition (*HCM 7*). This methodology is presented in Appendix B. The analysis was based on the existing volumes, lanes, and control. The results of the analysis are shown in Table 1. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the existing analysis are located in Appendix C. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The existing analysis reveals acceptable operating conditions at the two study intersections. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the existing condition.

No-Build Traffic Condition

A 2028 no-build condition was developed. This represents the traffic volumes, lanes, and control that will exist in the future at the anticipated date of the build-out of the Foxtrail Townhomes, but not including the project's trips. The purpose of the analysis of this condition is to isolate the traffic impacts of the proposed development from background growth in volumes and roadway improvements that are expected to occur in the area while the project is under construction.

No-Build Volumes

In order to develop no-build volumes, background growth factors were developed using historic Georgia DOT 24-hour traffic counts that were collected in this area for the years 2018 through 2022, as shown in Table 2.

Growth in the area has fluctuated. All three count locations saw a decrease from 2019 to 2020, which is attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic. The following year saw strong growth at all locations, but most of that is attributable to a return to pre-pandemic levels. The latest year saw modest positive growth at two of the count locations but a decrease at one location. Overall, the count station closest to the project saw a small positive annual average of 0.8% while the other two count locations saw overall decreases. Based on the growth trends identified in Table 2, and taking the pandemic into consideration, a 2.0% annual growth factor was applied to the existing volumes when projecting the future no-build volumes. The existing traffic volumes were increased by the 2.0% annual growth factor, or 10.4%, to 2028. The results are the 2028 no-build traffic volumes that will be on the roadway network at buildout of the townhomes but not including the townhomes' trips.

Programmed Improvements

Programmed (scheduled and funded) and planned (anticipated) transportation infrastructure projects in the vicinity of the proposed development were researched. The following project was identified that could affect traffic patterns, volumes, or capacity:

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Georgia DOT Project #722030 – This project consists of the widening and reconstruction of 3.32 miles of the US 19/41 existing 4-lane rural section into a 6-lane urban section. The project begins approximately 1,355 feet south of the Tara Road intersection just south of CR 504/ and ends before the intersection of SR 54 at US 19/41. The project lies entirely within Clayton County beginning approximately two miles north of Lovejoy and ending in Jonesboro. The project extends the existing 6-lane section from just south of SR 54 southward until Tara Road where the traffic volumes decrease by 15 percent. The project is under construction.

The 2028 no-build analysis assumes the same lanes and control as the existing analysis at the two South Main Street intersections.

No-Build Intersection Operations

The no-build condition includes the no-build traffic volumes added to the existing intersections with the current lanes and control. The 2028 volumes were entered into the Synchro model and the 2028 no-build traffic operations were analyzed at the study intersections. The results of the no-build analysis are shown in Table 3. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the no-build analysis are located in Appendix D. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The no-build analysis shows a slight deterioration in operations due to anticipated growth in this area, with operations generally comparable to the existing condition. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.

Project Traffic Characteristics

This section describes the anticipated traffic characteristics of the proposed development, including a site description, how much traffic the project will generate, and where that traffic will travel.

Project Description

The development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The site plan is presented in Figure 4.

Trip Generation

Trip generation is an estimate of the number of entering and exiting vehicular trips that will be generated by the proposed development. The volume of traffic that will be generated by the townhomes was calculated using the equations in the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) *Trip Generation Manual, 11th Edition* (the current edition). ITE Land Use 215 – Single Family Attached Housing was chosen as representative of the project. The trip generation is summarized in Table 4.

The proposed townhomes will generate 41 trips in the morning peak hour, 50 trips in the evening peak hour, and 636 daily trips.

Trip Distribution and Assignment

The trip distribution percentages indicate what proportion of the project's trips will travel to and from various directions. The trip distribution percentages for the townhomes were developed based on the locations and proximity of likely trip origins and destinations including regional employment centers, retail and offices in the area, nearby schools, other regional trip attractors, and the major routes of travel in the area, most notably US 19/41.

The new project trips, shown in Table 4, were assigned to the roadway network based on the distribution percentages. The assignment of trips by turning movement will be affected by any turn movement restrictions imposed at each project access. The site plan shows the southern access to be restricted to right-in/right-out (RIRO) and the northern access to allow full turn movements. Discussions with the City indicate that the northern access may also be designed as RIRO. Prohibiting left turns in and out at both accesses will create undesirable U-

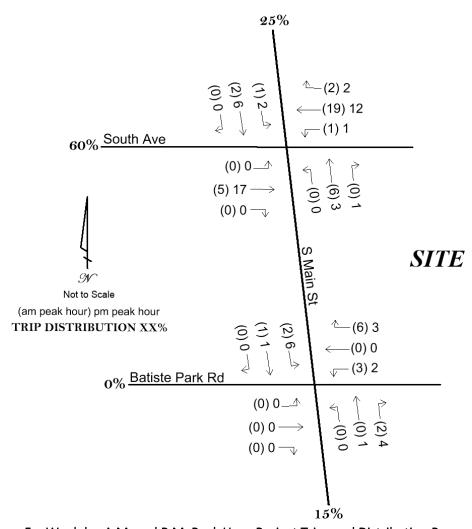


Figure 5 – Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Project Trips and Distribution Percentages

Turns, circuitous trips, and additional vehicle-miles of travel. This study assumes full movements will be allowed at each access, in order to provide an understanding of the unconstrained desired travel patterns and volumes of project trips. Turn restrictions would alter some of the turn movement volumes. The trip distribution percentages and the a.m. and p.m. peak hour trips expected to be generated by the proposed townhomes are shown in Figure 5.

Future Traffic Condition

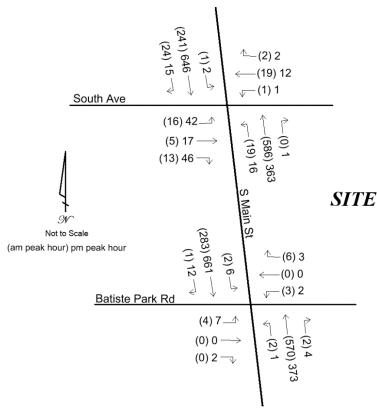


Figure 6 – Future Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Volumes

The future volumes consist of the no-build volumes plus the trips that will be generated by the proposed townhomes. The future volumes are shown in Figure 6.

Auxiliary Lane Requirements at Project Accesses

The City of Jonesboro Code of Ordinances, Chapter 44 – Land Development, Article IV – Subdivisions and Land Development, Table 2 – Plat and Plan Requirements lists "decel lane" as a requirement. Therefore, a northbound right turn lane is required by Code on South Main Street at each project access. This requirements applies whether the accesses are configured to allow full movements or RIRO.

The Code does not provide an engineering standard to determine the need for left turn lanes. Should one or both project accesses be restricted to RIRO, then no left turn lane would be needed at that access. However, should entering left turns be permitted, in order to make the determination for the need for a southbound left turn lane at each project accesses on South Main Street, the Georgia DOT standards for determining the need for these auxiliary lanes, as set forth in their *Regulations for Driveway and Encroachment Control* (Driveway Manual), revision 5.4 dated 2/10/2023, were reviewed. The left turn lane analysis was based on *Driveway Manual* Table 4-7a, Minimum Volumes Requiring Left Turn Lanes, which is shown below as Table 5.

The 2022 AADT on South Main Street was 10,000 vpd which is above the 6,000 vpd threshold for a two lane road. For a two lane road with an AADT greater than 6,000 vpd and a posted speed limit of 35 mph, the left turn volume above which a left turn lane is required is 200 left turn vehicles (LTV) per day. The projected LTV at the north access is 32 LTV and at the south access it is 48 LTV. These left turn volumes are both well below the 200 LTV threshold and, therefore no southbound left turn lane is required on South Main Street at either project access, should left turns be permitted at both accesses.

One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided at each access. Each exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.

An operational analysis was performed for the anticipated future project build-out at the study intersections including the project accesses. Table 6 presents the results of the future analysis. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the future analysis are located in Appendix E. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The future analysis with the addition of the proposed townhomes' trips reveals continued acceptable traffic operations and delays at most locations. The eastbound approach of South Avenue at South Main Street will drop to LOS E in the p.m. peak hour. At this intersection, because the side street failing delay is LOS E (and not LOS F) and only for one approach during one time period, a change in control is not recommended based on the delay calculations.

As noted above, turn restrictions may be placed on one or both of the project accesses, making them RIRO. It is noted that both exiting approaches from the Foxtrail project will operate acceptably with full turning movements allowed. Prohibiting east-west through movements between South Avenue and the north project access, across South Main Street, would reduce the eastbound delay and eliminate the LOS E. However, those vehicles will still need to find a route between the project and US 19/41 and turn movement restrictions can be expected to result in U-Turns, circuitous trips, and additional vehicle miles of travel in the neighborhood, as discussed below:

With RIRO constraints at both accesses, exiting trips from the project to US 19/41 would turn right from the south access then turn left at South Avenue, shifting the delay created by the project's trips from within the site to the northbound traffic on South Main Street. Trips to US 19/41 from the north access would exit turning right, then turn left at Chestnut Street, then use Cloud Street to South Avenue. This again shifts delay from within the site to northbound South Main Street and adds more travel distance through the neighborhood. Inbound trips from US 19/41, instead of traveling straight across South Main Street into the project, would be forced to turn right from South Avenue at South Main Street, then make their way into the site. However, they could not then turn left into the south project access because that would be RIRO too. So they would pass the site, find an opportunity to U-Turn, then travel back north to turn right into the site. This adds additional vehicle miles of circuitous travel and undesirable U-Turns. It is possible that a few trips between the project and US 19/41 would find alternate routes and traffic calming could be added to South Avenue to deter "through" traffic. This would impede other through trips and neighborhood trips, as well. However, because South Avenue is the logical direct connection between South Main Street and US 19/41, that will be the preferred path, even with the RIRO restrictions. The consequences of the RIRO restrictions may be more undesirable than allowing the full movement operations at each project access. No additional mitigation, other than the northbound right turn lanes required by Code at the project accesses, is identified as a consequence of the proposed townhomes.

The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards at the project accesses and internal roadways, including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway spacing, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Conclusions and Recommendations

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road and the development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

- 1. Existing traffic operations and delays are generally acceptable at both study intersections. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the existing condition.
- 2. Traffic volume growth near the project has been generally positive and modest and this is expected to continue into the future.
- 3. US 19/41 is in the process of being widened in the vicinity from two through lanes to three through lanes per direction.
- 4. With the growth in background traffic volumes, delays will increase moderately in the no-build condition. No mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.
- 5. The proposed townhomes will generate 41 trips in the morning peak hour, 50 trips in the evening peak hour, and 636 daily trips.
- 6. The future analysis with the addition of the proposed townhomes' trips reveals modest increases in delays at the study intersections, but generally continued acceptable operations. The side street approach of South Avenue at South Main Street will drop to LOS E in the future build condition.
- 7. There has been discussion of restricting turn movements at one or both project accesses to right-in/right-out (RIRO). At the north access, prohibiting eastbound through trips from South Avenue into the project will eliminate the LOS E in the p.m. peak hour. However, it would result in undesirable alternative movements, including U-Turns, circuitous movements, and additional vehicle miles of travel on neighborhood roadways. See text on page 13 for a detailed discussion.
- 8. The City Code requires a northbound right turn lane to be added on South Main Street at each project access.
- 9. Should left turns be allowed from South Main Street at each project access, no southbound left turn lanes would be necessary.
- 10. One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided at each project access. Each exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.

11. The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards at the project accesses and internal roadways, including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway spacing, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Appendix B

Intersection Analysis Methodology

Intersection Analysis Methodology

The methodology used for evaluating traffic operations at intersections is presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual*, 7th Edition (HCM 7). Synchro 12 software, which emulates the HCM 7 methodology, was used for all analyses. The following is an overview of the methodology employed for the analysis of signalized intersections and roundabouts and stop-sign controlled (unsignalized) intersections. Levels of service (LOS) are assigned letters A through F. LOS A indicates operations with very low control delay while LOS F describes operations with high control delay. LOS F is considered to be unacceptable by most drivers, while LOS E is typically considered to be the limit of acceptable delay.

Signalized Intersections and Roundabouts — Level of service for a signalized intersection and a roundabout is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. For signalized intersections and roundabouts, a composite intersection level of service is determined. The thresholds for each level of service are higher for signalized intersections and roundabouts than for unsignalized intersections. This is attributable to a variety of factors including expectation and acceptance of higher delays at signals/roundabouts, and the fact that drivers can relax when waiting at a signal as opposed to having to remain attentive as they proceed through the unsignalized intersection. The level of service criteria for signalized intersections and roundabouts are shown in Table A.

Unsignalized Intersections – Level of service for an unsignalized intersection is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. Control delay is that portion of delay attributable to the control device and includes initial deceleration delay, queue move-up time, stopped delay, and final acceleration delay. The delays at unsignalized intersections are based on gap acceptance theory, factoring in availability of gaps, usefulness of the gaps, and the priority of right-of-way given to each traffic stream. The level of service criteria for unsignalized intersections are presented in Table B.

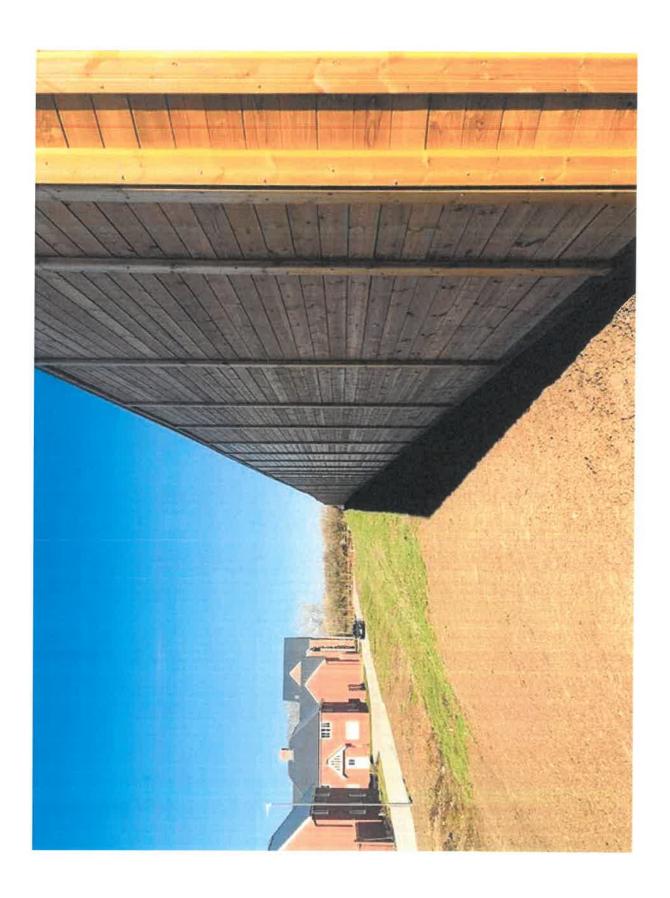

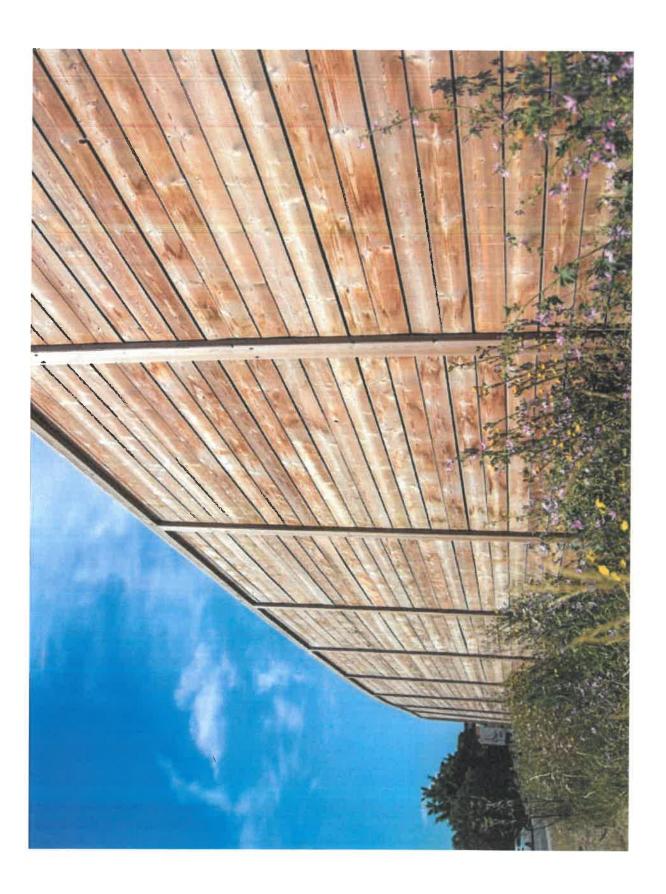

Summary & Background

Agency recommendation – Approval (with conditions) of Variance application (also contingent upon approval of Conditional Use application); Last year, a zoning verification form for 217 South Main Street for a new townhome community was received, which requires a conditional use permit. The approximately 11.6-acre property currently contains an old house (the Turner estate), some open areas and significant portions of woods. The property is zoned H-2 (Historic District) and only has access to South Main Street. The property is approximately a third of a mile south of the downtown core. There are single-family, duplex residences, and offices across the street. The Norfolk Southern rail line is adjacent to the entire eastern side of the subject property. The proposal is for 90 townhome units with a price range in the low 300s. Several new public streets are proposed with 45-foot-wide rights of way. The same property is also under consideration for variances to certain development standards at the same meeting, which are explained in depth in this staff report. Denial of one application would necessitate the denial of the other.

Sec. 86-202. - Townhouses and condominiums.

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, R-M, H-1, H-2, and MX districts:

The standards of the R-A district shall control development of townhouses and condominiums.

The R-A development standards were updated in February 2022:

Sec. 86-100. - R-A single family attached residential district regulations.

The district is intended to foster housing options for households seeking high quality home ownership in park like setting featuring attractive architectural styles and building materials. (4) Minimum front yard: 20 feet 3 Per note 3 below, South Main Street is a collector road, thus requiring a foot front yard setback. This is complied with, as the units directly along South Main Street show a 25-foot setback off the right-of-way.

- (5) Minimum side yard at perimeter of tract: 25 feet Complied with
- (6) Minimum rear yard: 35 feet Complied with, except for townhomes directly adjacent to South Main Street; Variance requested for 25-foot rear setback instead of 35-foot rear setback for these lots. mentioned Old Ivy Townhomes had nearly all of its new units get variance approved for front facing garage because the older units with rear garages and rear alleys did not prove to work really well. This site may be narrow to have a network of alleys and streets in the same area, and a network of alleys in addition to the streets proposed would contribute to the overall impervious cover on the property.

In summary, there are five variances to consider. In the concept plan presented to staff before the application, there were twice that many variances, so the design has improved significantly in terms of density and layout.

- (6) Minimum rear yard: 35 feet Complied with, except for townhomes directly adjacent to South Main Street; Variance requested for 25-foot rear setback instead of 35-foot rear setback for these lots. This technically requires a variance, but these units will have front facing facades that face South Main Street, so the rear setback and front setback are reversed. However, the rear setback is still 35 feet regardless of which way the unit is facing and none of the units (blue) directly adjacent to South Main Street show a 35-foot rear setback. They show a 20-foot rear setback, similar to the 20-foot front setback of the interior units. Thus, they would all have the same driveway length. Staff does not have a problem with this.
- (10) Maximum number of units per development: 64 Requesting 90 (26 units (40%) more than maximum); variance required. Ultimately, do the Mayor and Council have a problem with 26 more units on the property? The maximum density is still not exceeded, and the units are mostly spread out, not in very long rows. Many of the units could not be clearly seen from South Main Street or adjacent properties.
- (1) Off-street parking shall be provided as specified in article XIII of this chapter. Each dwelling shall provide for a minimum two-car garage and a minimum 18-foot-wide concrete driveway. This allows two standard size vehicles to be parked side-by-side on the driveway, based on our minimum 9-foot-wide parking space in the City.

Will the quality of life in these units, based on the presentation provided, be significantly negatively affected by this?

If permitted, front-loaded driveways shall be scored or finished with decorative treatment, subject to approval by the Design Review Commission, and, if applicable, the Historic Preservation Commission. Will the quality of life in these units, based on the presentation provided, be significantly negatively affected by this? Again, none of the garages would face South Main Street, but you would see alleyways between the houses. Also, who would maintain the paving on

A new townhome community with quality architecture in the south part of the City could serve as a catalyst for change in the immediate area, providing more of an "aesthetic" entrance into the City and creating a need for more service oriented businesses, such as restaurants.

Site concerns to consider:

- 1. The Norfolk Southern rail line is an active line, which has the potential to provide significant amounts of noise and vibrations to the townhomes several times a day.
- 2. The 90 units will add more traffic burden to congested Main Street, especially in the morning and evening commute times.
- 3. There is an old grave at the southwestern portion of the property, which will need to be protected, if not legally moved to another property.

Should the Mayor and Council choose to approve the variances for the townhomes, the following minimum approval conditions shall apply (in addition to the approval conditions for the conditional use permit):

- 1. No garage doors shall face South Main Street.
- 2. All 24-foot-wide units shall have minimum 18-foot-wide concrete driveways.
- 3. All units shall have minimum 30-foot-long concrete driveways, from garage door edge to back of curb.

Update for 8.14.23 Meeting:

- The Council had two main areas of concern noise and danger from the adjacent railroad track and how much traffic would the 90 new homes generate along Main Street. Staff has included a thirteenth approval condition on the conditional use application concerning the railroad fencing, and the applicant has provided pictures of acoustic fencing intended to be used along the property line adjacent to the railroad track. Also, the applicant has provided a traffic study for the portion of South Main Street to be affected by this development, if approved.
- Additional train noise information: From staff experience, the train goes through Jonesboro, a maximum of three to four times a day, and not always every day. It takes approximately 10 minutes to go through the City and can be heard as far away as Tara Blvd., thereby affecting the whole City. At four times a day at 10 minutes a time, a maximum of 40 minutes (2.8%) of a resident's day is affected by the train noise.
- Additional traffic information: From the traffic study provided, the 90-unit development would generate 41 morning vehicle trips and 50 evening vehicle trips any given day, for a total of 636 vehicle trips any given day. Also from the study, South Main Street generates an average of 10,000 vehicle trips a day. Thus, the new townhome development would mean a 6.4% increase in traffic along South Main Street and would contribute 6% of the average daily total of traffic along South Main Street.

Benefits of approving development

- 1. 90 developed taxable lots versus one developed taxable lot.
- 2. Greater population will aid future SPLOST / LOST revenue allocations.
- 3. Greater population will aid future Census allocations and help prevent a drop in population like in 2020.
- 4. Will help solve the problem of aging housing stock in the City and will diversify types of housing in the City, which were stated goals in the approved Comprehensive Plan.
- 5. Will improve property values in the immediate area.
- 6. Could serve as a catalyst for future quality development in the immediate area.

Summary

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road and the development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

- 1. Existing traffic operations and delays are generally acceptable at both study intersections. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the existing condition.
- 2. Traffic volume growth near the project has been generally positive and modest and this is expected to continue into the future.
- 3. US 19/41 is in the process of being widened in the vicinity from two through lanes to three through lanes per direction.
- 4. With the growth in background traffic volumes, delays will increase moderately in the no-build condition. No mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.
- 5. The proposed townhomes will generate 41 trips in the morning peak hour, 50 trips in the evening peak hour, and 636 daily trips.
- 6. The future analysis with the addition of the proposed townhomes' trips reveals modest increases in delays at the study intersections, but generally continued acceptable operations. The side street approach of South Avenue at South Main Street will drop to LOS E in the future build condition.
- 7. There has been discussion of restricting turn movements at one or both project accesses to right-in/right-out (RIRO). At the north access, prohibiting eastbound through trips from South Avenue into the project will eliminate the LOS E in the p.m. peak hour. However, it would result in undesirable alternative movements, including U-Turns, circuitous movements, and additional vehicle miles of travel on neighborhood roadways. See text on page 13 for a detailed discussion.
- 8. The City Code requires a northbound right turn lane to be added on South Main Street at each project access.
- 9. Should left turns be allowed from South Main Street at each project access, no southbound left turn lanes would be necessary.
- 10. One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided at each project access. Each exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.
- 11. The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards at the project accesses and internal roadways, including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway spacing, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Introduction

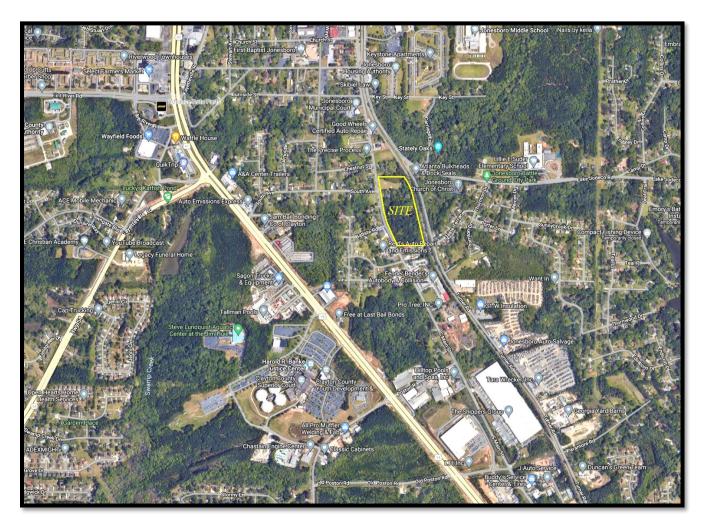


Figure 1 – Site Location Map

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro, Georgia. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road, as shown in Figure 1. The development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road.

The purpose of this traffic impact study is to determine existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed development, project future traffic volumes, assess the impact of the subject development, then develop conclusions and recommendations to mitigate the project traffic impact and ensure safe and efficient existing and future traffic conditions in the vicinity of the project.

Existing Traffic Conditions

Existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed townhomes were assessed. The following is a description of existing transportation facilities, traffic volumes, and intersection operations.

Description of Existing Roadways

South Main Street is a north-south urban minor arterial that parallels railroad tracks and extends through downtown Jonesboro, passes the subject site, then continues to the south, terminating at US 19/41 at Iron Gate Boulevard. The road has one through lane in each direction and a rural cross-section in the vicinity of the site, with no shoulders and no curb-and gutter. The terrain is level to very gently rolling and the posted speed limit is 35 mph. In the vicinity of the site the road serves a mix of residential and commercial land uses. In 2022 the Georgia DOT recorded an Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) volume of 10,000 vehicles per day (vpd) on South Main Street just south of South Avenue.

South Avenue is a two lane local road that connects South Main Street to Tara Boulevard (US 19/41). The road is side street stop sign controlled at a T-intersection at each end. The road has two lanes, the terrain is level, and the posted speed limit is 25 mph. The road serves primarily residential land uses.

Batiste Park Road is a two lane local road with side street stop sign control at its T-intersection at South Main Street. The terrain is level, and the posted speed limit is 25 mph. The road serves primarily residential land uses.

Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Transit Accessibility

There is a sidewalk along the west side of South Main Street from Batiste Park Road to the north. There are no dedicated bicycle lanes along nearby roadways. MARTA bus service is available in downtown Jonesboro and along Tara Boulevard, both a modest walking distance from the proposed development.

Existing Traffic Volumes

Existing full turning movement peak hour traffic volume counts were collected at the following intersections in the vicinity of the site:

- 1. South Main Street at South Avenue
- 2. South Main Street at Batiste Park Road

The locations of the traffic counts are presented in Figure 2.



Figure 2 – Traffic Volume Count Locations

The counts were collected on Wednesday, July 26, 2023, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Area schools were in recess for the summer on the day on which the counts were recorded. Therefore, monthly adjustment factors were applied to the counts. The adjustment factors were obtained from *Georgia's Traffic Monitoring Guide*, 2018, published by the Georgia DOT Office of Transportation Data. South Main Street is an urban minor arterial, which according to Table 7: Factor Groups (in the Georgia DOT report), is a functional classification of 4. South Avenue and Batiste Park Road are urban locals, which is a functional classification of 7. Table 4: 2016 Monthly Factors for July are 1.02 for classification 4 and 1.01 for classification 7. The monthly adjustment factors were applied, as appropriate, to the counted (July 2023) volumes to obtain the existing volumes at each location.

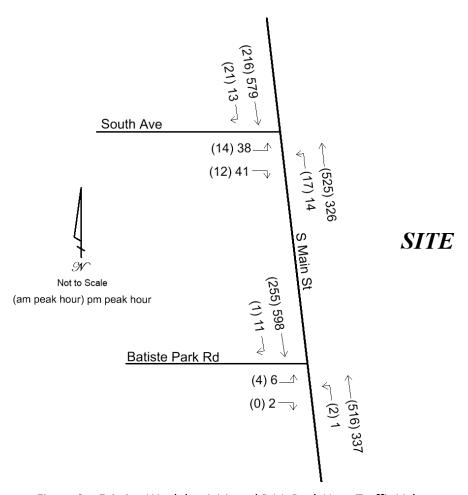


Figure 3 – Existing Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Traffic Volumes

From the intersection turning movement count data, the highest four consecutive 15-minute interval volumes at each intersection, during each time period, were determined. These volumes, adjusted for July, make up the existing weekday a.m. and p.m. peak hour traffic volumes at each intersection and are shown in Figure 3. The raw count data is found in Appendix A.

Existing Intersection Operations

Existing traffic operations were analyzed at the counted intersections using Synchro software, version 12, in accordance with the methodology presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual* 7th Edition (*HCM 7*). This methodology is presented in Appendix B. The analysis was based on the existing volumes, lanes, and control. The results of the analysis are shown in Table 1. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the existing analysis are located in Appendix C. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The existing analysis reveals acceptable operating conditions at the two study intersections. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the existing condition.

No-Build Traffic Condition

A 2028 no-build condition was developed. This represents the traffic volumes, lanes, and control that will exist in the future at the anticipated date of the build-out of the Foxtrail Townhomes, but not including the project's trips. The purpose of the analysis of this condition is to isolate the traffic impacts of the proposed development from background growth in volumes and roadway improvements that are expected to occur in the area while the project is under construction.

No-Build Volumes

In order to develop no-build volumes, background growth factors were developed using historic Georgia DOT 24-hour traffic counts that were collected in this area for the years 2018 through 2022, as shown in Table 2.

Growth in the area has fluctuated. All three count locations saw a decrease from 2019 to 2020, which is attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic. The following year saw strong growth at all locations, but most of that is attributable to a return to pre-pandemic levels. The latest year saw modest positive growth at two of the count locations but a decrease at one location. Overall, the count station closest to the project saw a small positive annual average of 0.8% while the other two count locations saw overall decreases. Based on the growth trends identified in Table 2, and taking the pandemic into consideration, a 2.0% annual growth factor was applied to the existing volumes when projecting the future no-build volumes. The existing traffic volumes were increased by the 2.0% annual growth factor, or 10.4%, to 2028. The results are the 2028 no-build traffic volumes that will be on the roadway network at buildout of the townhomes but not including the townhomes' trips.

Programmed Improvements

Programmed (scheduled and funded) and planned (anticipated) transportation infrastructure projects in the vicinity of the proposed development were researched. The following project was identified that could affect traffic patterns, volumes, or capacity:

Georgia DOT Project #722030 – This project consists of the widening and reconstruction of 3.32 miles of the US 19/41 existing 4-lane rural section into a 6-lane urban section. The project begins approximately 1,355 feet south of the Tara Road intersection just south of CR 504/ and ends before the intersection of SR 54 at US 19/41. The project lies entirely within Clayton County beginning approximately two miles north of Lovejoy and ending in Jonesboro. The project extends the existing 6-lane section from just south of SR 54 southward until Tara Road where the traffic volumes decrease by 15 percent. The project is under construction.

The 2028 no-build analysis assumes the same lanes and control as the existing analysis at the two South Main Street intersections.

No-Build Intersection Operations

The no-build condition includes the no-build traffic volumes added to the existing intersections with the current lanes and control. The 2028 volumes were entered into the Synchro model and the 2028 no-build traffic operations were analyzed at the study intersections. The results of the no-build analysis are shown in Table 3. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the no-build analysis are located in Appendix D. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The no-build analysis shows a slight deterioration in operations due to anticipated growth in this area, with operations generally comparable to the existing condition. Therefore, no mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.

Project Traffic Characteristics

This section describes the anticipated traffic characteristics of the proposed development, including a site description, how much traffic the project will generate, and where that traffic will travel.

Project Description

The development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The site plan is presented in Figure 4.

Trip Generation

Trip generation is an estimate of the number of entering and exiting vehicular trips that will be generated by the proposed development. The volume of traffic that will be generated by the townhomes was calculated using the equations in the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) *Trip Generation Manual, 11th Edition* (the current edition). ITE Land Use 215 – Single Family Attached Housing was chosen as representative of the project. The trip generation is summarized in Table 4.

The proposed townhomes will generate 41 trips in the morning peak hour, 50 trips in the evening peak hour, and 636 daily trips.

Trip Distribution and Assignment

The trip distribution percentages indicate what proportion of the project's trips will travel to and from various directions. The trip distribution percentages for the townhomes were developed based on the locations and proximity of likely trip origins and destinations including regional employment centers, retail and offices in the area, nearby schools, other regional trip attractors, and the major routes of travel in the area, most notably US 19/41.

The new project trips, shown in Table 4, were assigned to the roadway network based on the distribution percentages. The assignment of trips by turning movement will be affected by any turn movement restrictions imposed at each project access. The site plan shows the southern access to be restricted to right-in/right-out (RIRO) and the northern access to allow full turn movements. Discussions with the City indicate that the northern access may also be designed as RIRO. Prohibiting left turns in and out at both accesses will create undesirable U-

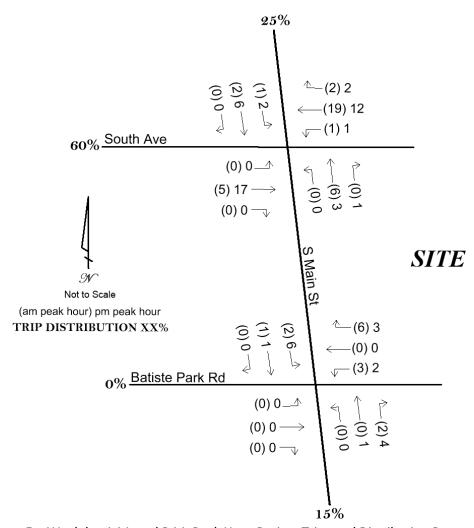


Figure 5 – Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Project Trips and Distribution Percentages

Turns, circuitous trips, and additional vehicle-miles of travel. This study assumes full movements will be allowed at each access, in order to provide an understanding of the unconstrained desired travel patterns and volumes of project trips. Turn restrictions would alter some of the turn movement volumes. The trip distribution percentages and the a.m. and p.m. peak hour trips expected to be generated by the proposed townhomes are shown in Figure 5.

Future Traffic Condition

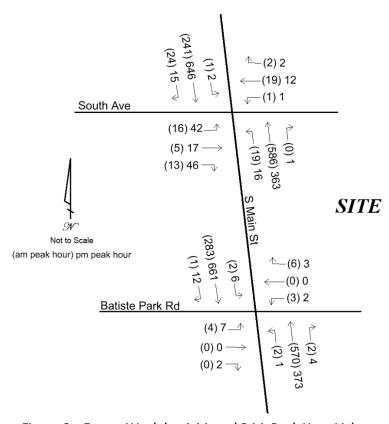


Figure 6 – Future Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Volumes

The future volumes consist of the no-build volumes plus the trips that will be generated by the proposed townhomes. The future volumes are shown in Figure 6.

Auxiliary Lane Requirements at Project Accesses

The City of Jonesboro Code of Ordinances, Chapter 44 – Land Development, Article IV – Subdivisions and Land Development, Table 2 – Plat and Plan Requirements lists "decel lane" as a requirement. Therefore, a northbound right turn lane is required by Code on South Main Street at each project access. This requirements applies whether the accesses are configured to allow full movements or RIRO.

The Code does not provide an engineering standard to determine the need for left turn lanes. Should one or both project accesses be restricted to RIRO, then no left turn lane would be needed at that access. However, should entering left turns be permitted, in order to make the determination for the need for a southbound left turn lane at each project accesses on South Main Street, the Georgia DOT standards for determining the need for these auxiliary lanes, as set forth in their *Regulations for Driveway and Encroachment Control* (Driveway Manual), revision 5.4 dated 2/10/2023, were reviewed. The left turn lane analysis was based on *Driveway Manual* Table 4-7a, Minimum Volumes Requiring Left Turn Lanes, which is shown below as Table 5.

The 2022 AADT on South Main Street was 10,000 vpd which is above the 6,000 vpd threshold for a two lane road. For a two lane road with an AADT greater than 6,000 vpd and a posted speed limit of 35 mph, the left turn volume above which a left turn lane is required is 200 left turn vehicles (LTV) per day. The projected LTV at the north access is 32 LTV and at the south access it is 48 LTV. These left turn volumes are both well below the 200 LTV threshold and, therefore no southbound left turn lane is required on South Main Street at either project access, should left turns be permitted at both accesses.

One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided at each access. Each exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.

Future Intersection Operations

An operational analysis was performed for the anticipated future project build-out at the study intersections including the project accesses. Table 6 presents the results of the future analysis. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the future analysis are located in Appendix E. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The future analysis with the addition of the proposed townhomes' trips reveals continued acceptable traffic operations and delays at most locations. The eastbound approach of South Avenue at South Main Street will drop to LOS E in the p.m. peak hour. At this intersection, because the side street failing delay is LOS E (and not LOS F) and only for one approach during one time period, a change in control is not recommended based on the delay calculations.

As noted above, turn restrictions may be placed on one or both of the project accesses, making them RIRO. It is noted that both exiting approaches from the Foxtrail project will operate acceptably with full turning movements allowed. Prohibiting east-west through movements between South Avenue and the north project access, across South Main Street, would reduce the eastbound delay and eliminate the LOS E. However, those vehicles will still need to find a route between the project and US 19/41 and turn movement restrictions can be expected to result in U-Turns, circuitous trips, and additional vehicle miles of travel in the neighborhood, as discussed below:

With RIRO constraints at both accesses, exiting trips from the project to US 19/41 would turn right from the south access then turn left at South Avenue, shifting the delay created by the project's trips from within the site to the northbound traffic on South Main Street. Trips to US 19/41 from the north access would exit turning right, then turn left at Chestnut Street, then use Cloud Street to South Avenue. This again shifts delay from within the site to northbound South Main Street and adds more travel distance through the neighborhood. Inbound trips from US 19/41, instead of traveling straight across South Main Street into the project, would be forced to turn right from South Avenue at South Main Street, then make their way into the site. However, they could not then turn left into the south project access because that would be RIRO too. So they would pass the site, find an opportunity to U-Turn, then travel back north to turn right into the site. This adds additional vehicle miles of circuitous travel and undesirable U-Turns. It is possible that a few trips between the project and US 19/41 would find alternate routes and traffic calming could be added to South Avenue to deter "through" traffic. This would impede other through trips and neighborhood trips, as well. However, because South Avenue is the logical direct connection between South Main Street and US 19/41, that will be the preferred path, even with the RIRO

restrictions. The consequences of the RIRO restrictions may be more undesirable than allowing the full movement operations at each project access. No additional mitigation, other than the northbound right turn lanes required by Code at the project accesses, is identified as a consequence of the proposed townhomes.

The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards at the project accesses and internal roadways, including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway spacing, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Conclusions and Recommendations

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential townhome development in the City of Jonesboro. The site is located along the east side of South Main Street at South Avenue and Batiste Park Road and the development will consist of 90 attached residential townhomes. The project will be served by two vehicular accesses on South Main Street, one aligning with South Avenue and one aligning with Batiste Park Road. The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

Appendix B

Intersection Analysis Methodology

Intersection Analysis Methodology

The methodology used for evaluating traffic operations at intersections is presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual*, 7th Edition (HCM 7). Synchro 12 software, which emulates the HCM 7 methodology, was used for all analyses. The following is an overview of the methodology employed for the analysis of signalized intersections and roundabouts and stop-sign controlled (unsignalized) intersections. Levels of service (LOS) are assigned letters A through F. LOS A indicates operations with very low control delay while LOS F describes operations with high control delay. LOS F is considered to be unacceptable by most drivers, while LOS E is typically considered to be the limit of acceptable delay.

Signalized Intersections and Roundabouts — Level of service for a signalized intersection and a roundabout is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. For signalized intersections and roundabouts, a composite intersection level of service is determined. The thresholds for each level of service are higher for signalized intersections and roundabouts than for unsignalized intersections. This is attributable to a variety of factors including expectation and acceptance of higher delays at signals/roundabouts, and the fact that drivers can relax when waiting at a signal as opposed to having to remain attentive as they proceed through the unsignalized intersection. The level of service criteria for signalized intersections and roundabouts are shown in Table A.

Unsignalized Intersections – Level of service for an unsignalized intersection is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. Control delay is that portion of delay attributable to the control device and includes initial deceleration delay, queue move-up time, stopped delay, and final acceleration delay. The delays at unsignalized intersections are based on gap acceptance theory, factoring in availability of gaps, usefulness of the gaps, and the priority of right-of-way given to each traffic stream. The level of service criteria for unsignalized intersections are presented in Table B.

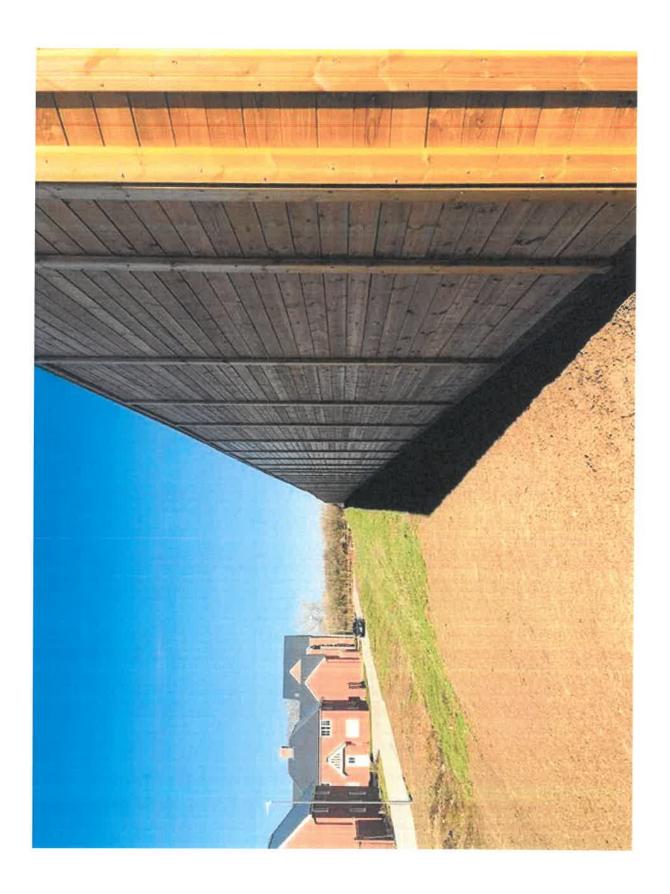

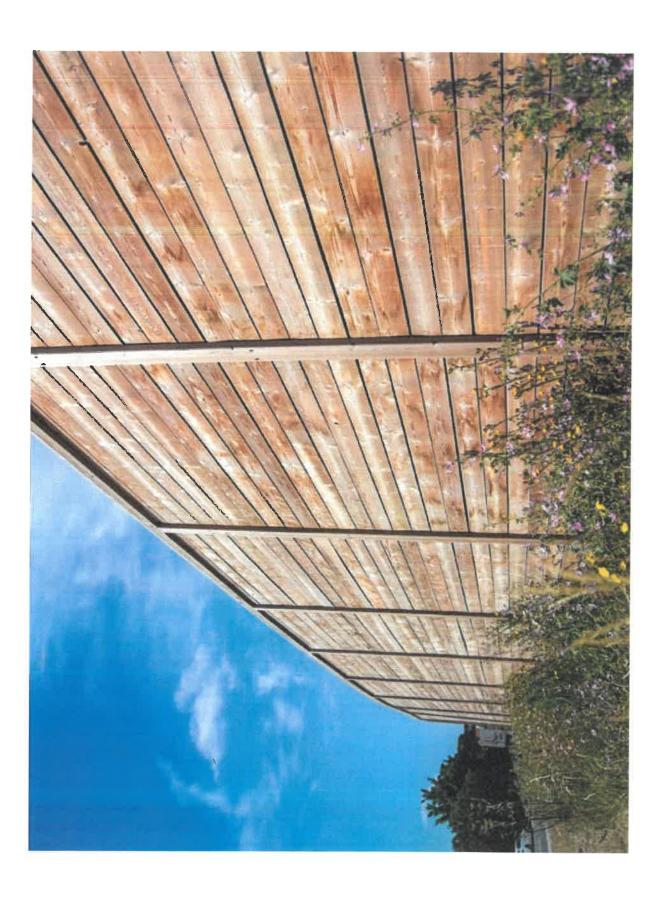

Summary & Background

Agency recommendation – **Approval of revised Conditional Use application, with conditions;** In February 2023, the same applicant was denied for a daycare at the same property. This is a reconsideration of the use (approved June 2023) with an improved site plan and evacuation plan. Zoned O&I (Office-Institutional), there is already a functional building and paved parking lot there. There are currently access drives to both College Street and Fayetteville Road. The most recent active use was a doctor's office.

In September 2019, the Council approved another daycare at the same property by another applicant, but the development did not come to pass. The approval conditions for that daycare were as follows:

- 1. Driveway exiting onto Fayetteville Road right turn only.
- 2. Install a privacy fence for the fence portions facing Fayetteville Road, as specified on the diagram, minimum 4 feet in height.

The Council also required an evacuation plan for the daycare in 2019, due to the building being less than 500 feet from the potentially hazardous gas station and the Nex Air company. The current applicant has now provided a specific evacuation plan (see enclosed), exiting the children out the back driveway to College Street and ultimately West Mill Street to Shiloh Baptist Church (The church has given permission for this.)

Recently, the creator of the 2019 daycare site plan that was approved by Council granted permission to use the same site plan design for this application. Therefore, if approved, the day care would use the same site plan for the playground and the traffic circulation. The dangerous new traffic proposal that was partially responsible for getting the February 2023 daycare application denied is no longer applicable. The site plan now used has more than adequate playground area.

Per the applicant, there would be 60 to 75 children participating daily.

(Note: The site plan requirements on page 3 of the application are typically for new developments that involve rezonings.)

The City Code provides a definition for "day care center":

Any place operated by a person, society, agency, corporation, institution, or group wherein are received, for pay, for group care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody 19 or more children under 18 years of age.

The standards for daycares focus on the "Bright From the Start" program standards for children:

- (1) Every child day care facility shall provide proof of an approved Georgia Department of Human Services registration certificate prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and shall conform to all applicable local, state, and federal standards, including Bright From the Start current program standards, O.C.G.A. Chapter 591-1-1. The applicant will provide the certificate.
 - An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:
 - (a) Size requirements.
 - (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed capacity for children. At 60 to 75 children planned daily, this would equal 100 x (75 divided by three) = 100 x 25 = minimum 2500 square foot outdoor play area required. The site plan provides over 4500 square feet of playground area.
 - (2) For Centers with a licensed capacity of <u>18 or fewer</u> children first licensed after April 21, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times the center's licensed capacity for children. With a minimum 60 children daily, this requirement would not be applicable.
 - (b) Playground Occupancy. At least one hundred (100) square feet shall be available for each child occupying the outside play area at any one time. Groups of children may be rotated if necessary so that one hundred (100) square feet per child is provided at all times. At 60 to 75 children planned daily, this would equal 100 x 75 = maximum 7500 square feet coverage required. At just half (35) the children outside on any shift, the minimum coverage required would be 3500 square feet. The site plan provides over 4500 square feet of playground area.
- (c) Location. Playgrounds shall be adjacent to the Center or in an area which can be reached by a safe route or method approved by the Department. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have shaded areas. The grass areas between the building and College Street and the building and Fayetteville Road are not safe, as they are very close to these high traffic volume roads. Wooded areas along the southern and eastern property lines would be much further away from vehicle traffic and, per the site plan, would provide over 4500 square feet of outdoor playground area (once partially cleared). Since most of the playground area cannot be hardscape, significant portions of existing asphalt may have to be removed. However, Bright From the Start will allow certain overlays of existing hard surfaces (see enclosed).
- (d) Fence or Approved Barriers. Playgrounds shall be protected from traffic or other hazards by a four (4) foot or higher secure fence or other barrier approved by this Department. Fencing material shall not present a hazard to children and shall be maintained so as to prevent children from leaving the playground area by any means other than through an approved access route. Fence gates shall be kept closed except when persons are entering or exiting the area. So noted.
- (e) Playground Surfaces. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have a surface suitable for varied activities. Hard surfaces, such as gravel, concrete, or paving shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) of the total playground area. So noted. However, Bright From the

Start will allow certain overlays of existing hard surfaces (see enclosed).

- (f) Equipment. Playground equipment shall provide an opportunity for the children to engage in a variety of experiences and shall be age-appropriate. For example, toddlers shall not be permitted to swing in swings designed for School-age Children. The outdoor equipment shall be free of lead-based paint, sharp corners and shall be regularly maintained in such a way as to be free of rust and splinters that could pose significant safety hazard to the children. All equipment shall be arranged so as not to obstruct supervision of children. So noted.
 - (g) Anchoring of Certain Equipment. Climbing and swinging equipment shall be anchored. So noted.
- (h) Fall Zones and Surfacing. Climbing and swinging equipment shall have a resilient surface beneath the equipment and the fall zone from such equipment must be adequately maintained by the Center to assure continuing resiliency. So noted.
- (i) Safety and Upkeep of Playground. Playgrounds shall be kept clean, free from litter and free of hazards, such as but not limited to rocks, exposed tree roots and exposed sharp edges of concrete. So noted.

(2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. on-street parking shall be permitted in conjunction with any child day care facility.

The City Code minimum parking requirements for day cares are as follows:

Section 86-410 (33) Kindergarten, day care centers and nursery schools shall provide one space for each employee and one space for every ten students, plus an area sufficient for the safe and convenient loading and unloading of students.

At one space for every ten students -75/10 = 8 spaces required.

At one space for each employee (approximately 5) = 5 spaces required.

Total parking required = 13 spaces.

Per the site plan, there will be 14 parking spaces at the property, on 2 sides of the building. This would even be after the playground is built.

Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon finding that the proposed facility is within 500 feet of an establishment licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages or within 500 feet of potentially hazardous land uses or activities that present unacceptable risks to operation of a child day care facility. "Potentially hazardous land uses or activities" include, but are not limited to, gasoline service stations, heavy industrial operations, storage of flammable materials, high pressure underground pipelines or truck or rail loading areas. Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon a finding that traffic conditions present unacceptable risks to operation of the facility and/or the safety of children proposed to be served by the facility or that traffic impacts associated with the proposed facility would substantially jeopardize the appropriate use of neighboring properties.

There are no establishment selling alcohol beverages within 500 feet of the subject property, but there are two potentially hazardous land uses within 500 feet of the subject property (across Fayetteville Road): a gas station with gas pumps approximately 190 feet from the day care building, and a company called Nex Air with compressed gas cylinders and welding equipment approximately 145 feet from the day care building. However, as stated before, specific evacuation plan (see enclosed), exiting the children out the back driveway to College Street and ultimately West Mill Street to Shiloh Baptist Church (The church has given permission for this.)

Staff recommendation: Approval of revised application; The property has adequate parking for a childcare center, will utilize existing curb cuts on College Street and Fayetteville Road, has provided for a drop-off and pickup area that conforms to the existing traffic pattern and does not put traffic on College Street, and provides adequate room for a fenced-in playground area in the rear. There is also a specific, reasonable evacuation plan. All requirements have been met. However, the approval conditions that applied to the 2019 approved daycare application should still apply:

- 1. Driveway exiting onto Fayetteville Road shall be right turn only.
- 2. Install a privacy fence for the fence portions facing Fayetteville Road, as specified on the diagram, minimum 6 feet in height. The rest of the fence can be chain link and 4 feet high minimum.
- 3. All required elements (playground, fencing, etc.) must be completely installed prior to obtaining a business license to legally operate.

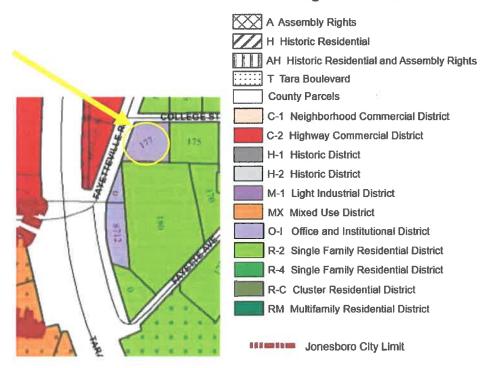

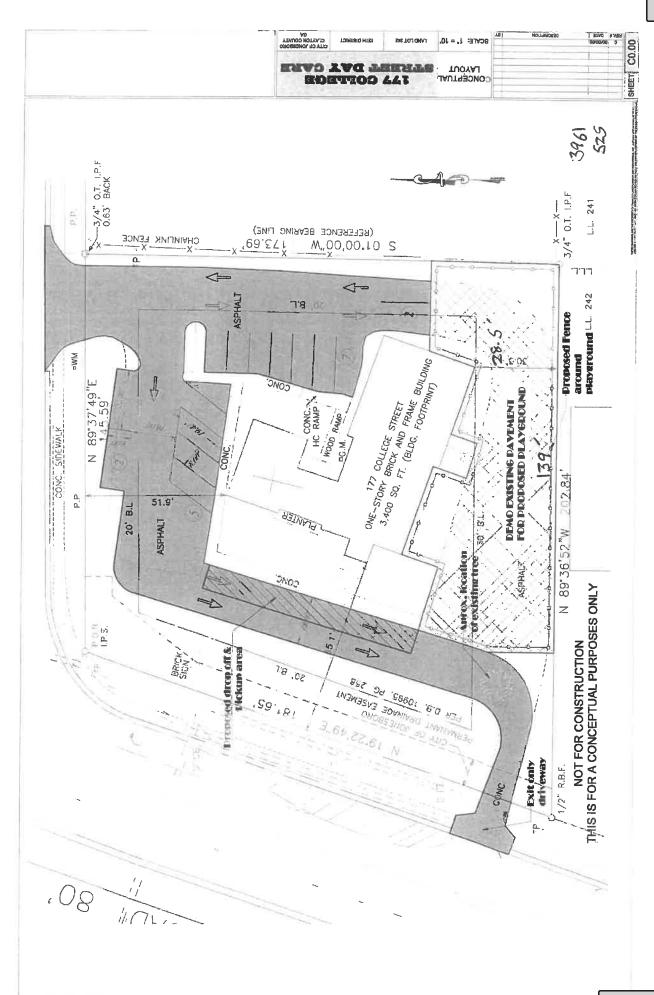

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, CPSC, installing playground equipment over hard surfaces. such as asphalt, concrete, or hard packed earth has always been the number one no-no of playground installation due to the large number of reported injuries from falls to hard surfaces. The CPSC addresses the issue of loose-fill surfacing and its tendency to become displaced under and around areas of high use in the new 2008 edition of Publication 325, CPSC §2.4.2.2. It suggests that playgrounds installed over hard surfaces can still use loosefill surfacing materials if a 3- to 6-inch base layer of loose-fill (e.g., gravel for drainage) is installed over the top of the hard surface (remember to account for change in elevation for the installation of the entire playground). The CPSC then directs installers to top the gravel with a layer of weed barrier geotextile cloth; then to place the loose-fill material as per the specifications for loose-fill safety surfacing under and around playground equipment (refer to ASTM).

Here is the interesting part. The CPSC now recommends

embedding into the loose-fill layer impact attenuating mats under high traffic areas, such as under swings, at slide exits, and other places where displacement is likely (See Figure 1). The CPSC further recommends that older playgrounds that still exist on hard surfacing should be modified using this formula.

So there you have it. By whatever name, wear mats, divot pads, etc. have the blessing of

the CPSC for their ability to potentially prevent an injury from a fall to the surface below. Simply follow the installation instructions provided by the supplier of your impact mat product, divot pad, wear mat . . . you get the idea, and you'll have an inexpensive and attractive way to keep loosefill material from traveling away from high traffic zones where it is needed most. 🐞

Summary & Background

Agency recommendation – **Denial of Conditional Use application**; Last year, the applicant submitted a zoning verification form for 255 South Main Street for a day care center, which requires a conditional use permit. The property has served as various types of businesses throughout the years. Zoned C-2 (Highway Commercial), the 0.3-acre site contains a one-story building and paved parking lot. Access is only to South Main Street. There are several car sales and car repair businesses at the rear and the north side and an unoccupied commercial building at the south side. Most surrounding zoning is either C-2 or M-1 (Light Industrial), with no residences on the same side of the street. There is an active railroad track about 245 feet to the northeast of the property. There is another daycare about 700 feet to the north (and on the opposite side of Main Street), Kidz of Paradise Child Care, which has been active for at least 12 years.

Per the applicant, there could be up to 65 children participating daily (the building, according to the state requirements will hold 65). The daycare would operate from Monday to Friday, from 6 am to 6 pm. Age range of kids would be 6 weeks old to 12 years old.

The City Code provides a definition for "day care center":

DAY CARE CENTER

Any place operated by a person, society, agency, corporation, institution, or group wherein are received, for pay, for group care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody 19 or more children under 18 years of age.

The standards for daycares focus on the "Bright From the Start" program standards for children:

- (1) Every child day care facility shall provide proof of an approved Georgia Department of Human Services registration certificate prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and shall conform to all applicable local, state, and federal standards, including Bright From the Start current program standards, O.C.G.A. Chapter 591-1-1. The applicant will provide the certificate, if approved.
 - An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:
 - (a) Size requirements.
 - (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed capacity for children. At 65 children maximum planned daily, this would equal 100 x (65 divided by three) = 100 x 22 = minimum 2200 square foot outdoor play area required. The applicant has

stated that she is providing a 50-foot wide by 100 foot long (5000 square feet) along the sour side of the building. Per the provided site plan, approximately 3060 square feet of playgroup provided along the south side of the building, between it and the southern property line. The applicant is proposing to have another 2000 square feet of playground area (and fence) into the adjacent property owner's land to the south. She says that she can get an easement for this. Staff does not recommend this, especially since the minimum playground area can be met fully on the subject property. The new fence and all playground equipment need to be fully on the subject property.

- (2) For Centers with a licensed capacity of <u>18 or fewer</u> children first licensed after April 21, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times the center's licensed capacity for children. **This requirement is not applicable to this size daycare.**
- (b) Playground Occupancy. At least one hundred (100) square feet shall be available for each child occupying the outside play area at any one time. Groups of children may be rotated if necessary so that one hundred (100) square feet per child is provided at all times. At 65 maximum children planned daily, this would equal 100 x 65 = maximum 6500 square feet coverage required. At just 25 children outside on any shift, the minimum coverage required would be 2500 square feet.
- (c) Location. Playgrounds shall be adjacent to the Center or in an area which can be reached by a safe route or method approved by the Department. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have shaded areas. The grass area between the south side of the building and the adjacent property is the only place possible to have the required playground space, but is currently not fenced in. There is virtually no available space in the very small rear yard. The fence for the side yard playground is extremely important to keep kids from going into the parking area or the street, and close to the metal, makeshift fence in the back, preventing access to a junk car lot.
- (d) Fence or Approved Barriers. Playgrounds shall be protected from traffic or other hazards by a four (4) foot or higher secure fence or other barrier approved by this Department. Fencing material shall not present a hazard to children and shall be maintained so as to prevent children from leaving the playground area by any means other than through an approved access route. Fence gates shall be kept closed except when persons are entering or exiting the area. So noted. See above comment about fence. If the daycare is approved, staff recommends that the fence be a 6-foot tall privacy fence.
 - (e) Playground Surfaces. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have a surface suitable for varied activities. Hard surfaces, such as gravel, concrete, or paving shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) of the total playground area. So noted. There is currently ample grass in the proposed playground area.
- (f) Equipment. Playground equipment shall provide an opportunity for the children to engage in a variety of experiences and shall be age-appropriate. For example, toddlers shall not be permitted to swing in swings designed for School-age Children. The outdoor equipment shall be free of lead-based paint, sharp corners and shall be regularly maintained in such a way as to be free of rust and splinters that could pose significant safety hazard to the children. All equipment shall be arranged so as not to obstruct supervision of children. So noted.
 - (g) Anchoring of Certain Equipment. Climbing and swinging equipment shall be anchored. So noted.
- (h) Fall Zones and Surfacing. Climbing and swinging equipment shall have a resilient surface beneath the equipment and the fall zone from such equipment must be adequately maintained by the Center to assure continuing resiliency. So noted.
- (i) Safety and Upkeep of Playground. Playgrounds shall be kept clean, free from litter and free of hazards, such as but not limited to rocks, exposed tree roots and exposed sharp edges of concrete. So noted.
- (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. No on-street parking shall be permitted in conjunction with any child day care facility.

The City Code minimum parking requirements for day cares are as follows:

Section 86-410 (33) Kindergarten, day care centers and nursery schools shall provide one space for each employee and one space for every ten students, plus an area sufficient for the safe and convenient loading and unloading of students.

At one space for every ten students – 65/10 = 7 spaces required.

At one space for each employee (approximately 5) = 5 spaces required.

Total parking required = 12 spaces.

There are only about 6 parking spaces along the front of the building. The tightness of the building to the property lines and the need for the playground does not allow for anymore parking space. The front yard is also quite short, and the drop-off and pickup of children from the daycare in the mornings and evenings could cause parents' cars to backup onto South Main Street and contribute to the traffic problems in that area.

Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon finding that the proposed facility is within 500 feet of an establishment licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages or within 500

feet of potentially hazardous land uses or activities that present unacceptable risks to operation of a child day care facility. "Potentially hazardous land uses or activities" include, but are not limited to, gasoline service stations, heavindustrial operations, storage of flammable materials, high pressure underground pipelines or truck or rail loading areas. Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon a finding that traffic conditions present unacceptable risks to operation of the facility and/or the safety of children proposed to be served by the facility or that traffic impacts associated with the proposed facility would substantially jeopardize the appropriate use of neighboring properties.

There are no establishments selling alcohol beverages within 500 feet of the subject property, but there are potentially hazardous land uses (vehicle repair) within 500 feet of the subject property (to the north and east of the subject property). There is the potential for fumes and loud noises and an occasional fire from these uses.

Staff recommendation: Denial of application; Although the property seems to have adequate playground space for a childcare center, staff has concerns with traffic circulation on the property during child drop-off times causing back-ups on South Main Street. Also, with the numerous vehicle repair places around the subject property, the area does not "project" safety for a childcare facility. While the existing Kidz of Paradise daycare operates only 700 feet away, it is well off the road and closer to the residential neighborhood on Batiste. In addition, the proposed use is significantly deficient in marked parking spaces.

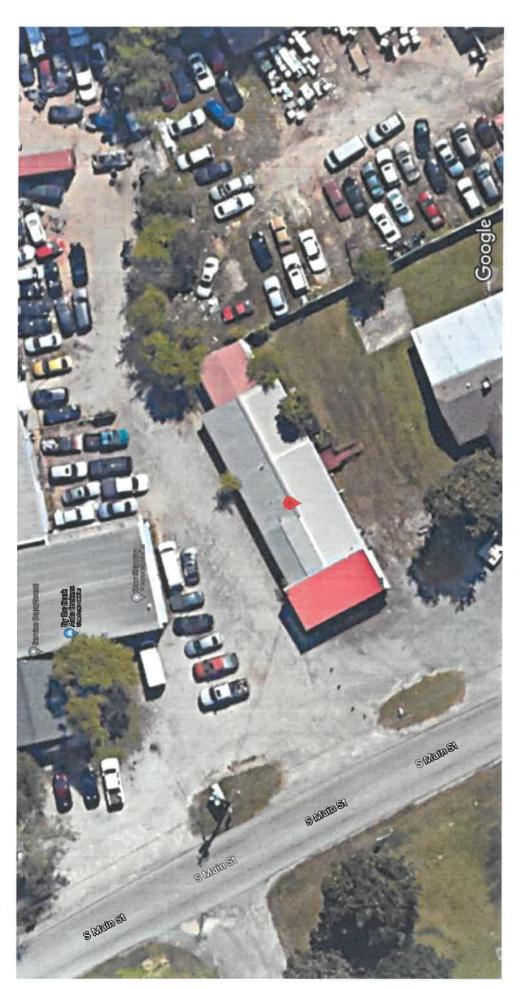

Chapter 591-1-1. An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:

- (a) Size requirements.
- (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed capacity for children.
- (2) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 18 or fewer children first licensed after April 21, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times the center's licensed capacity for children.
- (b) Playground Occupancy. At least one hundred (100) square feet shall be available for each child occupying the outside play area at any one time. Groups of children may be rotated if necessary so that one hundred (100) square feet per child is provided at all times.
- (c) Location. Playgrounds shall be adjacent to the Center or in an area which can be reached by a safe route or method approved by the Department. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have shaded areas.
- (d) Fence or Approved Barriers. Playgrounds shall be protected from traffic or other hazards by a four (4) foot or higher secure fence or other barrier approved by this Department. Fencing material shall not present a hazard to children and shall be maintained so as to prevent children from leaving the playground area by any means other than through an approved access route. Fence gates shall be kept closed except when persons are entering or exiting the area.
- (e) Playground Surfaces. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have a surface suitable for varied activities. Hard surfaces, such as gravel, concrete, or paving shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) of the total playground area.
- (f) Equipment. Playground equipment shall provide an opportunity for the children to engage in a variety of experiences and shall be age-appropriate. For example, toddlers shall not be permitted to swing in swings designed for School-age Children. The outdoor equipment shall be free of lead-based paint, sharp corners and shall be regularly maintained in such a way as to be free of rust and splinters that could pose significant safety hazard to the children. All equipment shall be arranged so as not to obstruct supervision of children.
- (g) Anchoring of Certain Equipment. Climbing and swinging equipment shall be anchored.
- (h) Fall Zones and Surfacing. Climbing and swinging equipment shall have a resilient surface beneath the equipment and the fall zone from such equipment must be adequately maintained by the Center to assure continuing resiliency.
- (i) Safety and Upkeep of Playground. Playgrounds shall be kept clean, free from litter and free of hazards, such as but not limited to rocks, exposed tree roots and exposed sharp edges of concrete.
- (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. No on-street parking shall be permitted in conjunction with any child day care facility. Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon finding that the proposed facility is within 500 feet of an establishment licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages or within 500 feet of potentially hazardous land uses or activities that present unacceptable risks to operation of a child day care facility. "Potentially hazardous land uses or activities" include, but are not limited to, gasoline service stations, heavy industrial operations, storage of flammable materials, high pressure underground pipelines or truck or rail loading areas.

Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon a finding that traffic conditions present unacceptable risks to operation of the facility and/or the safety of children proposed to be served by the facility or that traffic impacts associated with the proposed facility would substantially jeopardize the appropriate use of neighboring properties.

Agency recommendation – **Denial of Zoning Appeal for large, heavy vehicles and traffic trailers;** In December 2022, the applicant was approved for a zoning appeal for allowing small commercial equipment rental with screened outdoor storage on the subject properties, which are all in the Gateway South Overlay District.

In June 2023, the same applicant was approved for variances to normal paving and landscaping requirements for the subject property.

Now the applicant is applying for another zoning appeal to modify the use from the previously approved zoning appeal of December 2022. Per the applicant,

"Under the current overlay district zoning, we are limited on business services due to restrictions of uses. We would like to have a repair facility as used previously. With the adjacent acreage in the parcel, we would like to have it as secondary uses for outdoor storage of commercial trucks, trailers (no longer than 52 feet), and large equipment rental such as an excavator at maximum height of 13 feet.

(Note: The repair use was prohibited with the creation of the Gateway South Overlay District. The former business Quik Slik was grandfathered in for this use since they started before the creation of the Gateway South Overlay District. However, the use is no longer grandfathered due to Quik Slik being gone longer than 90 days.)

My concern (and problem) with this latest request is that it appears that we are getting further and further away from the original intent of the approval in December 2022, <u>small</u> equipment rental and parking. Through a variance here, and a modification there, we will incrementally wind up with a parking yard full of large equipment and tractor trailers, all of which will be readily seen from the road over the fence and landscaping. We had a long-standing issue with the property across the road with tractor trailers before the indoor self- storage place was put there. While I am not opposed to the repair of <u>small</u> equipment being performed there, I am opposed to "commercial trucks, trailers (no longer than 52 feet), and large equipment rental such as an excavator at maximum height of 13 feet" being parked and repaired there.

PARK USE

In consideration for the use of the City of Jonesboro Park Areas and Facilities, all users agree to the following: 1. The user assumes entire responsibility and liability for losses, damages and claims arising out injury or damage to the user's display, equipment and other property brought onto the premises of the City facility reserved and shall indemnify and hold harmless the City from any and all such losses, damages and claims arising out of such use.

- 2. Any group sponsoring or using a City-owned facility assumes all liability for any accidents that occur during the scheduled reservation time of the facility.
- 3. The user shall be responsible for the conduct of the participants attending the activity/event, with regard to the control and containment of litter, and for any damage to the premises beyond ordinary wear and tear.
- 4. Amplified music or other amplified sound is not allowed to be played at a volume that causes a nuisance for the area. No sound shall be permissible after 10:30 pm.
- 5. The user shall conduct all activities on the premises in accordance with any applicable federal, state, or local laws, ordinances and rules, including all park regulations, and shall comply with the requirements stated in the "Lee Street Park Amphitheater Rental Packet." 6. If approval is granted to the user to bring in any special portable devices (i.e., Bounce House) for use in conjunction with the reservation, the reserving party must submit a letter releasing the City of liability and must also post a sign at the device during the reservation time that the device is not the City's and the City is not responsible. However, if your event consists of more than 100 people, the authorized user shall submit a Certificate of Liability insurance in the amount of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence, naming the City of Jonesboro as an additional insured, no later than 30 days prior to the event.
- 7. It is unlawful for any person to use fireworks, firecrackers, explosives of any kind in any park.
- 8. The park rules require that you promptly remove any dog waist deposited on public or private property.
- 9. The park rules require that all dogs be leashed and barking must not become a nuisance.
- 10. No motorized vehicles are allowed in the park except in areas approved for such use.
- 11. No person may move any City owned equipment and/or supplies without written permission from the Director of Public Works.

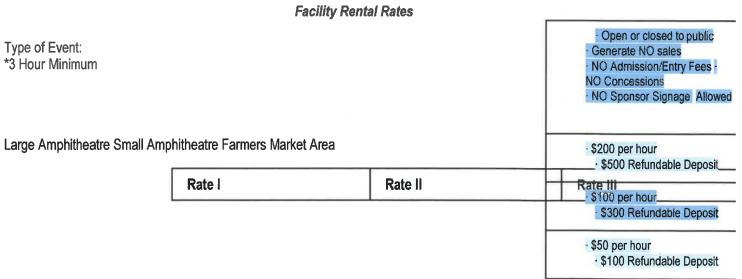

In this regard, a conflict of interest would arise because such committee members would be reviewing matters concerning the very individuals that appointed them—all but one city council member is involved in this Complaint.

Unfortunately, the City's Code does not address how an ethics complaint should be handled when a majority of the council is involved in the complaint. Additionally, although there would be a conflict of interest at the committee level, such conflict also goes further. Specifically, the "decision" of the committee is merely a recommendation to be affirmed or denied by the mayor and city council. However, here, no quorum of unbiased council members could exist to vote on such matters.

In addition to allegations that the ethics code was violated, the complainants request that an independent party be appointed to investigate the allegations forming the basis of the Complaint. The City adopted an Administrative Investigations Code in 2007, a copy of which is attached to this correspondence, which authorizes the city council to appoint an investigating officer for the investigation of the affairs of the city. Upon the completion of the investigation, the investigating officer must provide findings to the city council and all parties to the investigation. Following the investigation, the city council can choose to bring administrative allegations against an elected or appointed official. If allegations are based on such findings, the city council must conduct a hearing and appoint an individual to moderate the hearing. At the close of the hearing, the city council provides a ruling. Without question, this presents the same conflict of interest issues as the Ethics Code.

Faced with these apparent conflicts, there are a couple ways the City can handle this matter—neither of which is ideal, but would permit an unbiased, independent review of the Complaint. First, the City could amend the Code of Ethics and make the provisions of the amendment retroactive. This amendment does not have to be extensive, however, it would provide that, in the absence of a committee, the city manager or city clerk would appoint a third-party hearing officer to adjudicate the ethics complaint. Moreover, the amendment would also address conflicts of interest, recusal, and provide that, in the event a complaint is brought by and/or against at least four (4) councilmembers, the decision of the hearing officer or committee would become a final decision.

Alternatively, the City could amend the City Code to remove the ethics committee and adopt a hearing officer format. In this regard, I have included a copy of College Park's Ethics Ordinance, which Fincher Denmark LLC amended in 2020

WORKPLACE ANTI-BULLYING & ANTI-HARASSMENT POLICY

The City of Jonesboro seeks to provide a work environment that is safe and enjoyable for all.

Workplace bullying has a detrimental effect on the Company and its people. It can create an unsafe workin environment, result in a loss of trained and talented workers, cause the breakdown of team and individual relationship increase absenteeism and reduce efficiency and productivity. People who are bullied can become distressed, anxious withdrawn and can lose self-esteem and self-confidence. Workplace bullying is also in some circumstances against the law. For these reasons, bullying will not be tolerated by the Company.

The City of Jonesboro recognizes that workplace bullying may involve comments and behaviors that offend som people and not others. The City accepts that individuals may react differently to certain comments and behavior. That is why a minimum standard of behavior is required of workers. This standard aims to be respectful of all workers.

The City of Jonesboro recognizes that workplace bullying can take place though several different methods communication including face to face, email, text messaging and social media platforms. As such, this Policy applie to all methods of communication through which workplace bullying can take place

This Policy applies to behaviors that occur:

- In connection with work, even if it occurs outside normal working hours;
- During work activities, for example, when dealing with clients.
- · At work related events and functions, for example, at Christmas parties; and
- On social media platforms where workers interact.

This Policy applies to all workers including employees, contractors, elected officials, and volunteers.

In so far as this policy imposes any obligations on the City (i.e. those additional to those set out under legislation), thos obligations are not contractual and do not give rise to any contractual rights. To the extent that this policy describe benefits and entitlements for employees (i.e. those additional to those set out under legislation), they ar discretionary in nature and are also not intended to be contractual. The terms and conditions of employment that are intended to be contractual are set out in an employee's written employment contract.

The City Council may, by majority vote, unilaterally introduce, vary, remove or replace this policy at any time.

WHAT IS WORKPLACE BULLYING?

Workplace bullying occurs when an individual, or a group of individuals, repeatedly behaves unreasonably towards worker, or a group of workers, and the behavior creates a risk to health and safety. It includes both physical an psychological abuse.

Bullying behaviors can take many different forms, from the obvious (direct) to the more subtle (indirect).

The following are some examples of direct bullying:

- Abusive, insulting or offensive language or comments;
- Violent, aggressive, or intimidating conduct.
- · Belittling or humiliating comments;
- · Victimization; and

• Practical jokes or initiation.

The following are some examples of indirect bullying:

- Unjustified criticism or complaints.
- Deliberately excluding someone from work-related activities;
- Withholding information that is vital for effective work performance;
- Setting unreasonable timelines or constantly changing deadlines.
- · Setting tasks that are unreasonably below or beyond a person's skill level.
- Denying access to information, supervision, consultation, or resources to the detriment of the worker and/or
- · elected official.
- Spreading misinformation or malicious rumors
 - Changing work arrangements such as rosters and leave to deliberately inconvenience a particular worker or workers.

Threatening to terminate any person for speaking to a City Council member.

The above examples are not an exhaustive list of bullying behaviors. They are indicative of the type of behaviors that may constitute bullying and are therefore unacceptable to the Company. If you are unsure whether behavior not provided on this list constitutes bullying you should contact your direct supervisor in the first instance.

WHAT IS NOT WORKPLACE BULLYING?

Reasonable management action taken by managers or supervisors to direct and control the way work is carried out is not considered to be workplace bullying if the action is taken in a reasonable and lawful way.

The following are some examples of reasonable management action:

- Realistic and achievable performance goals, standards, and deadlines;
- Fair and appropriate rostering and allocation of working hours;
- Transferring a worker to another area or role for operational reasons.
- Deciding not to select a worker for a promotion where a fair and transparent process is followed;
- Informing a worker about unsatisfactory work performance in an honest, fair, and constructive way;
- Informing a worker about unreasonable behavior in an objective and confidential way; Implementing
- organizational changes or restructuring; and
- Taking disciplinary action, including suspension, or terminating employment where appropriate or justified in the circumstances.

OTHER UNACCEPTABLE CONDUCT

Single incidents of unreasonable behavior (such as harassment, violence or threatening behavior) can also present a risk to health and safety and will not be tolerated.

Harassment is any form of behavior that is:

Unwanted.

- Offends, humiliates or intimidates; or
- Creates a hostile environment.

Where such conduct occurs towards a person due to a particular characteristic of that person (such as when based on sex, sexual orientation, pregnancy, marital status, age, disability, ethnicity, or race,) this may be unlawful under discrimination and equal opportunity law, even if it is limited to a single incident.

The City will also not tolerate any form of workplace violence. Workplace violence is any incident where a person in physically attacked or threatened in the workplace, whether this is directed to a co-worker, subcontractor, client customer or visitor, or elected official.

It includes (but is not limited to):

- Any type of direct physical contact such as punching, pushing, tripping, spitting, or blocking someone's way.
- Any form of unwanted physical contact.

MANAGERS' AND SUPERVISORS' ROLES

Managers and supervisors have an important role to play in terms of fostering a culture that does not tolerat or encourage harassment, bullying or workplace violence and should ensure that they do not engage in an conduct of this nature themselves.

Managers and supervisors should also ensure that workers understand this Policy and consequences of non compliance. When managers and supervisors observe harassment, bullying or workplace violence occurring, the should take steps to prevent this conduct from continuing and warn the person or people involved of the consequence if the behavior continues (including disciplinary measures up to and including termination of employment).

If the accused is in an administrative role that answers directly to the city council, employees have the right to contact any Elected Councilman in the City of Jonesboro for assistance without fear of reprimand. The Council will proceed with all complaints utilizing policies and procedures put in place. No decision will be made concerning disciplinar action until the findings are reviewed by legal.

WORKERS' ROLE

The City of Jonesboro expects workers and elected officials:

- Not to engage in harassment, bullying or workplace violence.
- Not to aid, abet or encourage others to engage in harassment, bullying or workplace violence;
- To behave in a responsible and professional manner.
- Treat others in the workplace with courtesy and respect.
- Listen and respond appropriately to the views and concerns of others; and
- To be fair and honest in their dealings with others.

ARE YOU EXPERIENCING BULLYING, HARASSMENT OR BEING SUBJECT TO VIOLENCE?

Complaints of bullying, harassment and workplace violence will be taken seriously and will be handled in accordance with the City of Jonesboro Grievance Handling Policy.

If you make a complaint of workplace bullying, harassment, or violence it will be taken seriously and will be dealt wit sympathetically and in a confidential manner (except where the City deems it is necessary to disclose information t properly deal with the complaint).

You will not be victimized or treated unfairly for making a complaint.

If the claim is found to be substantiated, the City will act in accordance with its Disciplinary Policy.

OTHER MEASURES

The City also recognizes the need for open communication in the workplace. The City of Jonesboro may implemer what training it considers necessary in relation to behavioral standards and where appropriate will hold meetings to address standards, expectations, and any issues. The frequency, dates and form of this training and meetings will be determined by the management and City Council of Jonesboro.

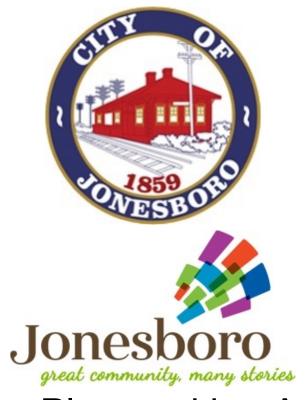

Approval

ARTICLE VI. - CONDITIONAL USES

Sec. 86-121. - Generally.

Conditional uses may be permitted upon a finding by Mayor and Council that the proposed use conforms to the minimum listed conditions and the standards of review of this article. Approval of conditional uses is subject to the procedural requirements of property rezoning of Article XII.

A conditional use will continue so long as the use thereby allowed is actually being conducted on the property to which it applies or as subsequently modified by the Mayor and Council pursuant to the provisions of this chapter, once activity authorized by a conditional use has been discontinued for a period of 60 days, the conditional use shall expire without further action by the Mayor and Council and such use may not thereafter be made on premises without reapplication therefore and approval thereof by the Mayor and Council. In making the decision regarding whether or not a conditional use has been discontinued, the Zoning Administrator shall base his judgment upon objective criteria gained from observation of the premises. The subjective intent of the owner or lessee of the property shall not be considered.

The following conditional uses may be permitted in the zoning districts specified. The listed conditions and standards below are minimum requirements, and the Mayor and Council may elect to impose additional conditions and standards on proposed uses based on the context of each case.

Sec. 86-122. – NAICS 62441, 6244 Child day care.

DAY CARE CENTER

Any place operated by a person, society, agency, corporation, institution, or group wherein are received, for pay, for group care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody 19 or more children under 18 years of age.

GROUP DAY CARE HOME

Any place operated by any person or group wherein are received for pay not less than seven nor more than 18 children under 18 years of age for care and supervision for less than 24 hours per day.

Day care centers and group day care homes may be permitted as a conditional use in an CCM, H-2, O&I, C-1, C-2 or MX district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) Every child day care facility shall provide proof of an approved Georgia Department of Human Services registration certificate prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and shall conform to all applicable local, state, and federal standards, including Bright From the Start current program standards, O.C.G.A. Chapter 591-1-1. An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:
 - (a) Size requirements.

- (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed capacity for children.
- (2) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 18 or fewer children first licensed after April 21, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times the center's licensed capacity for children.
- (b) Playground Occupancy. At least one hundred (100) square feet shall be available for each child occupying the outside play area at any one time. Groups of children may be rotated if necessary so that one hundred (100) square feet per child is provided at all times.
- (c) Location. Playgrounds shall be adjacent to the Center or in an area which can be reached by a safe route or method approved by the Department. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have shaded areas.
- (d) Fence or Approved Barriers. Playgrounds shall be protected from traffic or other hazards by a four (4) foot or higher secure fence or other barrier approved by this Department. Fencing material shall not present a hazard to children and shall be maintained so as to prevent children from leaving the playground area by any means other than through an approved access route. Fence gates shall be kept closed except when persons are entering or exiting the area.
- (e) Playground Surfaces. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have a surface suitable for varied activities. Hard surfaces, such as gravel, concrete, or paving shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) of the total playground area.
 - (f) Equipment. Playground equipment shall provide an opportunity for the children to engage in a variety of experiences and shall be age-appropriate. For example, toddlers shall not be permitted to swing in swings designed for School-age Children. The outdoor equipment shall be free of lead-based paint, sharp corners and shall be regularly maintained in such a way as to be free of rust and splinters that could pose significant safety hazard to the children. All equipment shall be arranged so as not to obstruct supervision of children.
 - (g) Anchoring of Certain Equipment. Climbing and swinging equipment shall be anchored.
 - (h) Fall Zones and Surfacing. Climbing and swinging equipment shall have a resilient surface beneath the equipment and the fall zone from such equipment must be adequately maintained by the Center to assure continuing resiliency.
 - (i) Safety and Upkeep of Playground. Playgrounds shall be kept clean, free from litter and free of hazards, such as but not limited to rocks, exposed tree roots and exposed sharp edges of concrete.
- (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. No on-street parking shall be permitted in conjunction with any child day care facility.

 Adequate drop-off / pickup traffic circulation shall be provided to prevent vehicle backup onto City streets. Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day

care facility upon finding that the proposed facility is within 500 feet of an establishment licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages or within 500 feet of potentially hazardous land uses or activities that present unacceptable risks to operation of a child day care facility. "Potentially hazardous land uses or activities" include, but are not limited to, gasoline service stations, heavy industrial operations, storage of flammable materials, high pressure underground pipelines or truck or rail loading areas. Applications within 500 feet of these hazardous land uses shall provide a written evacuation plan to be considered by Mayor and Council.

Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon a finding that traffic conditions present unacceptable risks to operation of the facility and/or the safety of children proposed to be served by the facility or that traffic impacts associated with the proposed facility would substantially jeopardize the appropriate use of neighboring properties.

Sec. 86-123. - NAICS 624410, 6244 Family day care.

FAMILY DAY CARE HOME

A private residence operated by any person who receives therein for pay for supervision and care fewer than 24 hours per day, without transfer of legal custody, at least three, but not more than six children under 18 years of age who are not related to such person and whose parents or guardians are not residents in the same private residence.

Family day care homes may be permitted as a conditional use in an R-2, R-4, R-C, R-M, H-1 or H-2 district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) The exterior of the dwelling shall not be altered in a manner inconsistent with dwellings in the immediate neighborhood that are occupied in single-family use.
- (2) No parking facility shall be installed in the front yard.
- (3) Must provide an outdoor play area containing a minimum area of 500 square feet. Such play area shall be fenced using a minimum fence height of four feet and established in the rear yard. A stockade type fence shall be installed along any boundary with a residential use. Such fencing shall comply with the building setback of the adjoining residential property, as appropriate.

Sec. 86-124. – NAICS 62412 Services for the elderly and persons with disabilities.

ADULT DAY CARE HOME

A facility in which for compensation at least three, but not more than six persons 18 years of age or older, who have difficulty in functioning independently, receive care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody.

Adult day care homes may be permitted as a conditional use in an R-2, R-4, R-C, or R-M district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) On-site parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (2) The exterior of the dwelling shall not be altered in a manner inconsistent with dwellings in the immediate neighborhood that are occupied in single-family use.
- (3) No parking facility shall be installed in the front yard. (4) An outdoor seating area comprised of a porch, deck, gazebo or similar structure suitable for no fewer than four adults must be provided.

Sec. 86-125. - NAICS 624120 Adult day care center.

A facility in which for compensation seven or more persons 18 years of age or older, who have difficulty in functioning independently, receive care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody.

Adult day-care centers may be permitted as a conditional use in an CCM, H-2, O&I, M-X, C-1, or C-2 district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre.
- (3) On-site parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (4) An outdoor amenity area containing a minimum area of 2,000 square feet and comprised of such furnishings as benches, picnic tables and shelters as well as pedestrian walks to create an amenity suitable for adults must be provided.
- (5) Mayor and Council may attach conditions to approval of a facility which have as their purpose protection of the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare, or Mayor and Council may deny approval of an adult day care facility upon a finding that conditions on or near such proposed facility render it unsuitable for establishment of an adult day care facility.

Sec. 86-126. - NAICS 6239 Continuing care retirement communities.

PERSONAL CARE HOME

Any dwelling that provides or arranges for the provision of housing, food service, and one or more personal services for two or more adults who are not related to the owner or administrator by blood or marriage. Personal services include, but are not limited to, individual assistance with and supervision of self-administered medications and essential activities or daily living such as eating, bathing, grooming, dressing, and toileting.

Personal care homes may be permitted as a conditional use in an O&I, MX or C-2 district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) The personal care home shall provide on-site parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility;
- (2) The operator of the personal care home shall provide the Jonesboro Police and Clayton County Fire Departments a current list of residents living in the facility who have disabilities, and information concerning special needs, so as to ensure each resident's safety and evacuation from the premises in the event of a fire or similar emergency.
- (3) The personal care home shall obtain all required federal and state permits and/or licenses.

Sec. 86-127. - Other residential care facilities.

GROUP HOME FOR THE DISABLED

Any dwelling unit designed for single family occupancy and occupied by no more than eight disabled individuals. Group homes do not include boarding hoses, halfway houses, homeless shelters or similar occupancy, nor shall the term include occupancy by any releases of any penal institution or place for persons convicted of a crime, persons found to be juvenile delinquents or juveniles found to be persons in need of supervision. In addition to disabled individuals, up to two additional occupants acting as house parents or guardians may reside in a group home.

Group homes may be permitted as a conditional use in an R-2 or R-4 district, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) No additional parking beyond the existing driveway and garage areas shall be permitted on the property where the group home is located, and vehicles may only be parked in such areas. Should additional parking be required, the operator of the group home may apply for an administrative variance from the city manager; any increase in pavement shall be confined to the rear of the lot.
- (2) The operator of the group home shall provide the Jonesboro Police Department and Clayton County Fire Department with a current list of residents living in the facility who have disabilities, and information concerning special needs, to ensure each resident's well-being and safe evacuation from the premises in the event of a fire or similar emergency.
- (3) Any modifications to the existing structure shall not increase the square footage of the structure.
- (4) Any exterior modifications to the existing structure shall be consistent with the residential character of the surrounding neighborhood.
- (5) A group home shall not be established within 1,500 feet of an existing group home.
- (6) The group home shall not require occupancy of individual bedrooms by more than two individuals.
- (7) Group homes shall comply with all fire and life safety codes, and obtain all federal and state permits or licenses, as appropriate.
- (8) The existing structure shall be upgraded and inspected by the city with respect to accommodation and accessibility by disabled individuals.

Sec. 86-128. - NAICS 51912 Libraries and archives.

Libraries may be permitted as a conditional use in an R-2, R-4, CCM, RM, H-1, H-2, MX, C-1, or C-2 district, subject to the following condition:

- (1) A landscaped buffer having a minimum horizontal dimension of 20 feet and an average horizontal dimension of 30 feet shall be maintained when abutting a residential use.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (4) Must meet the requirements of Article XIII Parking, Loading, and Interior Circulation.
- (5) No paved parking area shall be established within 25 feet of a lot that is zoned residential or contains a residential use.
- (6) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-129. - NAICS 6233 Retirement community.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-2 district:

- (1) A maximum of 90 dwelling units shall be permitted.
- (2) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (3) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of two acres.

Sec. 86-130. - NAICS 71312 Amusement arcades, indoor.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, MX districts:

- (1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.
- (2) No activities shall occur in parking lot or other outdoor areas.

Sec. 86-131. - NAICS 713990 Billiard and pool halls (all uses permitted except shooting ranges).

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, and C-2 districts:

- (1) The sale or on-premises consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited.
- (2) No activities shall occur in parking lot or other outdoor areas.

Sec. 86-132. - NAICS 515 Broadcasting.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, and C-2 districts:

(1) No transmission towers may be located on the property.

Sec. 86-133. - NAICS 512132 Motion picture theaters (except drive-ins).

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, MX and C-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (4) Must meet the requirements of Article XIII Parking, Loading, and Interior Circulation.
- (5) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (6) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-134. - NAICS 512132 Motion picture theaters: drive ins.

The following conditions are assigned in the M-X and C-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) No screen shall be visible from any street.
- (4) No central loudspeaker system shall be permitted.
- (5) No outdoor theater shall be permitted adjacent to any residential district.
- (6) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (7) Must meet the requirements of Article XIII Parking, Loading, and Interior Circulation.
- (8) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building

height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-135. - NAICS 711130 Musical groups and artist.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, MX and C-2 districts:

(1) No noise generated by the use shall be perceptible at the property boundary.

Sec. 86-136. - NAICS 712190 Nature parks and other similar institutions.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 and H-2 district:

(1) No parking facilities shall be permitted with 50 feet of a residential property.

Sec. 86-137. - NAICS 51219 Pre-production and Postproduction services and other related motion picture and video industries.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) No noise generated by the use shall be perceptible at the property boundary.

Sec. 86-138. - NAICS 51224, 51225 Sound recording industries.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, and M-1 districts:

(1) No noise generated by the use shall be perceptible at the property boundary.

Sec. 86-139. - 5221 Banks, credit unions, and saving institutions.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 district:

(1) No drive-thru teller or drive-thru ATM machines shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-140. - NAICS 621991 Blood and organ banks.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-2 districts:

- (1) Blood plasma donor facilities are prohibited.
- (2) Applicable waste storage / disposal procedures shall be followed, per State and Federal guidelines.
- (3) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).

- (4) Must meet the requirements of Article XIII Parking, Loading, and Interior Circulation.
- (5) No paved parking area shall be established within 25 feet of a lot that is zoned residential or contains a residential use.

Sec. 86-141. - NAICS 236, 237, 238 Construction and Contractors, Specialty and General, With No Outdoor Storage

The following condition is assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I districts:

(1) No outdoor storage of materials is permitted.

Sec. 86-142. - NAICS 236, 237, and 238 Construction and contractors, Specialty and General, with outdoor storage.

The following condition is assigned in the M-1 district:

(1) Outdoor storage is permitted provided such storage is confined to the rear yard and is screened using fencing or landscaping which completely obscures the view from adjoining properties and public rights-of-way. Such screening shall have a minimum height of eight feet.

Sec. 86-143. - NAICS 561320 Temporary help services.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) No client of any such facility may report to the facility more than one hour prior to the opening of the business or remain on the premises more than one hour following closing of the business.
- (2) The building located on the property shall contain sufficient area, either inside or outside, configured in such a way as to prevent potential laborers who have congregated in the building or on the property from being observed from any right-of-way or any adjoining property.
- (3) The proposed site for a labor pool shall not be located within 1,000 feet of an existing labor pool.
- (4) The labor pool shall provide a safe area on the property where the day laborers may be picked up and dropped off. Any such area shall not include any right-of-way immediately adjacent to the property or on any adjoining property not owned or leased by the labor pool.
- (5) The labor pool shall be limited to commercial locations on Tara Boulevard that are zoned C-2.

Sec. 86-144. - NAICS 54194 Veterinary services including animal hospital.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I, C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No outdoor runs or kennels shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-145. - NAICS 812990 All other personal services, including tattoo parlors.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, M-X, C-1 and C-2 districts:

(1) Dating and escort services shall be prohibited.

Sec. 86-146. - NAICS 81222 Cemeteries

The following conditions are assigned in the R-2, R-4, R-C, RM, O&I, C-1, and C-2 districts:

- (1) No associated crematorium facilities shall be permitted.
- (2) The lot shall be a minimum of five acres.
- (3) No dwelling, other than a one-family dwelling for a caretaker, shall be permitted.
- (4) No building shall be located within 100 feet of any property boundary.
- (5) The lot shall have direct access to an arterial or major collector road.
- (6) All gravesites shall be a minimum of (50) 50 feet from any property boundary.

Sec. 86-147. - NAICS 532284 Consumer goods rental.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-148. - NAICS 812320 Dry-cleaning and laundry services (except coin operated).

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, H-1, H-2, O&I, and C-1 districts:

(1) No dry-cleaning plants shall be permitted. Such establishments shall be limited to customer drop off and pick-up.

Sec. 86-149. - NAICS 4543 Direct selling establishments, including fuel dealers.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

(1) No on-site storage of fuels shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-150. - NAICS 5323 General rental centers.

The following conditions are assigned in the MX and O&I districts:

(1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-151. - NAICS 811411 Home and garden equipment repair and maintenance.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-152. - NAICS 48841 Motor vehicle towing and storage.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) Vehicle storage shall be limited to a 30-day period.
- (2) Storage shall be screened utilizing a 10-foot landscaped buffer and opaque fencing having a minimum height of six feet; landscaping as prescribed in Article 86-15 shall be maintained outside the fencing.

Sec. 86-153. - NAICS 561491 Repossession services.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I, C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No outdoor storage of repossessed vehicles, equipment or materials of any sort shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-154. - NAICS 81142 Re-upholstery and furniture repair, no outdoor storage.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and C-1 districts:

- (1) No outdoor display or storage of merchandise or materials shall be permitted.
- (2) Window displays shall not include merchandise in various states of repair or disrepair.

Sec. 86-155. - NAICS 5617 Services to buildings and dwellings.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

- (1) No on-site storage of chemicals or other potentially toxic or hazardous materials or supplies shall be permitted.
- (2) No trucks shall be stored on site for 24-hour periods or overnight.
- (3) No on-site 24-hour storage of chemical compounds used in the conduct of businesses classified under this NAICS code shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-156. - NAICS 541380 Testing laboratories.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I, C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No testing facility shall be permitted which introduces excessive noise, odor, vibration, electrical interference, threat of fire, explosion, or involves hazardous materials or other objectionable activities.

Sec. 86-157. - NAICS 4542 Vending machine operators.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-2 and O&I districts:

(1) No on premises vending machine sales shall be permitted.

(Ord. No. 05-08, § 2(6.36), 8-15-05, 2-11-19)

Sec. 86-158. - NAICS 6243 Vocational rehabilitation services.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and C-2 districts:

- (1) No client of any such facility may report to the facility more than one hour prior to the opening of the business or remain on the premises more than one hour following closing of the business.
- (2) The building located on the property shall contain sufficient area, either inside or outside, configured in such a way as to prevent potential laborers who have congregated in the building or on the property from being observed from any right-of-way or any adjoining property.

Sec. 86-159. - NAICS 7224 Bars, taverns, and other drinking places (alcohol).

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and C-1 districts:

(1) See chapter 6, Alcoholic beverages.

Sec. 86-160. - NAICS 44122 Boat dealers.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

(1) No outdoor storage or display of used boats, used trailers or any equipment, motors or accessories shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-161. - NAICS 444 Building material and garden equipment and supplies dealers.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-162. - NAICS 44419 Building material dealers, lumber yards.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) Outdoor storage shall be screened utilizing a ten-foot landscaped buffer and opaque fencing having a minimum height of six feet; landscaping as prescribed in article XV shall be maintained outside the fencing. Side or rear yard only.
- (2) Proposed locations adjacent to residential areas shall be subject to additional buffers.

Sec. 86-163. - NAICS 441110/44112 Car dealers, new or used and car dealers, used.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) The primary use of the property shall be retail sales of vehicles.
- (2) All vehicle servicing shall be performed in an entirely enclosed structure.
- (3) No vehicles that are in a state of disrepair shall be displayed.
- (4) Automotive repair shall be operated only as an accessory to a new car dealership.
- (5) No outdoor storage of parts, materials or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-163.1. - NAICS 425120 Automobile brokers—Office only.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 districts:

- (1) Automobile brokers assigned in the C-2 districts shall operate in an "office only" capacity.
- (2) "Office only" shall mean: a. No vehicle to be brokered for sale, lease, or otherwise, shall be delivered to, displayed, or parked at any time on the premises; b. Vehicles for sale or lease, whether directly or indirectly, shall not be delivered to, displayed, or parked on the premises at any time; c. Maintenance, repair, refurbishing, washing, or detailing of automobiles on the premises is prohibited.

Sec. 86-164. - NAICS 4481 Clothing stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the M-X district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 6,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-165. - NAICS 445120 Convenience food stores, without fuel pumps.

The following conditions are assigned in the MX, C-1, C-2, and M-1 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-166. - NAICS 4421 Furniture and home furnishing stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and C-1 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 6,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-167. - NAICS 452319 General merchandise stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 6,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-168. - NAICS 45322 Gift, novelty, and souvenir stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-169. - NAICS 44511 Grocery stores and supermarkets.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and C-1 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 20,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-170. - NAICS 4442, 44422 Lawn and garden equipment and supply stores, nursery, and farm supply

The following conditions are assigned in the H-2 and C-1 districts:

(1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-171. - NAICS 4532 Office supplies and stationery stores, gifts.

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 6,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-172. - NAICS 44613 Optical goods stores

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 6,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-173. - NAICS 45391 Pet and pet supplies stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2 and MX districts:

(1) No outdoor runs shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-174. - NAICS 81291 Pet care, grooming, training, pet sitting, and boarding (except veterinary services).

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) No outdoor runs or kennels shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-175. - NAICS 44611 Pharmacies and drug stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, H-1 and H-2 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 8,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-176. - NAICS 443142 Music stores - Prerecorded tape, compact disc and record stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 and H-2 districts:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-177. - NAICS 53223 Video tape and disc rental.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-178. - NAICS 4533 Used merchandise stores, including thrift stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1, C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) No overnight outdoor storage or display of merchandise or equipment shall be permitted.
- (2) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-179. - NAICS 484 Truck Transportation (Freight); Logistics

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

(1) Trucks shall not be stored in the front yard.

Sec. 86-180. - NAICS 488991 Packing and crating.

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Pallets shall be screened from view from the public right-of-way and adjacent property and shall be stacked no higher than the screening or ten feet above grade, whichever height is most restrictive.
- (2) Such screening shall be accomplished utilizing a ten-foot landscaped buffer and opaque fencing having a minimum height of eight feet; landscaping as prescribed in article XV shall be maintained outside the fencing.

Sec. 86-181. - NAICS 4853 Taxi and limousine service.

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

(1) No on-site vehicle maintenance, other than washing, shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-182. - Mixed family, including lofts.

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, H-1, H-2, O&I and C-1 districts:

(1) No residential unit shall occupy a street level space.

Sec. 86-183. - NAICS 8131, 81311 Churches, other places of worship, and religious organizations.

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must conform to Chapter 6 setbacks, Alcoholic Beverages.
- (4) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (5) Must meet the requirements of Article XIII Parking, Loading, and Interior Circulation.
- (6) Must meet applicable buffer requirements of Article XV Landscaping and Buffers.
- (7) No paved parking area shall be established within 25 feet of a lot that is zoned residential or contains a residential use.
- (8) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-184. - NAICS 8134 Civic and social organizations, with provisions for bar or restaurant.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must conform to Chapter 6 standards, Alcoholic Beverages.

Sec. 86-185. - NAICS 81341 Civic and social organizations, without private bar or restaurant.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.

Sec. 86-186. - NAICS 6113 Private schools: colleges and universities.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-2, O&I, MX, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must be stand-alone buildings (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).

- (5) No paved parking area shall be established within 25 feet of a lot that is zoned residential or contains a residential use.

- (5) No paved parking area shall be established within 25 feet of a lot that is zoned residential or contains a residential use.

(Reference Sec. 86-121. through 86-220.)

Sec. 86-499. NAICS 621420 - Outpatient Substance Abuse Centers

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre.
- (3) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (4) On-site parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (5) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned property.
- (6) Must conform to the advertising / public notice requirements of O.C.G.A. Title 36, Chapter 66, Section 36-66-4 (f), regarding zoning decisions relating to the location or relocation of a facility for the treatment of drug dependency.
- (7) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-500. NAICS 621491 - HMO Medical Centers

The following conditions are assigned in the M-X and C-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre.

The following conditions are assigned in the R-M, H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, and C-2 districts:

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.

The following conditions are assigned in the M-X, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (4) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers or connected storefronts).

Sec. 86-546. NAICS 812220 – Crematories, within Funeral Homes or Stand Alone

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.

Sec. 86-587. NAICS 44413 – Hardware Stores

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 And H-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 4,000 square feet.
- (3) No outdoor display or storage of merchandise or materials shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-588. NAICS 451120 – Arts & Crafts Retail Sales, Supply Stores

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I, M-X, and C-1 districts:

- (1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.
- (2) No outdoor display or storage of merchandise or materials shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-589. NAICS 44411 – Home Centers (Building Materials and Supplies)

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned property.
- (4) Drop-off and loading areas must be located in the rear yard.
- (5) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).

Sec. 86-590. NAICS 72233 – Mobile Food Services, Including Carts and Individual Food Trucks

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I and C-2 districts:

- (4) The commercial lot's parking supply exists in excess of that required by Code for uses or commercial space existing on the site and two off-street parking spaces shall be reserved for the exclusive use of customers of each mobile food vendor.
- (5) In addition to Mayor and Council, approval, must have the written and notarized permission of the commercial property owner.
- (6) Must not be parked overnight on any property within the City other than the business owner's residence.
- (7) Door to door solicitations are prohibited.
- (8) Hours of operation shall not exceed 8:00 am to 8:00 pm. for non-event sales.
- (9) For non-event sales, the sale of non-food items is prohibited.
- (10) For non-event sales, business must be contained within the vehicle(s). No tents or tables allowed to be set up outside of the vehicle(s).
- (11) Except in City designated "food truck courts", more than one mobile food service provider shall be on the same property.

Sec. 86-591. NAICS 722330 - Food Truck Courts and Parks (for profit and not-for-profit)

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, M-X, C-1 and C-2 districts:

- (1) The City may, in its discretion, allow for the concentrated parking of mobile food vendors at City designated sites, in addition to recognized City event sites.
- (2) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (3) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (4) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. No parking on City streets unless specifically authorized by the City.
- (5) Must present site plan to the City showing the spacing of vendors and the circulation of customers on the property.
- (6) Must meet all health department requirements (for profit and not-for-profit).

- (7) Adequate trash receptacles shall be provided on the premises to dispose of food wrappers, food utensils, paper products, cans, bottles, food and other such waste. Such receptacles shall be located no more than ten feet from each food truck. The food truck vendor shall be responsible for removing all trash, litter and refuse from the site at the end of each business day.
- (8) No LED strip lighting shall be used in conjunction with any food truck court.
- (9) Loudspeaker use shall conform to the City Noise Ordinance.
- (10) A minimum distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between any food truck and the entrance to any restaurant.
- (11) The food truck shall not be located within any required setback, any sight distance triangle or required buffer.
- (12) Access aisles sufficient to provide emergency access to any food truck shall be provided subject to approval by the fire marshal.
- (13) "Non-profit" food truck events, as referenced in O.C.G.A. 26-2-39, occurring in privately-owned food truck courts and parks shall be limited to four (4) events per calendar year.
- (14) All individual food truck participants within private food truck courts / parks shall be subject to an annual application and application fee submitted to the City of Jonesboro.

Sec. 86-592. NAICS 441228 - Motorcycle, ATV, and Other Vehicle Dealers

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I district:

(1) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I and C-1 districts:

- (1) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (2) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned property.

(9) No loudspeakers shall be used for announcements or hawking of products in conjunction with any farmers market.

Sec. 86-629. NAICS 4889 – Other Support Activities for Transportation

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Office must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (3) Heavy equipment and vehicles must be parked in the rear yard of the property.
- (4) Outdoor storage is permitted provided such storage is confined to the rear yard and is screened using fencing or landscaping which completely obscures the view from adjoining properties and public rights-of-way. Such screening shall have a minimum height of eight feet.

Sec. 86-630. NAICS 491 - Postal Service

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, and C-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between the property and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (3) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (4) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (5) Postal vehicles must be parked in the rear of the property.
- (6) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a residential district or use shall be three stories or 35 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 75 feet.

Sec. 86-631. NAICS 11142, 111421 - Nursery, Floriculture, and Tree Production

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

- (1) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (2) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (3) Premises must contain an administrative building.
- (4) Administrative office must be a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (5) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (6) Drop-off and loading areas must be located in the rear yard.

Sec. 86-632. NAICS 2211 – Power Generation and Supply

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between the property and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (4) All applicable State and Federal regulations must be met.

Sec. 86-633. NAICS 2212 - Natural Gas Distribution

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between the property and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (4) All applicable State and Federal regulations must be met.

Sec. 86-634. NAICS 2213 – Water, Sewage, and Other Systems

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between the property and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (4) All applicable State and Federal regulations must be met.

Sec. 86-635. NAICS 22132 – Sewage Treatment Facilities

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between the property and any adjacent, residentially-zoned property.
- (4) All applicable State and Federal regulations must be met.

Sec. 86-636. NAICS 713990 – Recreational Shooting Clubs

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) All shooting activities must be indoor only.

- (3) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (4) On-site parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (5) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned property.
- (6) All indoor shooting ranges shall be of soundproof construction whereby the sound from the discharge of any firearm and the impact of any projectile shall not be plainly audible across any adjoining property line or at a distance of 50 feet from the building, whichever distance is greater.
- (7) No piece of the projectile or target shall leave the building as a result of the activities taking place therein.
- (8) All weapons brought into any indoor shooting range shall be in a case designed for the weapon such that no part of a weapon is visible while inside the case. Certified law enforcement officers in uniform are exempt from this requirement.
- (9) All indoor shooting ranges shall comply with all local, state, and /or federal regulations related to indoor shooting ranges.
- (10) A site plan shall be submitted to the City, which shows the location of buildings, parking, etc.
- (11) At least one qualified individual in the sponsoring club or organization shall be properly certified for shooting range supervision. Each facility shall adopt safety rules and regulations subject to review by the City.
- (12) Shooting range design and operation shall conform to the most current standards of the National Rifle Association (NRA) Range Sourcebook.
- (13) The National Association of Shooting Ranges (NASR) and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) publication titled "Lead Management and OSHA Compliance for Indoor Shooting Ranges" shall be consulted in planning and constructing indoor shooting ranges.
- (14) No service or sales of alcoholic beverages shall be allowed within the shooting range facility or on the shooting range property.
- (15) The indoor shooting range shall be covered by accident and liability insurance, amount to be determined by the City of Jonesboro.

Sec. 86-637. NAICS 4453 – Beer, Wine, and Liquor Stores

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

(1) Must be located on a street having a classification of arterial (Tara Boulevard and Georgia Highway 138 Spur).

- (2) Must be located in a free-standing building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking) that is a minimum 10,000 square feet, is new, but in any case, not older than 20 years old since original construction and must be located in the C-2 Highway Commercial District zoning district, requiring a conditional use permit.
- (3) The retail package distilled spirits license shall be limited by population of the City according to the most recent decennial census, with one (1) such establishment allowed in the City for each 2400 residents.
- (4) Such additional regulations as would safeguard the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the City.

Sec. 86-638. - NAICS 44612 Cosmetics, Beauty Supplies, and Perfume Stores, with no care services.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 and H-2 districts:

- (1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.
- (2) No outdoor display or storage of merchandise or materials shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-639. - NAICS 44412 Paint and Wallpaper Stores.

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 and H-2 districts:

- (1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.
- (2) No outdoor display or storage of merchandise or materials shall be permitted.

Sec. 86-640. - NAICS 562920 Materials Recovery Facilities, Including Collection Bins for Recyclable Materials

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-2 districts:

For Buildings:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of three acres and a minimum frontage of 200 feet.
- (4) All recovery vehicles and equipment shall be located in the rear yard.
- (5) All loose materials shall be contained in proper receptacles.
- (6) A minimum 75-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned property.
- (7) All recovery vehicles and equipment shall be screened from the road and adjacent properties.

(8) All applicable State and Federal regulations shall be met.

For Collection Bins (Mobile structures for temporary storage of recyclable materials):

- (1) Shall not be located on any vacant or undeveloped lots, or any lots with a residential use.
- (2) Shall be limited to a maximum of one bin per single parcel of property and two bins per planned commercial centers or connected storefronts.
- (3) Shall not be located within any rights-of-way or easements, or adjacent to any paths or sidewalks.
- (4) Shall not be located in any designated parking areas, parking aisles, buffer areas, or fire lanes.
- (5) Shall not be located in any front yard of a building.
- (6) Bins shall be placed on a durable, all-weather surface.
- (7) Bins shall be made of painted metal or UV-resistant vinyl, fiberglass, or other durable, low-maintenance material.
- (8) Shall not be used as dumpsters, for rubbish, trash, or waste. Bin shall state for "recyclable materials only."
- (9) A business license for organizations using bins within the City of Jonesboro is required and written permission from the current property owner for use of the bin(s) must be obtained prior to issuance of a business license and placement on a property.
- (10) Bins shall be maintained in good repair and clean condition and free of materials accumulated outside of the bin.
- (11) If any bin violates any of these conditions <u>twice</u>, the City of Jonesboro shall direct the bin owner to remove the bin from the City after written notice is sent to the current property owner and the bin owner via certified mail or personal service.

Sec. 86-641. - NAICS 713990 Adult Entertainment Facilities

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

(1) Must comply with all requirements of Chapter 10, Article II.

Sec. 86-642. - NAICS 713990 Cigar Lounges, with or without alcoholic beverage service

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, MX, and C-2 districts:

- (1) Shall derive revenue from the sale of food, alcohol or other beverages that is incidental to the sale of the tobacco products;
- (2) Shall prohibit entry to a person under the age of 21 years of age during the time when the establishment is open for business;

- (3) Shall prohibit any food or beverage not sold directly by the business to be consumed on the premises;
- (4) Shall maintain a valid permit for the retail sale of cigar products;
- (5) Shall maintain a valid permit to operate a smoking bar issued by the Georgia Department of Revenue;
- (6) Shall abide by the provisions in Chapter 6 of the City Code regarding the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages;
- (7) Shall be and remain engaged in the business of selling cigars generated 40 percent or more of its total annual gross income from the on-site sale of such cigar products and the rental of humidors.
- (8) Shall be and remain registered with the State Health Department. A smoking bar registration shall remain in effect for one year and shall be renewable only if in the preceding calendar year the smoking bar generated 40 percent or more of its total annual gross income from the on-site sale of cigar products and the rental of on-site humidors;
- (9) Shall post signs at each entrance and exit clearly stating that smoking is allowed on all or part of the premises and anyone under the age of 21 is prohibited from entering the premises;
- (10) Outdoor seating and dining areas are prohibited in the Historic District;
- (11) Shall designate (where allowed) outdoor seating and dining areas within ten feet of an entrance or exit of the smoking bar as "non-smoking";
- (12) Cigar lounges must have and maintain a ventilation system that exhausts smoke from the business and is designed in accordance with current building code standards for the occupancy classification in use. The air handling systems from the smoking area shall be independent from the main air handling system that serves all other areas of the building and all air within the smoking area shall be exhausted directly to the outside by an exhaust fan. No air from the smoking area shall be recirculated to other parts of the building. During the hours of operation, the interior of the premises of a smoking bar shall be maintained with adequate illumination to make the conduct of patrons within the premises readily discernible to a person with normal vision.
- (13) Where allowed, outdoor smoking areas shall have no ashtrays remain outdoors after normal business hours.

Sec. 86-643. – NAICS 551114 Corporate management office

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) Establishments shall be limited to a maximum floor area of 2,000 square feet.

Sec. 86-644. - NAICS 561591 Convention Centers, Convention and Visitors Bureaus

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM district:

- (1) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (2) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (3) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (4) A minimum 50-foot wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, non-commercial use.
- (5) Height regulations. The maximum height for buildings abutting a non-commercial use shall be three stories or 45 feet as measured at any point 30 feet from any common property line. Building height may be increased one foot for every additional foot beyond a distance of 30 feet from any common property line.; however, no building shall ever exceed a total height of 60 feet.

Sec. 86-645. – NAICS 62191 Ambulance services (transportation)

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

(1) A minimum 25-foot-wide buffer shall be maintained between the facility (including ambulance parking areas) and any adjacent, residentially zoned properties.

Sec. 86-646. - NAICS 1125 Aquaculture

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (2) A minimum 25-foot-wide buffer shall be maintained between any beds, pools, or tanks associated with the facility and any adjacent, residentially zoned properties.

Sec. 86-647. – NAICS 11291 Apiculture (Beekeeping)

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one-half acre and a minimum frontage of 100 feet.
- (2) A minimum 25-foot-wide buffer shall be maintained between hive structures and adjacent properties.

Sec. 86-648. – NAICS 1152 Support Activities for Animal Production

The following conditions are assigned in the M-1 district:

- (1) Must be established on a lot having a minimum area of one acre and a minimum frontage of 150 feet.
- (2) A minimum 25-foot-wide buffer shall be maintained between any structures associated with the facility and adjacent properties.

Sec. 86-649. – "Tiny" Homes, with permanent foundations

The following conditions are assigned in the MX district:

- (1) Shall only be part of a mixed-use development with a minimum parent tract size of 87,120 square feet (two acres).
- (2) Minimum dwelling size shall be 500 square feet (heated).
- (3) Site plan for development, including lot size and width, setbacks, density, and any necessary buffers, shall be reviewed and approved by the Mayor and City Council.
- (4) A minimum of three different exterior elevations shall be provided for tiny house developments.

Sec. 86-650. – Guest Quarters / Mother-in-law Suites, accessory to principal dwelling

The following conditions are assigned in the R-2, R-4, H-1, H-2, and MX districts:

- (1) Shall only be located in the rear yard of the principal dwelling.
- (2) Shall not be located on a lot without a principal dwelling.
- (3) Maximum dwelling size (heated) shall be 750 square feet.
- (4) Shall match exterior style, color, and material.

Sec. 86-651. – NAICS 561990 Business Incubator, hosting administrative office suites

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, C-1, and M-1 districts:

- (1) All individual businesses within shall be administrative uses only, with no excessive levels of noise, fumes, or traffic.
- (2) All individual businesses within shall be required to obtain their own business license.
- (3) No large trucks vehicles or equipment associated with businesses shall be parked on the property.
- (4) Suites shall not be used primarily as storage units.

Sec. 86-652. – NAICS 811111, 81112, 811112, 811113, 811118, 811198, 811121 All Types of Vehicle Repair and Maintenance, but not Oil Change and Lubrication Shops

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

- (1) No vehicles in a state of disrepair shall be parked or stored in view of the street or adjacent residential areas.
- (2) All applicable regulations concerning the proper storage and disposal of fluids shall be observed.
- (3) A 25-foot-wide vegetative buffer shall be established between repair facilities and adjacent residential properties.
- (4) No junkyard or salvage yard shall occur on the property.
- (5) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.

Sec. 86-653. – NAICS 811412 Appliance Repair and Maintenance

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 districts:

(1) No appliances in a state of disrepair shall be stored outside.

Sec. 86-654. – NAICS 8113 Commercial and Industrial Machinery and Equipment (except Automotive and Electronic) Repair and Maintenance; No Outdoor Storage

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 districts:

- (1) No machinery or equipment in a state of disrepair shall be stored outside.
- (2) A 50-foot-wide vegetative buffer shall be established between repair facilities and adjacent residential properties.

Sec. 86-655. - NAICS 611691 Small-scale Tutoring and Exam Preparation, 10 students or less

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 districts:

- (1) Tutoring services shall not be located in stand-alone buildings or suites larger than 2000 square feet.
- (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided for 2 to 3 students simultaneously.

Sec. 86-656. - NAICS 44420 Mulch and Gravel Sales, Outdoor Yards

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 and M-1 districts:

- (1) Shall not be located on a property less than one acre in size.
- (2) No products or equipment shall be visible from the street.
- (3) A 50-foot-wide vegetative buffer shall be established between facilities and adjacent residential properties.

Sec. 86-657. – NAICS 451110 Firearms Dealers, Physical Store

The following conditions are assigned in the O&I and C-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located in a stand-alone building (no planned centers, connected storefronts sharing a common wall, or lots with zero lot line development or shared parking).
- (2) A minimum 25-foot-wide buffer shall be maintained between built elements (including paved parking areas) of the proposed facility and any adjacent, non-commercial use.
- (3) No gun testing or target practice shall occur on the premises.
- (4) All ATF regulations shall be observed.

Sec. 86-658. – NAICS 221118 Electronic Vehicle Charging Stations

The following conditions are assigned in the CCM, RM, H-1, H-2, O&I, MX, C-1, C-2, and M-1 districts:

- (1) EV stations are considered accessory to the primary use on the property.
- (2) Site plan for stations shall be reviewed and approved by the Mayor and City Council.
- (3) Charging station outlets and connector devices shall be no higher than 48 inches from the surface where mounted. Equipment mounted on pedestals, lighting posts, bollards, or other devices shall be designed and located as to not impede pedestrian travel or create trip hazards on sidewalks.
- (4) Adequate battery charging station protection, such as concrete-filled steel bollards, shall be used. Curbing may be used in lieu of bollards, if the battery charging station is setback a minimum of 24 inches from the face of the curb.
- (5) Electric vehicle charging stations shall be maintained in all respects, including the functioning of the equipment. A phone number or other contact information shall be provided on the equipment for reporting when it is not functioning or other problems are encountered.
- (6) Unless otherwise directed by the City, within ninety (90) days of cessation of use of the electric vehicle charging station, the property owner or operator shall restore the site to its original condition. Should the property owner or operator fail to complete said removal within ninety (90) days, the [local government] shall conduct the removal and disposal of improvements at the property owner or operator's sole cost and expense.

Sec. 86-659. – NAICS 81219 Other Personal Care Services, including Day Spa and Med Spa, but not Tattoo Parlor or Massage Therapy

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, and MX districts:

- (1) Day spa services include body wraps, body scrubs, waxing, and facials, but not hair care or massage.
- (2) Med spa services include non-surgical face lifts, microdermabrasion, collage induction therapy, chemical peels, botox applications, and skin disease treatments, but not hair care or massage.

Sec. 86-660. – NAICS 45111 Sporting Goods Stores, but not Firearms Dealers

The following conditions are assigned in the C-1 district:

- (1) Shall not be located in stand-alone buildings or suites larger than 4000 square feet.
- (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided onsite.

Sec. 86-661. - NAICS 451110 Firearms Dealers, Online sales only

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 district:

- (1) No gun testing or target practice shall occur on the premises.
- (2) All ATF regulations shall be observed.
- (3) No walk-in customers are allowed.

Sec. 86-662. - NAICS 712110 Selfie Museums

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1 and H-2 districts:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of collector or greater.
- (2) Shall not be located in building suites larger than 2000 square feet.
- (3) No photographic activities or props shall occur outside of the building.
- (4) No props of an obscene nature shall be permitted, as defined in the Adult Entertainment Ordinance, Sec. 10-32, for public indecency, specified sexual activities, and specified anatomical areas.

Sec. 86-663. - NAICS 811191 Automotive Oil Change and Lubrication Shops

The following conditions are assigned in the C-2 district:

- (1) Must be located on a street having a classification of arterial.
- (2) All applicable regulations concerning the proper storage and disposal of fluids shall be observed.
- (3) No vehicles in a state of disrepair shall be parked or stored in view of the street or adjacent residential areas.
