"Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

"The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402.

"The day of September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September 18, respectively. Also, Columbus Day or Día de la Raza, which is October 12, falls within this 30-day period."

"Hispanic heritage holds an indelible place in the heart and soul of our Nation, and National Hispanic Heritage Month reminds us that the American identity is a fabric of diverse traditions and stories woven together. Since the beginning, our country has drawn strength and insights from Hispanic writers, scientists, soldiers, doctors, entrepreneurs, academics, and leaders in labor and government. Our culture has been enriched by the rhythms, art, literature, and creativity of Hispanic peoples. And our deepest values have been informed by the love of family and faith that is at the core of so many Hispanic communities. 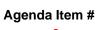

Attached, hereto, is the presentation of the Financial Statements for the Seven-month period ended July 31, 2023.

Highlights:

July 2023 operating results presents activity for the 1st 7(seven) months of the current fiscal year. The current general fund revenue received year to date as of July 31, 2023 is \$4,390,799 or 54% of the budget. Comparatively, July 31, 2022, revenue recognized was \$2,,899,405 or 52%. In 2023 we are seeing improved revenue results in Court Services, Business Licenses, and investment revenues.

July 2023 expenditures of \$3,840,533 presents activity for the first 7 months of the current fiscal year. This amount includes items encumbered in the current fiscal year using the purchase order system. A lookback at 2022 operations shows that expenditures in July 2022 were \$3,766,085 or 62% Except for general insurance premiums, these increases were anticipated and remain in alignment with the adopted budget. Staff is encouraged to use the purchase requisitioning process to generate purchase orders as a tool to help manage budgets and avoid spending overages. Purchase Orders represent approval to expend city funds and create a tool for vendors to respond to the buyer with confidence that they will be paid when the order is fulfilled.

Any revenues received that exceed budgeted revenues will be used to 1st increase the contingency reserve. This increase in the contingency reserve will then be evaluated to appropriate the required amounts necessary to cover any unbudgeted or underbudgeted expense lines. This analysis will include consideration of the insurance premiums expenses for Commercial General Liability and Umbrella Policy premiums that increased in 2023 as the result of a new facility and the city's current industry experience rating.

Processes and procedures are reviewed regularly to be sure that we fully leverage current technology and enhance operational and reporting results for internal and external users. We actively research any opportunity to improve processes, reduce waste, increase efficiency, and safeguard city assets. These findings will be presented as they become available.

Glossary of Terms for Fund Accounting and Reporting

Fund Accounting is an accounting system emphasizing accountability rather than profitability. It is commonly used by non-profit organizations, public service entities, and governmental entities and authorities. Below are some common terms used.

Fund is a self-balancing set of accounts, segregated for specific purposes in accordance with laws and regulations or special restrictions and limitations.

Fund Balance is the total accumulation of operating surpluses and deficits since the beginning of a local government's existence. The Fund Balance Formula: Fund Balance = Assets – Liabilities.

Budget - an estimation of revenue and expenses over a specified fiscal period and is usually compiled and re-evaluated on a periodic basis. See Budget Amendments and Budget Transfers.

Balanced Budget is a constitutional rule requiring that a municipality cannot spend more than its income. It requires a balance between the projected receipts and expenditures of the government.

Budget Amendments – are changes to the operating or capital budget that results in an increase to expenses funded by revenues or an increase in the revenues for the operating budget. It may include an increase or decrease to expenses funded by reserves or debt financing for the capital budget.

Budget Transfers – are submitted in anticipation of incurred or upcoming commitments or expenditures so that the budget reflects the actual plans and spending of the department. These transactions move funds from one account to another and maintain a balanced budget.

Contingency reserve refers to a general ledger allocation in the budget at a high level that is specifically reserved for expenditure unknowns. This contingency reserve will be appropriated by Council approval following the identification of expense needs and uncertain events that occur during the budget year.

Encumber or Encumbrance - Setting aside an amount as a planned expense or obligation. The normal mechanism for encumbering an amount is through a purchase order.

Purchase Order - a commercial document and first official offer issued by a buyer (Jonesboro) to a seller (vendor), that indicates types, quantities, and agreed prices for products or services. It is used to provide proof of approval to expend city funds, to minimize overspending budget lines, and to control the purchasing of products and services from external suppliers.

ALL Funds Description and Purpose

General Fund (100) -Accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund

Confiscated Assets Funds –Accounts for Federal (211) and State (210) activity related to revenues received from court dispositions. Resources are restricted for Public Safety needs.

LMIG Funds (212) - Accounts for DOT Grant awards and expenses to repair Jonesboro City streets. Matching funds to complete road improvements will be provided by SPLOST 2015 (325) Fund Balance

ARPA Fund (230) Accounts for the Treasury funds provided to remediate business operations that may have been impacted by the Covid 19 pandemic that began in March 2020. \$1.8 M was received and will be expended by December 2026.

Hotel Motel Fund (275) accounts for activity related to taxes remitted by hotel operators in the City limits. Each local government imposing a Hotel-Motel Tax is required to adopt a budget plan specifying how the expenditure requirements of the Georgia Code will be met.

Other Grant fund (250) will track CDBG grant awards and expenditures for Housing Redevelopment and Sidewalk. This is a reimbursable grant with a completion date of December 31, 2023.

Technology Funds (290) accounts for Court activity that provides the operating resources of this fund. Disbursements are in support of IT services and technology support for court operations.

SPLOST (320-330) Funds account for taxes collected to fund projects approved in the most recent IGA. A portion of the proceeds will cover the City Center debt service requirements.

Solid Waste Fund (540) records activity related to Sanitation and Refuse and solid waste services provided to the City Residents and businesses. The fees is billed annually on the tax bill.

Financial Report Summary July 2023

- July 2023 operating results presents activity for the 1st 7(seven) months of the current fiscal year. - § A mid year budget amendment has been prepared and is presented as a separated item at the September 11th combined meeting. Staff seeks council consideration and approval.

Financial Report Summary- continued July 2023

- § ARPA funds were awarded to the City in 2021. The \$1,852,000 award has been received in full. Council designated a spending plan for ARPA funds in 2022. To date \$956,097 has been expended on essential staff and technology enhancements. The remaining \$896,894 must be fully expended by December 2026.
- § City Center Rentals and Concessions are trending lower than anticipated as a result of the moratorium on facility rentals. With holiday events and other rentals, this line item may improve.
- § Property Tax revenue for tax bills mailed in 2022 supports the 2022 budget. The 2023 tax bills are expected to be calculated using the current 8 mils. 2022 taxes collected in the current fiscal year \$481,015.
- § Occupation/Business License Tax is \$457,209 or 114%
- § LOST Revenue is \$818,094 or 51.1%
- **Second Service Payments** year to date is \$1,267,195. Remaining to be paid \$271,899.

The Revenue and Expense statements that accompany this narrative provides a summarization and detail of the City's operating results to date for the General fund, Special Revenue and Proprietary funds.

All approved budget amendments are reflected in the reports as you will note that the budget is now referred to as "amended" versus "adopted".

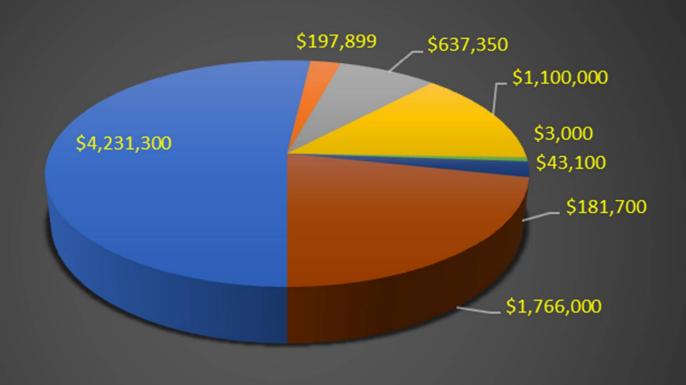

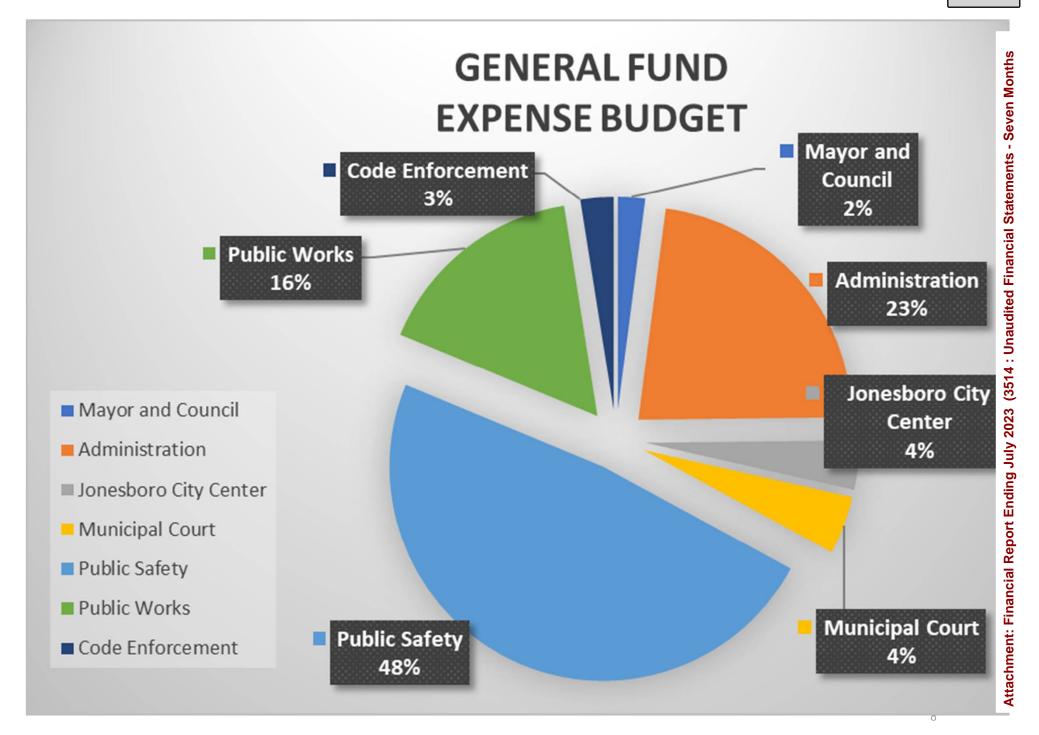

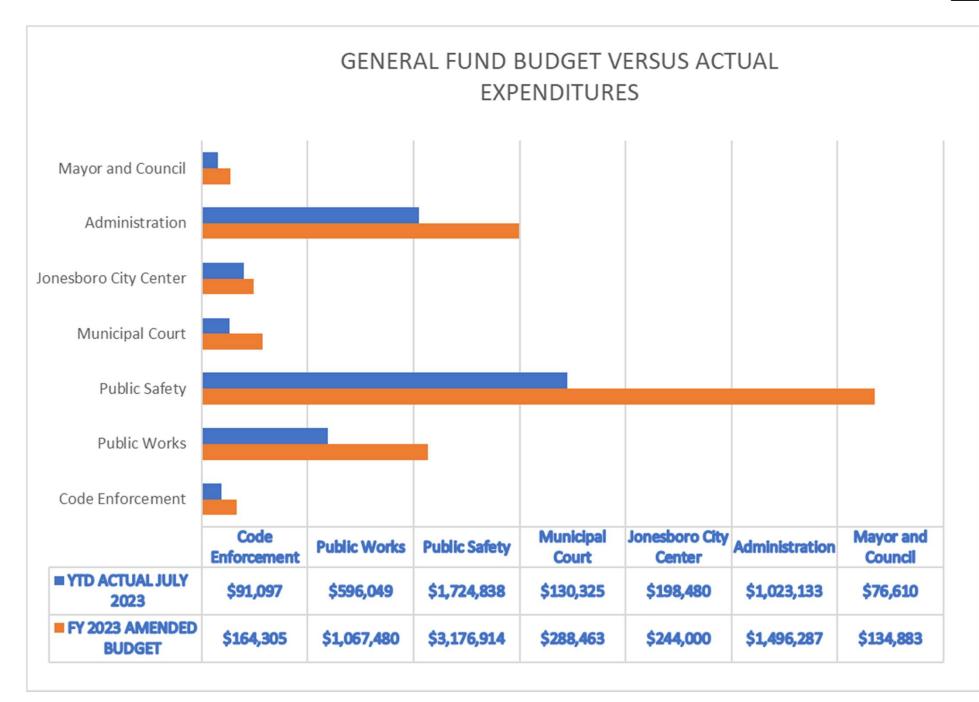

Financial Revenue Review ALL FUNDS SUMMARY Period Ended June 30, 2023

General Fund Revenue— As of the current operating period, revenue recognized in the general fund is \$4,390,799 or 54% of the adopted \$8,160,349 budget revenue for the FY 2023

Confiscated Assets Funds Revenue—Federal and State confiscated Assets reflect all current activity related to revenues received from court dispositions of state and federal cases. Year to date \$19,376 in Federal funds are recognized in 2023. The funds are restricted for Public Safety initiatives as outlined by the Equitable Assets Sharing guidelines - https://www.justice.gov/criminal-afmls/file/794696/download. As of this report, no funds have been appropriated or expended. Police department leadership has been advised to review their **unbudgeted** needs to determine the best use of these restricted funds in FY 2024 budget process.

LMIG Funds Revenue - DOT Grant was awarded and revenue of \$59,294 was received in July 2022. In Fiscal year 2023, an additional \$60,000 was awarded and received to be used to repair city roadways. The county provides the labor, and the city reimburses for the materials. The sum of the two grants were budgeted to be expended. SPLOST 15 resources will provide the matching funds to complete the work in 4th quarter 2023.

Other Grant Funds Revenue—records the CDBG grant awards for sidewalks and housing redevelopment. These projects are required to be substantially complete by December 31, 2023. A collaboration of efforts by the Mainstreet Director, Public Works Director and Community Development Director will assure these grant funds are used as intended and grant compliance is adhered to.

ARPA Funds Revenue year to date reflects that \$1,852,991 awarded has been received in the city's accounts. The use of these resources were outlined in the directives of council. Resources are being managed to assure all funds are committed and expended per council directives and SLPRF guidelines.

Hotel Motel Fund Revenue Georgia law authorizes a Hotel-Motel Tax under various conditions. The city is required to expend the taxes collected in strict accordance with the provisions of the specific authorizations in the Georgia Code. Clayton County Visitors Bureau receives a monthly payment of all restricted funds.

Technology Fund Revenue records inflow of receipts from Court activity and disbursements related to the ongoing IT support services contract with 3rd party IT support, currently VC3.

SPLOST Funds Revenue proceeds from SPLOST 21 are designated to cover a portion of the City Center debt service requirements. Other SPLOST 15 funds combined with LMIG state funds will cover road repairs.

Solid Waste Fund Revenue records proceeds from annual Sanitation and Refuse invoices. The annual sanitation fee revenue is included on the city tax bill and is due at the same time as the property tax bill.

Financial Expense Review ALL FUNDS SUMMARY Period Ended June 30, 2023

General Fund Expense— For the FY 2023 operating period ending May 31, 2023, expenditures recorded year to date are \$3,892,466 and includes debt service of \$1,270,083. Total expensed and encumbered to date represents the use of 45% of adopted expense budget for the FY 2023. April 2022 expenditures were \$2,299,000. The increase in expenses is directly related to debt service that was paid in 2023 but not paid in 2022.

Confiscated Assets Funds Expenses – Federal and State confiscated reflect all current activity related to revenues received from court dispositions. No funds were expended as of April 30, 2023.

LMIG Funds Expense - The sum of the two grants awards were budgeted to be expended in 2023. Funds accumulated in the fund balance will be used in conjunction with SPLOST 15 funds on hand to pay for the road repairs in 2023. The total grant funds available for road repairs is approximately \$118K. When the invoice is received from Clayton County, SPLOST 15 reserves will be used to supplement the payment.

Other Grant Funds Expenses – records the CDBG grant awards for sidewalks and housing redevelopment. These projects are required to be substantially complete by December 31, 2023

ARPA Funds Expenses year to date total expense is \$956,097. A total of \$896,894 remains to be expended. The expenditures align with the directives of the governing body. Resources are being managed to assure all funds are obligated by December 2024 and expended by December 2026 per council directives and SLPRF guidelines.

Hotel Motel Fund Expenses are trending as budgeted. These expense reflect payment to Clayton County Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Technology Fund Expenses records inflow of receipts from Court activity and disbursements related to the ongoing IT support services contract.

SPLOST Funds Expenses proceeds from SPLOST 21 are designated to cover a portion of the City Center debt service requirements. Other SPLOST 15 funds combined with LMIG state funds will cover road repairs.

Solid Waste Fund Expenses Expenditures in this fund are directly related to the operations needed to provide solid waste services to the citizens of Jonesboro. These expenses include salaries, professional disposal services and other operating costs. In 2023, \$80,500 of fund balance was used to acquire capital assets.

At the end of 2022. The unassigned fund balance for the general funds was \$5,958,693 which is 91% of total general fund expenditures indication a healthy financial status.

The City's total long-term debt decreased by \$596,774 during 2022.

He stated the area of the development is recognized as a downtown property and the use have been modified to include a viable mixture of retail, offices and residential. He stated that the council have talked about diversifying our housing stock and if approved by the council maybe it will be the catalyst for redeveloping the area.

Mayor Pro Tem Messick inquired about the location of the development near the railroad and if a noise study has been conducted. She also inquired about if the development would be for profit or non-profit. Will the units be sold to individuals or investors. Will the building materials be comparable to what is currently in the historic district.

The Interim City Manager stated that the material will be brick and hardy plank he does not see a problem.

Councilman Don Dixon stated the property will need a fence to protect the

children while playing in the because they have no backyard.

Mayor Sartor stated that she would like to see pictures of the fence.

Councilman A. Dixon inquired about a traffic study.

Attorney Coney stated that they have not conducted a traffic study. They're planning to leave as many trees as possible for a noise buffer - they will also be putting up an 8-foot-tall fence to reflect noise.

Mayor Pro Tem Messick asked will the streets running through the development be public streets or private. Interim City Manager David Allen stated - the city will own the streets.

City Attorney Matricardi stated that the city will have to accept the dedication of the streets first, after acceptance of the streets the city will be responsible for the maintenance.

Mr. Knight came forward and gave a brief history of his relationship with the City of Jonesboro. He confirmed that the development will be for profit not for investors.

City Attorney Matricardi suggested adding a clause to the to the covenant agreement that only a certain percentage of the homes will be rentals.

Councilman Don Dixon inquired about the single grave on the property. Who will maintain and parking for the family members.

Mr. Knight stated that if the zoning is successful, they will then move forward with other requirements such as traffic and noise study. You do not normally conduct traffic studies for 90 homes.

City Clerk Melissa Brooks came forward and gave an overview of the request. She stated that the City of Jonesboro held a Special Election on March 21, 2023, for a cost of \$23,000. The estimated cost for the November 7, 2023, election is \$24,000. She stated that it would be a benefit for the City of Jonesboro to enter into an agreement with Clayton County Elections Board to conduct the November Municipal Election. She stated that the county has the staff and the infrastructure to conduct an efficient and effective election. This would mean for the City of Jonesboro cost savings of about \$12,000.

Attorney Matricardi stated that if the city enters into an agreement with the county for election provisions - the attached ordinance will need to be adopted.

DISCUSSION:

- -For the record Mayor Sartor stated the following:
- -It's been voted that the city will run the November 7, 2023, election.
- -It was \$20,000 in the 2023 budget for the election the last Special Election was \$23,000, which was \$3000 over budget.
- -The March 2023 Special Election was ran with a city manager we no longer have a city manager.
- -By denying this the council is saying that you will not take the most cost effective route.
- -After speaking with staff, it's a stress on the day-to-day operations when city staff has to cover the election.
- -Mayor Sartor stated that if the city ran the election, it would cost about \$23,000 if the county ran the election, it would cost \$11,000.
- -Mayor Pro Tem stated that I think it is worth the \$13,000 to ensure that the citizens votes are counted properly. We had problems with the county We had special meetings to discuss entering an agreement with the county it took eight emails and finally had to hold a Special Called meeting to get someone from the county to come and speak with the council to tell us that they would

like to handle the city's election. At the same time, she stated that no other municipality allows the county to conduct their election. The county has such a vast amount handle. I want to be sure that the city's election is handled properly. We owe that to the people that voted for us. I trust our staff. She stated that there's only one other polling place for our voters to vote - Lee Street Elementary. Lee Street Elementary very near to the City Center. I had one complaint about voting at the City Center. Most people stated that they enjoyed coming here to vote. When the City Center was built, we focused on how to make the City Center voter friendly. How can we make the entrances - easy in and easy out. I don't think that should be put to the side.

Mayor Sartor stated for clarification, the county will come here (City Center) to run the election.

Clayton County Elections Director Shuan Dozier came forward. She stated that the county has conducted elections for other municipalities in the county. Currently, they have entered IGA's with Lake City and Morrow, and are working on an IGA with the City of Forest Park.

Mayor asked the Elections Director the following questions:

- -Have you ever received citation/violations from the State for not conducting an election correctly? No.
- -Do you foresee running the city's election as a problem. No. I think it would be more convenient for the voters. It would give the voters more options to vote in different locations. They will also be able to vote during the county's extended hours.
- Will there be a countywide election on November 7, 2023. Not officially, the Board of Election has placed on the calendar for a countywide election.

COMMENTS FROM ELECTION DIRECTOR

- -If the city does not enter an IGA with the county, voters will be faced with going to two different voting places on November 7th.
- -Elections Director stated that for \$11,700 the county will do everything for the city's election except qualifying. We guarantee not to exceed \$11,700.
- -If the county conducts the countywide election the county will not be able to provide the city with election equipment. The county will be utilizing all equipment for their polling sites.

During early voting, Jonesboro voters can go to any of the Clayton County ran voting sites.

Mayor Sartor pointed out that if the city contracts with the county - voters will have two (2) early voting locations in the city to vote.

Mayor Sartor called for the vote. The vote was unanimous to deny entering an IGA to allow the county to conduct the November 7, 2023, Municipal Election.

DISCUSSION

She spoke about social media and the recent attack on her and two others regarding a Facebook posting of a meme on her personal Facebook. She stated that there should be an apology for former Mayor Joy Day, former Councilwoman Pat Sebo-Hand and herself. The posting was not directed toward anyone.

Pat Sebo-Hand came forward to speak about the Fire Station- item moved to Executive Session.

She inquired about the county's plans regarding the fire station and their timeline.

Georgia Moore came forward to speak about her difficulty in getting to two separate polling locations. We must stick together. We must pray for the Mayor and the City Council.

Ms. Benita came forward to speak about the voting locations.

Mr. Zaldibar of East Point came forward to speak about the voting locations.

Representative Eric Bell came forward and thanked the city for allowing him to host his Home Buyer Seminar in the Community Room. He stated that he wished that the city would reconsider allowing the county to conduct the November election. He stated that one of the opposing members of council could bring the item up for reconsideration.

Janet Collins came forward to speak about the need for additional care for the children in the city.

Penny Facet came forward to give acknowledgement to Derry Walker, Pat Daniel, and Police Chief Tommy Henderson for service to the city.

Brittney Burns with URGE came forward to speak at the reconsideration to allow Clayton County to conduct November's election. She stated that anything that makes voting harder is voter suppression.

DeVane Jennings came forward and stated he will try to make his comments polite, but I am now going to speak my mind because silence in the face of evil is evil itself. He stated that he loves various members of staff, but the City Council is ridiculous. It was mentioned earlier that we apologies and need and Ethics Board - "I want an apology as well"! He talked about the need to have multiple voting locations and hopes that the Council will reconsider allowing the County to conduct the election.

Mayor Sartor stated that she takes Public Comments very seriously. She stated that whenever I offend someone as the mayor, I have to own up to it. A 457b retirement plan is a tax-advantaged savings plan designed for public sector employees to bridge the gap between what they need to maintain their lifestyle in retirement and what they get from the non-contributory GMA pension plan offered by the City of Jonesboro. It also provides a source of liquid assets in retirement plans for emergencies and unexpected expenses. Offering this plan can help attract and retain top talent while assisting employees to secure their financial well-being in retirement. This additional benefit is expected to improve morale and foster a better work environment.

First, it allows employees to save more for retirement. In 2023, employees can save up to **\$22,500** into their 457b plan on a tax-deferred or Roth basis. Additionally, for employees over age 50, a "catch-up" provision allows an additional **\$7,500** to be saved each year. This is particularly important for those needing to catch up on retirement savings.

Second, a 457b plan provides tax advantages. Contributions are usually made with pre-tax dollars, which lowers an employee's tax bill. The investment earnings on a 457b plan are also tax-deferred until they are withdrawn in retirement. Moreover, a 457b plan can also allow for Roth contributions, which grow tax-free and are tax-free when withdrawn in retirement.

Third, a 457b plan can help employees bridge the gap to their financial goals in retirement and inspire confidence that they'll be able to maintain their quality of life. Furthermore, it offers flexibility as it does not have an early withdrawal penalty if an employee retires before age 59½.

Recently, the applicant completed a zoning verification form for massage therapy in one of the suites at the above address. The Table of Uses requires a conditional use permit for this particular kind of use, with the following conditions:

Sec. 86-533. NAICS 812199 - Massage Therapy, State Licensed Only

The following conditions are assigned in the H-1, H-2, O&I, M-X and C-1 districts:

- (1) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided.
- (2) All individuals performing massage therapy must be licensed by the State of Georgia.

The days and hours of operation would be Monday through Sunday, 10 am to 5 pm. It would be by individual appointment only, no walk-ins allowed. The applicant would be the only employee. The suite is 80 square feet.

- The State license of the person that will do the massage is enclosed in the agenda packet.

- The closest parking category for this type of use is *personal service establishments such* as *barber shops and* hair salons shall provide two spaces per customer station (Section 86-410(16)).

There are 20 parking spaces available for customers and employees across Main Street. With only one massage therapist and each customer by appointment only, a maximum of 2 spaces are required for the massage therapy business at any given time. The spaces already provided should be more than adequate to accommodate this type of business and not infringe on other businesses in the area.

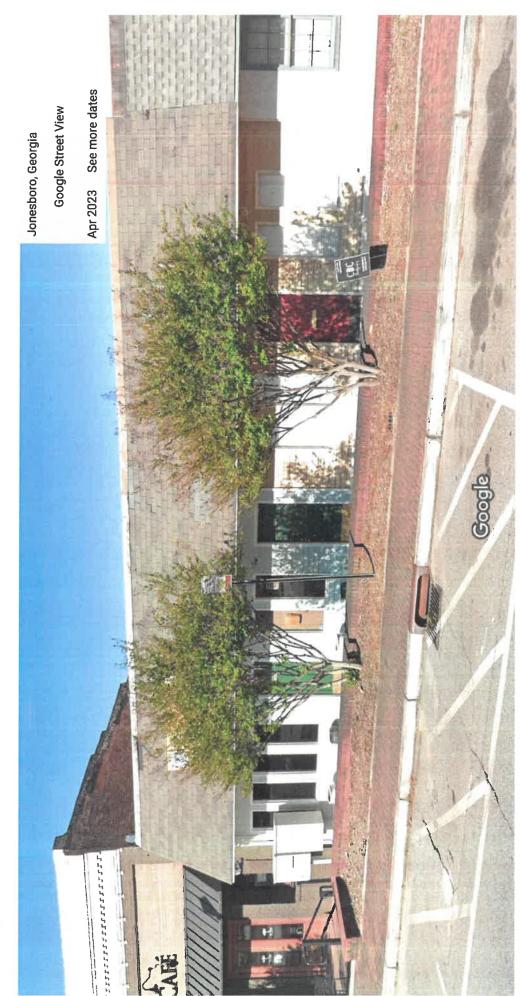

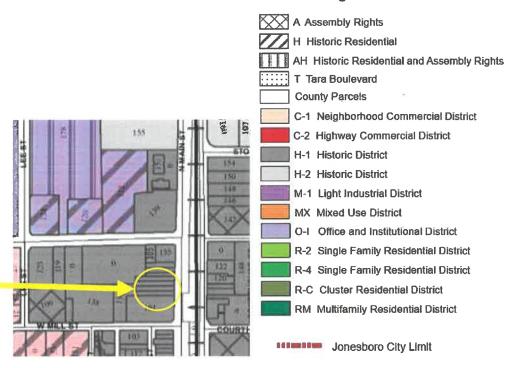

Agency recommendation – Approval of Conditional Use application, with revised plan; In July 2023, the applicant applied for a zoning request for a daycare at the subject property, which requires a conditional use permit. Zoned O&I (Office-Institutional), there is already a functional building and paved parking lot there. There are currently only access drives to Williamson Mill Road, which quickly turns onto North Avenue. The building was recently renovated for salon suites, but the owner was not able to make that use come to fruition. Before that, the property was the location of the Millar Law Firm. This property is adjacent to the old Jonesboro City Hall at 124 North Avenue.

Per the applicant, there would be up to 75 children participating daily. Operating days and times would be Monday through Friday, 6:30 am to 6:30 pm. As the building is two-story, there would be classes (based on age groups) on both floors.

(Note: The site plan requirements on page 3 of the application are typically for new developments that involve rezonings.)

The City Code provides a definition for "day care center":

DAY CARE CENTER

Any place operated by a person, society, agency, corporation, institution, or group wherein are received, for pay, for group care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody 19 or more children under 18 years of age.

The standards for daycares focus on the "Bright From the Start" program standards for children:

(1) Every child day care facility shall provide proof of an approved Georgia Department of Human Services registration certificate prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and shall conform to all applicable local, state, and federal standards, including Bright From the Start current program standards, O.C.G.A. Chapter 591-1-1. The applicant will provide the certificate.

An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:

- (a) Size requirements.
 - (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed

capacity for children. At 75 children planned daily, this would equal 100 x (75 divided by three 100 x 25 = minimum 2500 square foot outdoor play area required. The site plan states that a square feet of playground area has been provided for. Rough measurements by staff of the property confirm that a 2500 square foot playground is possible to the side and rear of the property.

- (2) For Centers with a licensed capacity of <u>18 or fewer</u> children first licensed after April 21, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times the center's licensed capacity for children. With 75 children daily, this requirement would not be applicable.
- (b) Playground Occupancy. At least one hundred (100) square feet shall be available for each child occupying the outside play area at any one time. Groups of children may be rotated if necessary so that one hundred (100) square feet per child is provided at all times. At 75 children planned daily, this would equal 100 x 75 = maximum 7500 square feet coverage required. At about 25 of the children outside on any shift, the minimum coverage required would be 2500 square feet.
- (c) Location. Playgrounds shall be adjacent to the Center or in an area which can be reached by a safe route or method approved by the Department. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have shaded areas. The paved and grass areas to the north and east of the building would be used for the playground area. Some portions of existing concrete would have to be removed. Bright From the Start will allow certain overlays of existing hard surfaces.
- (d) Fence or Approved Barriers. Playgrounds shall be protected from traffic or other hazards by a four (4) foot or higher secure fence or other barrier approved by this Department. Fencing material shall not present a hazard to children and shall be maintained so as to prevent children from leaving the playground area by any means other than through an approved access route. Fence gates shall be kept closed except when persons are entering or exiting the area. So noted.
- (e) Playground Surfaces. Except in School-age Centers, the playground shall have a surface suitable for varied activities. Hard surfaces, such as gravel, concrete, or paving shall not exceed one-fourth (1/4) of the total playground area. So noted. However, Bright From the

Start will allow certain overlays of existing hard surfaces.

- (f) Equipment. Playground equipment shall provide an opportunity for the children to engage in a variety of experiences and shall be age-appropriate. For example, toddlers shall not be permitted to swing in swings designed for School-age Children. The outdoor equipment shall be free of lead-based paint, sharp corners and shall be regularly maintained in such a way as to be free of rust and splinters that could pose significant safety hazard to the children. All equipment shall be arranged so as not to obstruct supervision of children. So noted.
 - (g) Anchoring of Certain Equipment. Climbing and swinging equipment shall be anchored. So noted.
- (h) Fall Zones and Surfacing. Climbing and swinging equipment shall have a resilient surface beneath the equipment and the fall zone from such equipment must be adequately maintained by the Center to assure continuing resiliency. So noted.
- (i) Safety and Upkeep of Playground. Playgrounds shall be kept clean, free from litter and free of hazards, such as but not limited to rocks, exposed tree roots and exposed sharp edges of concrete. So noted.

 (2) Off-street parking and/or drop-off space adequate to meet the needs of the proposed facility shall be provided. No on-street parking shall be permitted in conjunction with any child day care facility.

The City Code minimum parking requirements for day cares are as follows:

Section 86-410 (33) Kindergarten, day care centers and nursery schools shall provide one space for each employee and one space for every ten students, plus an area sufficient for the safe and convenient loading and unloading of students.

At one space for every ten students -75/10 = 8 spaces required.

At one space for each employee (approximately 6) = 6 spaces required.

Total parking required = 14 spaces.

Per the site plan, there will be 10 parking spaces provided at the property, after the site is modified.

Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon finding that the proposed facility is within 500 feet of an establishment licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages or within 500 feet of potentially hazardous land uses or activities that present unacceptable risks to operation of a child day care facility. "Potentially hazardous land uses or activities" include, but are not limited to, gasoline service stations, heavy industrial operations, storage of flammable materials, high pressure underground pipelines or truck or rail loading areas. Mayor and Council may attach conditions to an approval or may deny approval of a child day care facility upon a finding that traffic conditions present unacceptable risks to operation of the facility and/or the safety of children proposed to be served by the facility or that traffic impacts associated with the proposed facility would substantially jeopardize the appropriate use of neighboring properties.

There is a convenience store / gas station selling alcohol beverages within 390 feet of the subject property there are no other potentially hazardous land uses within 500 feet of the subject property. No evacuation phas been provided.

Staff recommendation: Denial of application; While staff does not feel that the presence of the convenience store / gas station would be a significant issue, the site lacks enough parking, and the most significant reason for denial would be traffic circulation on and off the property. The property has inadequate room for smooth drop-off and pick-up of 75 children, which could cause backup of parents' vehicles onto Williamson Mill Road and possibly busy North Avenue. The nearby intersection of Williamson Mill Road and North Avenue is a very awkward intersection.

Should the Mayor and Council choose to approve this application, the following minimum approval conditions should apply:

- 1. All required elements (playground, fencing, etc.) must be completely installed prior to obtaining a business license to legally operate.
- 2. Use of Massengale Park playground, pavilion, and parking spaces by day care participants is prohibited. Update, 9.5.23:

The applicant has provided a revised site plan and an evacuation plan, which greatly improves the application (traffic and safety). Based on this, staff recommends approval of the revised site plan.

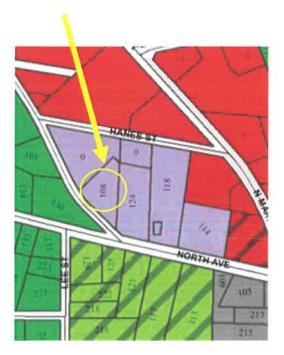
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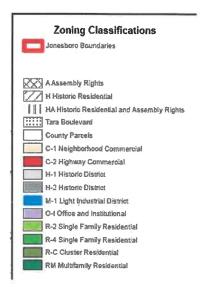

Any place operated by a person, society, agency, corporation, institution, or group wherein are received, for pay, for group care for fewer than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody 19 or more children under 18 years of age.

- (1) Every child day care facility shall provide proof of an approved Georgia Department of Human Services registration certificate prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and shall conform to all applicable local, state, and federal standards, including Bright From the Start current program standards, O.C.G.A. Chapter 591-1-1. An on-site outdoor play area is required, subject to the following minimum standards:
 - (a) Size requirements.
- (1) For Centers with a licensed capacity of 19 or more children first licensed after March 1, 1991, the Center shall provide or have ready access to an outdoor play area. The minimum size of the outdoor area must be equal to one hundred (100) square feet times one-third (1/3) of the Center's licensed capacity for children.

Architectural Site Plan









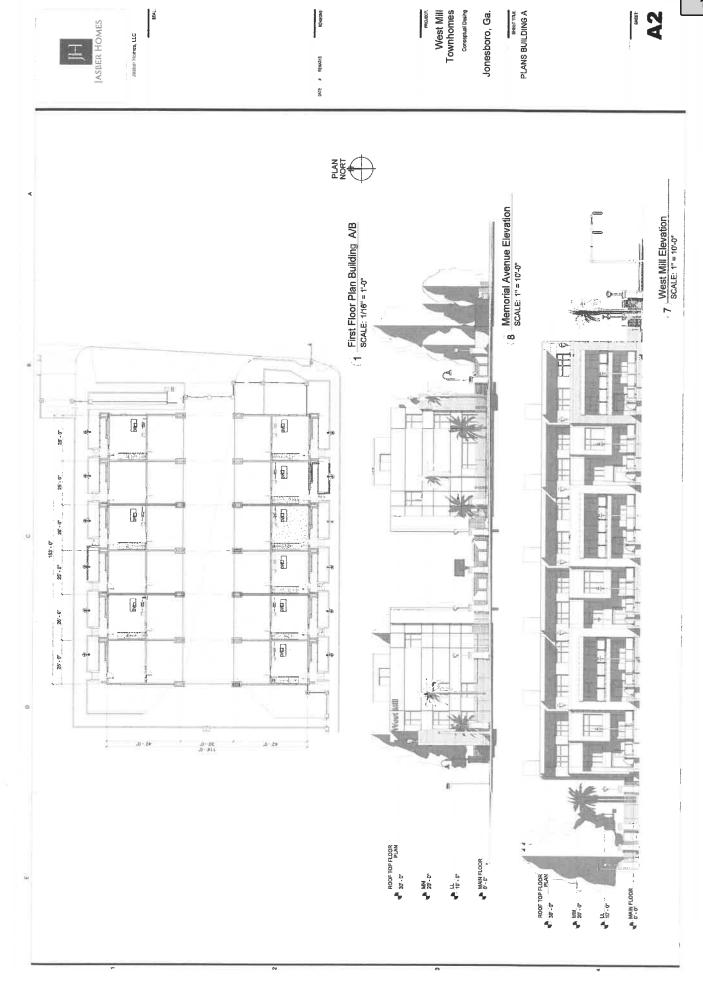

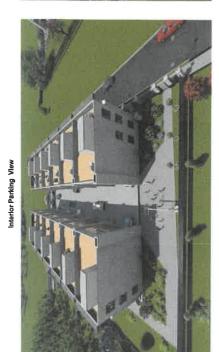

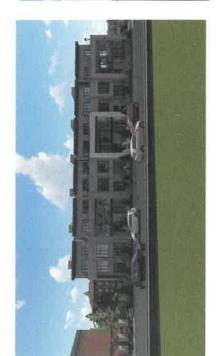

The property size is less than half the minimum 2-acre tract size required for townhome developments and the proposed density would be approaching twice the maximum allowed. Also, the overall townhome designs do not display three significantly different exterior elevations. Lots of standards to be overlooked to make this development work. The townhomes that were approved recently were at the edge of town and not in the middle of an established neighborhood.

Nina Robinson, Finance Director has prepared the attached schedule showing the required budget amendments for the general fund and SPLOST 2021 funds. This document has been prepared for Council Consideration and Approval. This amendment covers all funds. For the General Fund - Fund 100 available contingency reserves are being appropriated to cover all necessary amendments to expense lines items in each department.

This amendment also amends SPLOST 21 Fund – Fund 330 to properly capture the debt service for FY 2023. See the FY 2022 auditor findings for further information.

This action requires a decrease in the general fund revenue and expenses by \$1,500,000 which represents the amount originally budgeted in Fund 100.

Summary of Budget Final Amendment is attached.

Detail Budget Amendment registers are attached.

General Fund

The expense lines that are subject to amendment are detailed on the budget amendment registers. These amendments cover the required costs of the November 7th General election, seed money for the Jonesboro Youth Council, the recognition of special donations received and expended for Back-to-School event, an adjustment to reflect insurance proceeds received to repair damaged vehicles.

A review of all revenue accounts was completed and those line items that have performed better than anticipated were amended to provide sufficient funds to be appropriated from the contingency reserves to cover unanticipated expenses. Likewise, revenue lines that were projected to underperform in 2023 were reduced to reflect projected outcomes. See the register for the specific revenue lines adjusted.

Other Funds

Budget lines were amended to reflect the actual operational needs of the funds. The funds remain balanced. SPLOST 2021 fund will reflect the annual debt service requirements. Previously these expenses were budgeted in Fund 100 department 1500.
